


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Break The Conference - from Slingshot

The *Break the Chains* conference will be held Aug.8-10 at Univ. of Oregon in Eugene. It is dedicated to fighting repression, supporting prisoners, and eliminating prisons altogether. By providing anti-prison education, building on existing prisoner support efforts, learning from veteran prison activists, and initiating new campaigns against the prison industrial complex, this conference is intended to initiate a new era of heightened prisoner support and anti-prison activism.

Perhaps no other single issue so convincingly illustrates the struggle for total liberation, as does the prison industrial complex. Resisting prisons is resisting state repression and blatant social control; it is resisting the most terrifying examples of racism, sexism, and homophobia, the criminalization of the poor and capitalist exploitation of labor. For this reason, the Break the Chains conference hopes to exemplify the need for continued and heightened prisoner support with our ultimate goal being prison abolition. Prison abolition is a political vision that seeks to eliminate the need for prisons and acknowledges the devastating effect that prisons have on poor and marginalized communities.

Wide ranges of folks have agreed to attend and share their knowledge, including many former prisoners. Organizations attending include Free Mumia Coalition, Prison Legal News, and Out of Control Lesbian Committee to Support Women in Prison. There will be people working with prisoners that are HIV/AIDS infected and Black Panther and American Indian Movement elders, as well as a participant in the Attica rebellion of the '70s.

Any movement that does not support its political internees is a movement destined to fail. When power is challenged, it inevitably turns to violent repression and imprisonment to maintain itself. In order to avoid defeat, movements must become organized and capable of combating the repression of the state apparatus, and they must be able to support their comrades and allies in the event that they are arrested or imprisoned. Few would commit themselves to a movement that would leave them behind prison walls, or a movement that is incapable of sustaining itself in the face of state intimidation. Contact info at P.O. They have been able to deny the existence of political prisoners and prisoners of war because we have not taken the battle to them and forced them to address this issue. Over the last thirty years the numbers of political prisoners and prisoners of war languishing within the prisons of the United States of America has grown to enormous and geometric proportions as the struggles for liberation has intensified. While we have consistently contended that we are involved in a liberation struggle, our approach to winning the freedom of our political prisoners and prisoners of war has not supported our claim. Torture is the deliberate mental and physical damage inflicted by a government upon individuals in an effort to intimidate and control their populations. It is one of the most profound human rights abuses. Practiced by governments in at least 140 countries, the problem has reached epidemic proportions, making it the single most effective weapon against dissent. It is estimated that about 500,000 survivors of torture now living in the United States. Amigos de los Sobrevivientes holistic program is tailored to meet the individual needs of the survivors, seeking to restore their health, dignity, and personal autonomy. Amigos takes part in the local, national, and international campaigns against torture and political violence, educating the public about this crime against humanity. We are a coalition of professional and community volunteers who believe that human rights abuses affects all of us so it is up to us to resolve the problem. This presentation will focus on how torture is used to control people, by who, and why, and what Amigos does. **ROOM 152**

It can be argued that the imprisonment of native people is yet another toll of the American colonial power to control Indian lands and the ongoing attempt to deny Indian sovereignty....For the American Indian the state and federal prisons can be seen as yet another part of the violent colonial mechanism. International Platform Against IsolationOur Message to the Break the Chains Conference

[BTC Note: We apologize for the poor translation of this text.]

DEAR COMRADES AND FRIENDS,

We would like to greet you by heart and express our sadness for being unable to join this conference. As we have mentioned in our statements, the political prisoners are "OURSELVES BEHIND THE WALL". But we could express the ties of the struggle between in-and-outside also with the words "We are not all, the prisoners are being missed".

Our recent aim is to unite our forces outside and through practical support to give the prisoners the possibility to start a communication between them, from one country to another and even from one continent to another.

It is our aim to establish a central place for coordination, which could change from time to time, and to forward letters of prisoners to others, by translating them to the right language. We already sent out our letters to prisoners in order to inform them about this project.

