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

# PREAMBLE

The working class and the employing class have nothing in common. There can be no peace so long as hunger and want are found among millions of the working people and the few, who make up the employing class, have all the good things of life.

Between these two classes a struggle must go on until the workers of the world organize as a class, take possession of the means of production, abolish the wage system, and live in harmony with the Earth.

We find that the centering of the management of industries into fewer and fewer hands makes the trade unions unable to cope with the ever growing power of the employing class. The trade unions foster a state of affairs which allows one set of workers to be pitted against another set of workers in the same industry, thereby helping defeat one another in wage wars. Moreover, the trade unions aid the employing class to mislead the workers into the belief that the working class have interests in common with their employers.

These conditions can be changed and the interest of the working class upheld only by an organization formed in such a way that all its members in any one industry, or in all industries if necessary, cease work whenever a strike or lockout is on in any department thereof, thus making an injury to one an injury to all.

Instead of the conservative motto, "A fair day's wage for a fair day's work," we must inscribe on our banner the revolutionary watchword, "Abolition of the wage system."

It is the historic mission of the working class to do away with capitalism. The army of production must be organized, not only for everyday struggle with capitalist, but also to carry on production when capitalism shall have been overthrown. By organizing industrially we are forming the structure of the new society within the shell of the old.

## Join "Defend CSAAWU Campaign" facebook page



Cape Town wobblies are helping organize a campaign to support the Commercial, Stevedoring, Agricultural and Allied Workers' Union (CSAAWU) work in organizing farm workers in the Western Cape of South Africa. CSAAWU is a socialist union that represents a left alternative to the much larger Congress of South African Trade Unions (COSATU), whose close associations with the ruling ANC have prevented COSATU from taking bolder stances against the continuing economic inequality in post-Apartheid South Africa.

The union is under attack. In the past farmers have tried to bribe them, when this did not work they threatened them with the law: CSAAWU just won a case lodged against them by farmers on charges of hate speech (the union said that white farmers are engaging in "apartheid-style management". The farmers said this was "hate speech" – an assertion that

was thrown out of court) and now they have been served notice of cancellation of registration of a trade union. The "Defend CSAAWU Campaign" is only the start, so please encourage everyone you know who is on facebook to join.

### Bay Area IWW Joins in March 4th Events in Berkeley, Oakland, and San Francisco

Thursday March 4th was an exciting and invigorating day of action as students and education workers from around the State of California walked out of schools and universities in protest of impending cuts to education budgets statewide. Students and teachers protested against the cutbacks, attacks on unions, and even against the systematic privatization of public education.

On March 4th the IWW set up a literature table at Frank Ogawa Plaza just outside of city Hall in downtown Oakland, which was the gathering point for students and teachers in western Alameda County. Beginning at Noon, thousands of teachers and students began pouring into the plaza as organizers, activists, students, and teachers spoke out against the impending cuts. IWW



members marched in several different contingents (and many active members of the Bay Area GMB are teachers).

Bay Area IWW buyback recyclers spoke out publicly against the cutbacks in solidartity with the students and teachers. The largest contingent to arrive in Ogawal plaza (and one of the last) was the 1,000-plus strong UC Berkeley contingent who marched over six miles from the Berkeley campus to downtown Oakland.

Some of the IWW members later took BART (public transit) across the bay to San Francisco to join in a rally at Civic (Continued pg. 3)

It's not certain whether or not any of these activists were IWW members, several of the demonstrators were arrested (and one unlucky activist was injured by a fall from the above-ground freeway overpass to the street level below)."

## Back to the Grind: SWU Southern Midwest Tour a Success

On March 19, a delegation of IWW Starbucks baristas from the Twin Cities crammed themselves into one worker's 3-cylinder Geo Metro and set off on a journey to bring the good word of solidarity unionism to baristas and workers across the lower midwest. Four days later, we returned to the Twin Cities after covering over 1,700 miles, talking to dozens of Starbucks workers about the union, and speaking to enthusiastic audiences in Kansas City, St. Louis, and lowa City about our efforts to win decent wages, consistent scheduling, and other basic demands through workplace organizing at the world's largest coffee chain.

