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MELBOURNE

Melbourne is an arty powerhouse with a vibrant and multicultural soul. Nicknamed "Paris of the southern hemisphere," Melbourne is not only known to be Australia's cultural hot-spot, but is also famous for its major sport events and its culinary delights from all across the world. With its high rising city centre and far stretching suburbs, it is hard not to be dragged in by the life of the capital of Victoria—"the place to be"—but daytrips to the wild nature of the state are also extremely attractive.

THE CITY



Melbourne is the second-largest city in Australia and is known to be Australia's most cultured city—although some Sydney-siders would contest this. The city's main features are museums, galleries and theatres, large green areas, and the Yarra River flowing across the urban centre.

Melbourne has seen wave after wave of immigrants, with Italians, Greeks, Chinese and Vietnamese all adding ingredients to the cultural and culinary mix. And there's the sports-mad, of course. Each year, Melbourne lays host to some of the world's major international sports events such as the Australian Open in tennis, and Formula 1 racing.

The city developed during the height of the Victorian gold rush in the late 1800s, which is shown in the Victorian-era architecture in some neighbourhoods. However, developments over the years have also left their mark, recently with the new and modern Federation Square complex, and the Docklands re-development. But, probably, the most famous characteristic of Melbourne is the television series 'Neighbours' recorded here and broadcasted across the world for more than 20 years.

If you fancy a trip out of the city, Melbourne is also a great base for 1-2 day tours to, for example, the Grampians National Park, the Great Ocean Road with

the Twelve Apostles, local wineries, or to observe the masses of penguins on Phillip Island coming home from the day at sea. Enjoy your stay in what many claim is the hippest city in the southern hemisphere.

DO & SEE



It is not without reason that Melbourne is often dubbed the world's most livable city, because the vibrant metropolis has plenty of attractions to visit and landmarks to see. Here are some of the main attractions that will show you the parts of Melbourne that the city is so famous for.

SHOPPING



Melbourne is a centre for art, music and theatre as much as it is for designer shopping. Its neighbourhoods have evolved distinctive identities, from fashion-conscious South Yarra to retro Fitzroy, funky St. Kilda by the bay to the bargain-shopping inner hub of Richmond.

The markets in Melbourne are an attraction of themselves. The Queen Victoria Market is the largest open-air market in the southern hemisphere, selling everything there is to find under the sun. It is located on the corner of Victoria and Peel streets and is open every day. The Prahran Market is the city's best food market and is a great place to grab some delicious lunch. The market is open Tuesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Sunday and can be found on 163-185 Commercial Road, Prahran. The South Melbourne Market is a general market with mainly food products and is

situated on the corner of Cecil and Coventry streets, South Melbourne. It is open on Wednesdays and Friday-Sundays. Docklands, Melbourne's first harbour-side market, is open from 11am-5pm every Saturday. Visitors will be able to stroll along the harbour-side promenade and stock up on organic produce, beautiful handcrafts and other treasures.

Melbourne's two main department stores, David Jones and Myer, are housed in the Bourke Street Mall in the centre of the city. The department stores stock typically Australian products. The best goods to look out for are woollen garments, bush gear, handcrafted jewellery (particularly opals), woodwork design and ceramics. There are also scores of other shops in and around the area on Lonsdale and Swanston streets. Melbourne Central – another shopping paradise - can be found on the corner of LaTrobe and Swanston streets offering young and funky labels. Little Bourke Street is famous for its hub of outdoor gear shops. Elizabeth Street is a great choice for cameras, computers and Hi-Fi equipment. Watch out for the numerous laneways branching off Little Collins Street for some of the best-hidden treats. Retro fashion, exclusive one-off boutiques and heaps of cafés to slake your can be found on Flinders Lane.

Brunswick Street is also a popular place to go shopping with plenty of specialty boutiques and vintage clothing stores mixed among funky record shops and retro furniture stores. It's your best bet for Melbourne-specific designs and artistic creations.

Last but not least, no Melbourne shopping trip would be complete without a visit to the infamous Chapel Street where young and independent designers have their outlets. The exclusive shops along Toorak Road offer the latest designer labels

where, between star-spottings, you can pick up the latest fashions.