Our actual engagement, as our name is showing, is first of all the fight against isolation. High security and isolation prisons are already widespread in European countries and the USA for a long time, and were later imported to the neo-colonial countries where the people's struggles against their imperialist exploiters increased.

The aim of isolation is to destroy human beings by destroying their minds. This kind of torture, called "WHITE TORTURE," is the highest level of political repression towards the prisoners. It doesn't only attack the body of the individual but also mere thoughts.

You might have heard of the death fast resistance in Turkish jails, which is lasting for over 1000 days, despite of all kinds of repression. It is really impossible not to mention these prisoners, who are, after 107 losses of life still ready to risk their lives in order to stand upright against the politics of isolation. This struggle which has reached its highest stage is part of the international struggle against tyranny and for the right of resistance.

Let us give our special greetings to our Palestinian brothers and sisters in jail, the Peruvian political prisoners, to Mumia and Leonard Peltier and to the Cuban Five who are being kept in the isolation cells of the USA, the Iranian political prisoners who fight against tyranny and for a independent country, to the numerous Basque and Irish prisoners and all those who are imprisoned for their thoughts in all continents of the world.

Our fight for justice against the attack on our right of resistance is only possible united and by doing practical steps towards these aims. We want to intensify and enlarge our common struggle in this field and invite all of

This presentation will focus on the Freedom Archives project, a political, cultural oral history project in San Francisco. The Freedom Archives has released several recent documentary CDs and videos combining restored historical audio and contemporary interviews. The videos focus on political prisoners Jalil Muntaqim, David Gilbert and Nuh Washington and a recent CD, Prisons on Fire, focuses on George Jackson and the Attica Rebellion. From Attica to Gustafsen Lake

Dacajeweiah/Splitting the Sky, Mohawk Revolutionary/Author

In this talk/workshop, Attica survivor Splitting the Sky will discuss the actual circumstances surrounding the rebellion at Attica State prison in 1971, the massacre of 43 prisoners and hostages committed by New York State fascist police force. Splitting the Sky was the only man convicted for the alleged murder of a prison guard at Attica and was almost sentenced to die in New York's electric chair.... He will also discuss recent armed standoffs against the state by Native activists, including the reoccupation of Mohawk territories in upstate New York, the armed occupation at Gustafson Lake British Columbia Canada, to knocking out one of the biggest war producing smelter plants in the world (Alcan Aluminum) to put a halt on imperial/colonial genocidal aggression. **ROOM 176**

The Marini Trial: Italian State Repression Against Anarchists and the Anarchists' Response

This workshop is intended to be both informative and to involve a theoretical analysis of these events. Starting in the mid-90's Italian prosecutor Antonio Marini has been making a concerted effort to prosecute anarchists for "subversive association" and "armed gang." Of course, it is a frame-up. The methodology of the state here is one that can be expected to be used increasingly (particularly with tools like the USAPatriot act) by all states. By going into the situation Italian comrades are facing, I will examine this strategy. I will also go into the question of a specifically anarchist revolutionary method of facing such a situation. **ROOM 155**

Come hear from prisoner family members Leslie and Stacey Bull whose seventeen year old twin sons were sentenced to eleven years in adult prison for a crime where no one was physically harmed or killed..... Discussion to include our experience of the prison system, the reality of corporate, privatized prisons in our family's lives, and prisoner family pride.... We will share poetry, writings, and art out of

neo-slavery, of police brutality, shootings & murder of the weak & innocent, of dehumanization & war.

Our enemies know who is who, and they *never* forgive or forget, and we as freedom fighters must forever keep going & *never* forget who our enemies are or what our mission & objectives are. We are freedom fighters & believe in armed struggle as the final solution to free humanity & we have faith in the people, that's our spirituality. The powers-that-be have been patiently waiting for a longtime for a pretext to expand their fascist policies, domestically & abroad, and to attack & suppress all politically enlightened people of the Left. Stirring the human spirit, rebelling at this dark hour, avenging those who have been crushed beneath the burden of barbarism & bourgeois tyranny... these must be the overwhelming duties of every freedom loving person everywhere in Amerikkka — today, tomorrow, *always*. At our disposal we have a 1000 weapons more powerful than those used by the state, weapons which we place the chemistry & the intelligence of the individual at our disposal, we merely have to forearm ourselves with the subtlest of circumspection, and a whole gamut of precaution & to be distrustful even of our own mothers before & after we set to our work.