Our first stop was KKFI, a community radio station in Kansas City, where the Heartland Labor Forum radio show was kind enough to interview us about our organizing experiences on their show. We then made our way to the Westport Coffee House, where we held a discussion with interested community members about the issues at Starbucks, and the possibility of building a new labor movement from the ground up. We discovered that, just as in every other American city, the Kansas City working class is under attack. The Kansas City School Board recently decided to close an enormous number of schools and lay off many teachers, unionized in the American Federation of Teachers. We extend our solidarity to them and hope that workers and students can unite in defense of quality public education.

The next day, we hit the road for St. Louis, site of the first general strike in US history in 1877, as well as a giant arch, and the worker-owned and democratically-operated Black Bear Bakery. The Autonomy Alli-

ance and local IWW members sponsored a public event at the bakery, providing us with an opportunity to share the story of our union campaign with local labor activists and workers.

After a brief night's sleep, we were off across the cornfields of lowa, heading to lowa City to speak at an event organized by IWW members and the Wild Rose Collective. We met many workers at the event, some with decades of experience in the struggle, others just starting out, and and discussed the possibility of stronger regional support for workplace organizing across the midwest.

Thanks to the generosity of our hosts and audience members in the cities we visited, we were able to cover almost all of our gas costs and always had a place to stay in each town we visited. Working class solidarity is alive and well in the Midwest. Because of this, even a grassroots organization of low-wage retail workers like the IWW Starbucks Workers Union can pose a threat to one of the largest corporations in the world. We find inspiration in this fact, especially after seeing first hand the devastation that the capitalist class has wrought on cities across our region in the last 30 years of deindustrialization, plus the last two years of recession.

We plan to continue visiting workers in other cities across the midwest in the coming months, hopefully laying part of the foundation of a new working class movement for control over our lives and communities across the region.

# **SOLIDARITY STATEMENTS, MOTIONS AND APPEALS**

# May Day Statement:

May Day, also known as International Workers Day - began after workers won a brutal struggle for the 8 hour day. Immigrant and native-born workers struggled together on the basis of their solidarity as workers, regardless of differences of language, nation, or religion. On this May Day in 2010, we stress the irrelevance of borders, and the importance of international labor solidarity, as we struggle together to create a world free of exploitation and the systemic violence that is poverty and war.

Workers slave around the globe under inhuman conditions for starvation wages. Those workers whose conditions and wages are less dire must recognize the direct and causal relationship that ties the oppression of workers abroad to the situation of workers in their own countries. The courageous workers in Bangladesh and Pakistan inspire us to deepen and strengthen our connection and our real commitment to struggling on behalf of all workers everywhere, collectively.

Workers around the world face a common enemy: an employing class that lives off our labor, and pits workers against one another in wage wars, so as to ensure their profits. The bosses' demand for "free trade," and the protectionism embraced by many trade unions in response, are flip sides of the same bitter coin. Neither "Fair Trade" nor "Buy American" are solutions which can achieve genuine worker victories anywhere.

Only the solidarity of the working class, expressed through our joint activity to support each others' struggles, offers a way forward. How else can we struggle for our collective victory, unless we struggle together collectively?

Today's bosses move their factories wherever they can pay the least and control the most. The factories migrate first, and the workers follow them when we can. North American workers, whose own improved conditions were won through bitter struggles and are now also under renewed attack, must stand in direct solidarity with workers elsewhere, to defend our common interests as a class.

We toil for the same employers, and have the same needs: not just for food and shelter, but for the good things of life and for the time in which to enjoy them. Workers create all of society's wealth, and we are entitled to the fruits of our labor. In order to achieve justice for all workers, we must accept our duties and responsibilities to stand in direct solidarity with all workers everywhere, against those who profit from our labor.

On this May Day, the Industrial Workers of the World, the National Garment Workers Federation, the Bangladesh Center for Worker Solidarity affirm our commitment to working over the coming years to organize in concrete ways to accomplish the real gains of worker power, and invite others to join us in our campaign to win basic human rights, including the right to organize in our workplaces and our communities, to earn a living wage, to determine our working conditions, and ultimately to enjoy the freedom and abundance that our labor and our struggles have made possible.

## Solidarity Statement with Workers in Struggle in Greece

As governments across the world respond to the current recession, a fruit of the unfettered gambling by capitalists with the wealth of the earth and the labour of workers everywhere, by further cutting into the subsistence and rights of the working class, we are glad to express our solidarity with the workers of Greece.