Public transport

Trains cover the city centre and suburban areas with Flinders Street Station as the main hub and run from 5am-midnight. Trams cover the city and inner suburbs and run every 6-8 minutes, but less frequently on late nights and weekends. Buses cover the whole city and suburbia. A Metcard can be used on all services and can be bought in stations, in shops carrying the Met flag or online. A daily

Metcard costs from A\$6.10-12.60 depending on the zones.

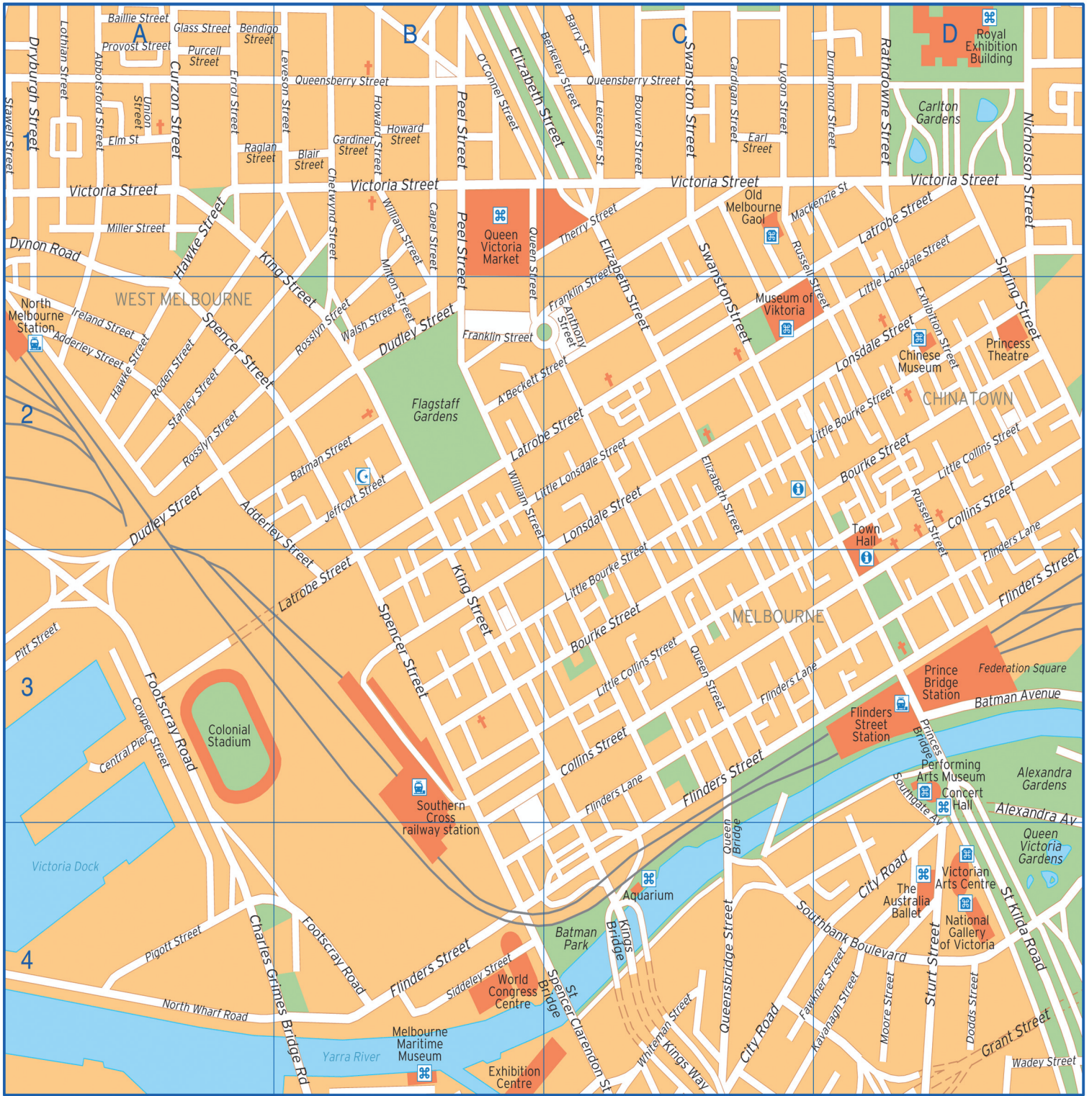
