The College of Arts and Social Sciences at the University of Aberdeen is offering funding for postgraduate students interested in pursuing research on the topic of 'Translating Cultural Movements: Music and the Arts in a World Context', a four-year interdisciplinary project that sets out to explore how themes matter in an age of globalisation. Through a series of case studies that take up the theme of 'translating cultures' from a variety of perspectives and with regard to different geopolitical constellations, this project seeks to illustrate the ways in which the arts play a significant role in contemporary societies. We invite applications from students from a wide range of humanities and social science disciplines.

Candidates interested in joining the project who do not yet have a Masters degree can apply for one of ten Home Fees awards to take one of our Research Preparation Masters in 2010: the MA in Comparative Literature or the MA in Visual Culture.

In addition, the committee awarding scholarships for the project will be able to allocate some funds towards tuition fees.