The poor & oppressed people throughout the world who are presently under Amerikkan & British attack must be supported & made to feel that they are not alone. Our Day Shall Come: Irish Resistance & Irish Political Prisoners Peter Urban, Irish Republican Socialist Party

For the past three decades, prisoners of war from the Irish National Liberation Army and the various Irish Republican Armies have remained at the essential core of the struggle in Ireland for national liberation and socialism. From internment to the blanket men, from the hunger strikes to the assassination of Billy Wright, the prisoners have served to mobilize Irish women and men into action, served as the conscience of the movement, have inspired and at times forged the very image of the Irish national liberation struggle. The infamous H-Blocks are now . empty, but in the bowels of Maghaberry Prison history seems to be repeating itself as conditions degenerate towards a possible hunger strike and in the south of Ireland, INLA prisoner Dessie O Hare is serving his 26th year of incarceration, despite a general amnesty which was to have taken effect in 1998. This presentation by IRSP International Department Co-Secretary Peter Urban looks at Teach na Failte ("Welcome Home") an organization begun by Irish socialists to ease the transition of longterm prisoners back to their families, their communities, the maze of social services and the frustration of seeking employment. He will also discuss Teach na Failte's other function, to provide a continuation of the sense of community that Irish political prisoners forged in the jails of their homeland and a vehicle to enable their transition to a life of political activism on the outside. Any organization assisting prisoners in the process of release will find ideas for their own efforts in the model of Teach na Failte. ROOM 176

Statement of Solidarity with Break The Chains Conference

[Thomas Tripp is an anarchist social prisoner. Originally serving time for an assault resulting from a fight, Thomas was given an extended sentence in 2002 for his role in a prison rebellion at Two Rivers Correctional Institute in Umatilla, Oregon. The rebellion was aimed at winning better conditions for prisoners. He and his co-defendants, American Indian prisoners Teewahne Sahme and David "Looks Away" Scalera, have come to be known as the "Children of the River" for their role in this rebellion and their struggle on the inside.]

AROUND THE WORLD, REPRESSION INCREASES DAILY, NOT MERELY REPRESSION against anarchists, but against ideas, against the natural world, against freedom in all of its forms. Our comrades — both anarchists and those who don't yet know themselves to be anarchistic, but only see themselves as lovers of freedom — are gunned down in the streets, beaten down in alleyways and on forest floors, run down by bulldozers while defending children. Evil goats in the state house, even while battling in the streets.

More and more often, however, the prison cell is becoming the most concrete expression of state repression. The state believes that all forms of dissent can be silenced with a prison wall, that the simplest way to deal with the disillusionment and rage that is sweeping the globe is to criminalize everyone: the poor, blacks, whites, Natives, protestors, peacekeepers, militants: the state seems to believe that if you are not wielding the truncheon you should, at the very least, be receiving the blows.

Day by day the walls go up, the razor wire is strung, the towers are "manned." Prisons spread like sores across the face of the land, popping up to the tune of deranged economist's screaming "economic recovery!" One by one the lives of all of us — from comrades in the struggle to those just struggling to get by — are touched, and sometimes shattered, by the current reign of terror embarked upon by the state.

I don't need to quote the numbers to you — I'm sure most of you know the statistics by heart. Many of you have done time yourselves and know first hand how prison attempts to leech away from you all that is good; how every function of the prison system is designed — not to curtail "crime," nor to rehabilitate, whatever that means — but only to perpetuate the existence of the prison system itself.

