

The Missouri Botanical Garden maintains one of the nation's largest orchid collections, with over 8,100 individual plants in hundreds of varieties. Found on six continents, orchids are the largest family of flowering plants in the world, with some 30,000 to 35,000 species - nearly 10 percent of all flowering plants! While only a few hundred orchid species grow in North America, thousands more grow in tropical countries like Ecuador and Costa Rica. Orchids face many risks in the wild, including overcollection by humans and climate change. The Garden is continuing its decades-long work around the world to document and protect orchids and other at-risk plants and entire ecosystems.

## **Putting Your Garden** to Bed - MBG

Many gardening practices are best done in the fall, others are best left until late winter or early spring, and others can be done at most any time of year. In this session, Mike will address the proper timing of garden practices and focus on those "putting to bed" activities which will benefit your garden the most. He will dispel myths and give you insight into plant processes which will add to your gardening knowledge, skill and enjoyment.

Conserva) Sacred Seeds The William L. Brown Center (WLBC) at the Missouri Botanical Garden is embarking on an effort to preserve biodiversity and traditional plant knowledge. The program, Sacred Seeds, is a network of living gardens around the world containing locally important plants, including those of medicinal, ceremonial, food crop, and craft value. For millennia, medicinal herbs have sustained traditional societies, but today, over-harvesting, deforestation, and global climate change threaten 70,000 medicinal plants. It's estimated that 80 percent of the population in developing countries still relies on medicinal herbs to meet primary health-care needs. Medicinal herbs have also inspired many pharmaceuticals on which we rely today. Sacred Seeds is working to save and steward these important plant sanctuaries here in the U.S. and in communities around the world.

## Conservation **Botanical Illustrations** Rich in history, the basic purpose of botanical illustrations has always been to assist people - botanists, physicians, naturalists, and avid gardeners - in plant identification. Precise descriptions play a critical role in helping list and describe the world's plant species a goal towards which the Missouri Botanical Garden and others are still diligently working. To date, science has identified nearly 400,000 plant species, but many more have yet to be discovered. ## Conservation Chocolate Did you know that "cacao" refers to the plant, while "cocoa" is the name for the beverage (made from the seeds of the cacao plant)? Cocoa was a stimulating drink for native inhabitants of the New World long before Europeans arrived. The Mayans thought that it had a divine origin. The Aztecs added red pepper and spices to their cocoa and then dissolved tablets of it in hot water. Its genus - Theobroma - means "food of the gods." Cocoa became popular in Europe after the discovery of adding sugar. When the addition of milk became common, its popularity soared. It was all the rage by the mid-17th century, and the popularity of cocoa and chocolate continues to grow. Today, Garden botanists and conservationists are working in Ghana and tropical regions in South America to protect habitats in which cacao is grown and harvested.


