Lincoln Brower has been conducting and leading research in the monarch butterfly's overwintering grounds in central Mexico since 1977. Join us as Professor Brower chronicles his research on the migratory and overwintering biology of these incredible insects, and explores related conservation issues. She has returned there every year for the last 26 years, to work with local communities on everything from helping to form artisanal cooperatives, to working on environmental issues. She also collects stories, myths, legends, poems, superstitions and art about butterflies, and has lectured on them around the country. Come out and be inspired by Maraleen's passion for these fragile creatures that link our bioregion to the Michoacan Forest Reserve. 
BGCI joins GBIF Global Information Network



On 4 August 2004, Botanic Gardens Conservation Interantional (BGCI) signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) making BGCI an Associate Participant to GBIF. As a participant, BGCI will provide relevant data to GBIF on plant conservation through a network node.

GBIF works cooperatively with and in support of several other international organizations concerned with biodiversity. These include (but are not limited to) the Clearing House Mechanism and the Global Taxonomic Initiative of the Convention on Biological Diversity, and regional biodiversity information networks.

As its work programmes progress, GBIF will enable users to navigate and put to use the world's vast quantities of biodiversity information. This information is vital to generating economic, environmental, social and scientific benefits from the sustainable use, conservation and study of biodiversity resources.



BGCI Appoints New Director of US Office

BGCI has appointed Dan Shepherd as the new Director of its BGCI - US office. Dan brings a commitment to plant conservation and a remarkable set of abilities that will support BGCI-US in developing and implementing conservation initiatives around the country. In his most recent position as Resource Conservation Coordinator at the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Dan managed resource and plant conservation programs.

In addition to his strong background in conservation efforts, Dan possesses a diverse blend of talent and leadership experience. Museum Research Summit Planned For Ottawa, 6-8 January 2005

An important meeting will be held in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, 6-8 January 2005. The Museum Research Summit, organized by the Canadian Museums Association (CMA), has as its goals to strengthen the roles and capacities of all types of museums in Canada for research. At the summit participants will be asked to take part in forging the first steps toward a "comprehensive action plan aimed at ensuring the future strength and relevance of museum research in Canada."

This will be an important meeting for all institutions involved in collections and research in Canada, whether they are "museums" in the popular concept or are botanical gardens or others striving to serve as public interpreters and curators of cultural or natural diversity, living or not. Botanical gardens in Canada need to have a voice at this summit and I urge members of the arboretum and botanical garden community in Canada to participate if they can.

It is also clear from the very topic of this summit that other sectors within the broader museum community in Canada are facing many of the same challenges as are botanical gardens and are seeking a common response, facilitated by CMA. Botanical gardens, arboreta, herbaria and other institutions working with living or preserved collections representing biological diversity should be engaged in this dialogue and the action plan and other initiatives that emerge from it.