Eugene Debs once said, in effect, that without solidarity, nothing can be accomplished, but that with solidarity, there is nothing that we cannot achieve. In the battle for freedom which we wage against the state, solidarity is our truest, most powerful weapon. Our individual and collective acts of guerrilla warfare (on every level from cultural guerrilla warfare to actual fighting in the streets) are essential and must continue and increase. However,

At the present time, there is a letter campaign ongoing, attempting to persuade the commissioner to change his mind, to restore prisoner-owned typing equipment to the allowed property list, which may or may not be successful in the future. The commissioner is replying to the request letters with deception and half-truth in stating the courts will all take handwritten documents from prisoners while the federal appellate court mandates typed documents complete with font and spacing requirements, so all courts will not accept handwritten documents as put forth by the commissioner in his responsive letters. Tennessee prisoners was permitted possession of personal typewriters and word processors for approximately twenty years before these items was removed from the allowed property list, and created no space management or security problem which have also been utilized as justification for their removal from the property list. The anarchist position on crime is pretty simple: it's forced on people by circumstances or a capitalist corruption of the spirit. But the problem of dealing with discord — from disruptive behavior to sexual assault and even murder — in our own oppositional communities is complex.

and ill treatment because of "who" we are! A world of equals is our goal, where every voice is heard and every voice counts equally! We can, and will, settle for no less! We only want the earth!

Now the times are dangerous for us with the civil liberty crushing government power under the guise of the PATRIOT Act and the travesty of an Act enhancing the sweeping powers of the PATRIOT Act which followed, which threaten us all! Now is the time for action, to educate about who we are and what we are about, a time for carefully-planned and executed direct action in furtherance of our political goals, a time to carefully choose which fronts of struggle to invest our time and limited resources on as our movement grows to present to those opposing us a united front instead of a splintered, fragmented struggle easily crushed by our enemies! Now is a time to reach across any perceived barriers between people, grasp our brothers' and sisters' hands and move together as one to achieve our common goals in the end. Each action we plan in furtherance of anarchism must be creatively planned and carried out, learning from our mistakes, evolving and growing as the enemy learns from mistakes, strategizes and plans counter-moves to defeat us, to make us appear marginalized, weak and few in numbers while fearing us, fearing our movement capturing the imaginations and being accepted by the populous! We only want the earth, our birthright stolen from the people while they slept and, worse still, surrendered by trusting those elected to represent our interest, they who serve only capitalism!

Our movement has many fronts where we struggle against the enemy. I have been imprisoned since 1979 in the Tennessee state gulag system and work inside prison confines as a jailhouse lawyer/legal aide and helper attempting to obtain some semblance of justice for those predominantly from the working class in a corrupt, morally-bankrupt legal system. Each victory is cherished, fighting The Man in his own arena, on his preferred playing field, in his court system where he desires nothing more than to squeeze every ounce of blood and misery out of us and store us in a human warehouse until death if possible. I am serving life plus eightytwo years, am 61 years old and in ill health, but the fire of anarchism, of rebellion, burns as bright in my heart as it ever did and I will struggle for anarchism until I take my last breath! I am presently engaged in a struggle to have the most basic tool used by a prisoner to present legal work to the courts reinstated to the approved inmate property list for Tennessee prisoners. Typewriters and word processors were removed, as a vindictive act to retard and make nearly impossible prisoner-generated legal documents to the courts, by the previous commissioner of Tennessee Department of Correction and being upheld by the present commissioner.

to the theft and importation of Afrikan Peoples. Therefore, if colonization produces imperialism, then decolonization naturally would yield the fruit of freedom.

The US Constitution mandates slavery. It is wrapped in the garb of the 13th Amendment. Chattel slavery no longer being digestible to the public, a new form had to be put into play to maintain the Empire of US. Prison slavery fit such a need as it is tucked carefully away from view of society at large. Out of sight — out of mind.

The prison abolition movement would be making a mistake to ignore history, the continued colonization and the Peoples colonized. After all, the prison system is much greater than that of the concrete and steel walls dotting the land like a cancer. It is the very Empire that enslaves us all — inside and out.

This gathering is a step in the right direction. It is a chance to form a lasting bond, and to step on the path of our liberations together and walk toward freedom.

Or the fire be put out."