We are grateful to them for refusing to comply with the lie of "austerity" measures, which amount to the demand of a sacrifice by the poor for the benefit of the rich and for continuing to take a brave stand in the face of police repression.

In the hope that their struggle, which is also a struggle for workers everywhere, may continue and succeed, the IWW aim to lend our support, by action in solidarity, where it is within our grasp to do so, in our firm knowledge that 'an injury to one is an injury to all'.

#### NO TO UNION REPRESSION AGAINST THE PEOPLE & BABY CNT-F SECTION

Following a strike aimed to obtain better working conditions and an other conception of professional practices in the childcare field, six workers of the Giono day care center (located in the 13th district of Paris, France, and managed by the People & Baby company) who had just created a union section, have been receiving a letter for their laying of. In order to justify these procedures, People & Baby's direction evokes sanitary management of the place. However, none of these employees had before that been subject to any sanction or even a remark about these questions.

Work medical administration has anyway stated that these facts that could be reproached to the employees actually concern the direction itself! On its side, work inspec-



tion administration has sent a letter to the direction, asking it to withdraw its sanctions. The parents have also brought their support to the employees, chocked that their children could have been confided to unknown persons while they were extremely satisfied with the current team and its pedagogical project.

Today, the direction confirms its will to fire most of the employees of the Giono day care center ! In front of this violent act from the management against employees, we have to act. ## Belgrade 6 goes Free, the struggle continues!



There was a tremendous turn out of supporters for the start of the Belgrade 6 case. There was also many supporters from outside Serbia, which included may supporters from the IWA sections. All the main Serbian TV channels were also present.

Little information come from inside the courts, so it was a long day for supporters waiting outside with all sorts of conflicting rumors circulating about what was happening inside. Our concerns were only increased when several anarchist from Croatia were arrested for unfolding a banner which read ANARCHISM IS NOT TERRORISM. They now face up to a month in prison.

At 3.30pm loud clapping come from inside the court. A few minutes later supporters, who had been allowed in the court, emerged to announce that the Belgrade 6 were going to be released in effect on bail. There was plenty of confusion but it later confirmed that they were going to be

released until March 23rd when they would still face terrorist charges.

But the fact that they had been released was a tremendous victory. Later in the evening the Belgrade 6 were informed that the charges of terrorism would be dropped and replaced with a lesser charge.

The fight is not over, the Belgrade 6 may still face serious charges when they return to court on the 23rd March. We must keep up the pressure on the Serbian state. But the fact that they have been released and the terrorist charges dropped is a massive victory, But the campaign must continue until all charges are dropped and the Serbian state is held accountable for actions.

## Lala Har Dayal

Dayal, born October 4<sup>th</sup>, 1884, was the sixth of seven children of Bhoti and Gauri Dayal Mathur, Reader of the District Court. *Dayal* is not so much a surname as a sub-caste designation, within the Kayastha caste of writers. Being influenced by

Arya Samaj, a Hindu reform movement in India, He also drew inspiration from Giuseppe Mazzini, Karl Marx and Mikhail Bakunin. He is quoted as saying he was "in sequence an atheist, a revolutionary, a Buddhist, and a pacifist".

He studied at the Cambridge Mission School and received his bachelor's degree in Sanskrit from St. Stephen's College, Delhi, India and his master's degree from Punjab University. In a letter to The Indian Sociologist, published in 1907, he started to explore anarchist ideas, arguing that "our object is not to reform government, but to reform it away, leaving, if necessary only nominal traces of its existence."

Dayal moved to the United States in 1911, where he became involved in the revolutionary industrial unionist movement. He served as secretary of the San Francisco branch of the Industrial Workers of the World. A little over a year later, this group had been given 6 acres (24,000 m<sup>2</sup>) of land and a house in Oakland, where he founded the Bakunin Institute of California which he described as "the first monastery of anarchism". The organisation aligned itself with the Regeneración movement founded by the exiled Mexicans Ricardo and Enrique Flores Magón. He had a post as a lecturer in philosophy at Stanford University. However, he was forced to resign because of embarrassment about his activities in the anarchist movement.

In April 1914, he was arrested by the United States government for spreading anarchist literature and fled to Berlin, Germany. He subsequently lived for a decade in Sweden.

He died in Philadelphia in 1939. On the evening of his death he had given a lecture where he had said "I am Peace with all".


