- Ethical purchasing, including 'buy local' policies
- Quality physical and social infrastructure for all residents
- Safeguarding and utilizing all public assets for the public good
- Civic engagement and democratic processes for all decision-making
- Fiscal sustainability based on fair sharing of program costs and tax revenue from Queen's Park and Ottawa
- Integral role of schools and education in healthy neighbourhoods

A real commitment to learning is best described by the slogan: *Give Our Students What They Need to Succeed!* That can only happen when we have a school system that:

- Provides excellent and accessible programs for all its diverse communities and age groups
- ✓ Is committed to an equity agenda in programs, curriculum and staffing
- Is properly and publicly funded to support both programs which have proved their value to our diverse communities and to meet new needs
- Engages the participation of parents, community, students and its own front-line employees
 in planning and achieving its goals
- Encourages the use of schools as vital community hubs in co-operation with the city and other agencies