John Two-Names (Andy Riendeau) Statement to the Break the Chains Conference

[John Two Names is a Native American prisoner being held hostage by the state of Alabama. He was incarcerated for charges stemming from the burning down of two white schools and a string of burglaries. He asserts his innocence, and believes his incarceration is in retaliation for his political activism for his People.]

My name is John Two-Names. I am an Indigenous hostage of the

Occupational Forces gathered here upon this land. I was asked to share my comments regarding the direction the prisoner support movement should be moving, as well as this event. For me, this is an honor, and I thank those whom have asked for this opportunity.

Regarding the current slave manufacturing system, I must keep in mind that the prison system is merely that which reflects the overall will of the system and Empire which it serves. It is the will of the Empire that it exists, and to try to abolish it without tearing down that which it serves is futile.

Colonization, the process of building and maintaining empires, is directly related to the building of the Prison Industrial Complex. Historically, empires of every shade have been built upon the backs of the colonized, the slaves of the Empire - the US being no exception. This is evidenced from the campaign of genocide launched upon the First Nations of Great Turtle Island,

Statement from Sara Jane Olson AKA Kathleen Soliah, Political Prisoner

WAR IS PEACE. FREEDOM IS SLAVERY. WE'RE WELL PAST 1984 AND TIMES are scary. With the advent of Bush II's takeover of Washington, DC. we've seen the invasion and occupation of two previously-destroyed countries — Afghanistan and Iraq; Patriot Acts I and the looming II; federal court-sanctioned secret mass arrests and deportations based on racial/ethnic profiling; the FCC ruling that further consolidates our already centralized corporative media that have earned the appellation, "Pravda," and across-the-board tax cuts for our wealthy folks at the expense of the rest of us. New York Times columnist and economist professor, Paul Krugman, describes a future in which those wealthy Americans will all live in walled, gated communities guarded and patrolled by a specialized urban police force. The US will look like a European medieval society, the majority of the population existing outside the elitist walls in a neo-max headroom environment,

scrambling and grubbing for crumbs. But there is reason to hope and common people demonstrate that day after day with resistance to the apocalyptic vision of a future we abhor. No matter what we do to construct a path to an alternate future, whether by acts that specifically say "no" or through projects that offer, by example, another way in our present we build, in small measures, for the moment of historical leap to a better world.

Bush and his neo-cons, many from the former Reagan and Bush I administrations, wrestle for the "soul" of the nation. These people have been fighting their revolution for decades to overcome ideas and social expansion that begun in the 1960s and to forever save the country from marijuana-smoking '60s types. Well, the '60s types fought too: for voting and civil rights for the disenfranchised — a continuing struggle that, today, finds the use of felony convictions to perpetuate old Jim Crow patterns; and end, once and for all, to wars of imperialism that kill poor Americans and

several actions carried out by the SLA.

In June 1999, after twenty-four years on the run, Sara Jane Olson was arrested in St. Paul, Minnesota. Two years later, Olson pled guilty to a plot to bomb two LAPD patrol cars on August 21, 1975.

In early 2003, Olson, along with William Harris, Emily Montague (Harris), and Michael Bortin were sentenced for the 1975 murder of Myrna Opsahl, who was shot and killed when the SLA was robbing a California bank.

Statement of Support for the Break The Chains Conference

I BELIEVE IT IS IMPORTANT THAT PARTICIPANTS IN THIS CONFERENCE UNDERSTAND the issue of the existence of US political prisoners' is an issue of recognizing resistance in this country. There has been, and will continue to be resistance to capitalist-imperialism, white supremacy, and domestic colonialism. Although there are many varied aspects of struggle being waged on different fronts, the bottom line is that racism and capitalist-imperialism is the foundation of all of our troubles. Therefore, while progressive and revolutionary forces are battling against US imperialism outside the borders of the US, it is imperative that progressives and revolutionaries redouble their determination to do battle inside US borders.

Over the years, as an example, Critical Resistance has been organizing conferences educating people about the prison industrial complex. However, I have not learned of Critical Resistance identifying and striking against a particular entity representing the Prison Industrial Complex (PIC). I believe it is important to give a face, an identity to the existence of the PIC, and then challenge its existence and manner of doing business. It is important to identify targets that represent the interests of repressive government and challenge them, expose them, uncover their methods of operation in ways that they cannot deny. For instance, the Battle of Seattle is a prime example of how progressives and revolutionaries must challenge the system. There can be no real or honest solidarity with those fighting & dieing in other parts of the world against US imperialism, while in the belly of the beast, the extent of a protest is a march and a rally. Any struggle that is confined to the parameters of your enemy to protest, is not revolutionary, but only a show. of dissent within the US democratic process. It is letting off steam in a pressure cooker, when you should be trying to blow a way the pot. For as long as protests continue to be confined to the dictates of what the government allows, then your protests will continue to be controlled by the government. Your dissent becomes government-sanctioned access. In this way, the government preserves the illusion of inclusion in the democratic process.

The existing US political prisoners have stories to tell, stories of commitment, determination, and courage, that cannot and should not be ignored. They possess lessons from trial & error that should be recorded and understood to permit our struggle to take that giant leap in revolution. Supporting US political prisoners is crucial to maintaining consistency in our political practice, ensuring continuity in our determination, from one generation to the next. Furthermore, the struggle to free US political prisoners encourages activists to know they will not be abandoned in the course of the struggle. Supporting

Safiya is a former Black Panther and Black Liberation Army member who spent close to nine years in prison for clandestine actions on behalf of the BLA. Now the co-chair of the New York City Free Mumia Coalition and an international organizer of the Jericho Movement, she continues to struggle to free hundreds of political prisoners of war and to fight for liberation.

Nora Callahan

Nora was raising two children and co-owner of an electrical contracting firm when her brother, Gary Callahan, was indicted for a drug conspiracy in 1989. His consequent 27-year prison sentence prompted her in 1997 to heed the request of prisoners at Oxford Federal Correctional Facility in Wisconsin, "Help us organize drug war prisoners and their loved ones to oppose this war." Raised within a family of war veterans and law enforcement officers, and after completing high school in southern California, Nora attended Lutheran Bible Institute in Seattle, Washington and began raising a family. Nora has been noted for her grassroots leadership, sharing the 1998 Thomas Paine Award given by the Thomas Paine Society of Pasadena, California. At the 14th Annual International Conference of the Drug Policy Alliance in 2001, Nora was presented the Robert C. Randall Award for Achievement in the Field of Citizen Action, honoring those citizens fighting for drug law and policy reform.

Chrystos

Chrystos is a self-educated writer as well as an artist who designs the covers of her own books. Her work as a Native land and treaty rights activist has been widely recognized and the political aspect is an essential part of her writing — even though she refuses to be taken as a "voice" of Native women or as a "spiritual leader." She is also working toward freedom for imprisoned Indian activists Leonard Peltier. The other dominant aspect of her work is lesbianism, which is outspoken and personalized in her "love-and-lust" poems.

Ward Churchill

Native American author, activist, and all around ass-kicker. Ward is a former chairperson of the Leonard Peltier Defense Committee, veteran American Indian Movement [AIM] activist, and author, co-author or editor of more than a dozen books about Native American struggles for liberation, movement strategy, the politics of imprisonment, COINTELPRO & state repression.

Act. Live. Flourish. Revolt.


Claude Marks

Jeffrey Luers (AKA "Free") Statement to the Break the Chains Conference

[Free (Jeffrey Luers) is an environmental activist and political prisoner. In June 2001, he was handed an extremely heavy sentence of 22 1/2 years for his participation in the destruction of several Sports Utility Vehicles, in protest of the destruction of the environment. He is currently in "The Hole" at Oregon State Penitentiary for a letter that he wrote to the Earth First! Journal.]

I'VE BEEN ASKED TO WRITE SOMETHING FOR this conference - and I find myself not knowing what to say. There are more than two million prisoners in the USA, and that number grows daily. Presently, hundreds and maybe thousands of Muslims and people of Middle Eastern descent are illegally imprisoned, denied basic human rights and civil rights in the name of freedom. It is startlingly reminiscent of the internment of Japanese Americans in World War II. The war against terrorism will be much the same as the war on drugs. Thousands of people will be placed in prison - only under new rules you don't have to be charged with a crime to be held indefinitely. The USA is flexing its muscles, daring anyone to challenge its power. From without it threatens with



overwhelming military power. From within it threatens with fascist laws designed as much to intimidate as punish. The "great land of freedom" has gone from a genocidal nation to a fascist superpower. This lesson was already learned once in history. If the German citizens who opposed Hitler would have challenged him early on, the Holocaust may have been avoided. In this dangerous age of nuclear threat, if we do not challenge this fascist system the world could face disaster. Change must come from within, and by any means necessary. I urge everyone in attendance to go back to their homes and start building community. Develop programs to feed children and educate them. Create independent news to educate adults. Reclaim space to grow food and build/create housing. It is only by building a broad movement supported by the people that change can occur. This broad base can then support our militants that take the fight to the front lines. They must have your support. There must be funds for attorneys ready to go before they are needed. She's a former prisoner incarcerated for 5 years at the California Rehabilitation Center located in Norco. Since her release over 14 years ago she has worked within the Bay Area and Humboldt County, American Indian communities as an active community organizer and speaker. She has done work around the issues of Indian Child Welfare,

IThomas is a German anarchist Redskin (antiracist skinhead) imprisoned since 1996 for attempted expropriation of funds from a capitalist bank. He will be imprisoned until at least 2010 due to the political nature of his crimes — he was doing it to raise money for anti-fascist activities. Calling the judge a fascist pig in court also added seven months to his time.]

GREETINGS TO ALL FRIENDS AND COMRADES OVER THERE

We are living in an era which began some years ago — people on the inside and outside are living in chains! It is important to focus on the worldwide inhuman and degrading treatment and punishment of convicted people, but we should not forget that the people outside of the prisons have their own chains.

However, if the prisoners, the women and men who fought militantly and were imprisoned for their struggle, are forgotten, the whole left-wing movement will destroy itself. The Break the Chains Conference is a wonderful chance to bring forward the need for continued and heightened prisoner support.

I'm staying in a German prison. I have been kept in solitary for years because they feel that I could escape. But I ask you: is it not the human right of every convict to fight for their freedom? I do not believe in the strategy of cooperation with one's enemy, and I think that the inmates who "cooperate" have lost their human dignity! That is why it is necessary to help them regain their dignity; they must learn that they are part of the revolution, part of a new world - a world which stands for humanity, freedom and living in peace!


Brigette Sarabi

He holds a Ph.D. in Romance Languages and teaches at the University of Oregon in Eugene, where he has lived since 1995. The translation of the book The Garden of Peculiarities will be published this year in the US.

Peter Urban



1. How do I register? How much is the conference?

We would like people to register with conference organizers at the check-in desk, so that we may stay in touch to keep you updated about our activities, and so that we may ask for your feedback in the aftermath of the conference. But this is optional. All of the conference sessions that are held on campus are free of cost. We will be asking for donations at the off-campus conference events. We are in serious need of funds to pay off conference debts and to continue to do prisoner support work, so we need to charge a small payment for all off-campus, nighttime conference events. However, no one will be turned away for a lack of funds.

2. When does the conference start/end?

The conference will begin at 7:30 pm at the United Lutheran Church (on 22nd & Washington) on Friday, August 8th. The conference will end at approx. midnight at the WOW Hall (on 8th & Lincoln) on Sunday, August 10. For more details, see our conference schedule.

3. Where is the conference actually going to be held?

The conference will begin on the night of Friday, August 8th, at the United Lutheran Church (located at 22nd & Washington). The conference is going to be held at the Education Building (located at 16th & Alder), on the University of Oregon campus, from 9am to 6pm, on Saturday, August 9th, and Sunday, August 10th. The Saturday (August 9th) night keynote/performance event will be held at the Core Star Cultural Center, located at 2nd & Lawrence. The closing conference event (for the night of Sunday, August 10) will be held at the WOW Hall (located on the corner of 8th & Lincoln). 
8. What if I want to facilitate a workshop or discussion?
