PARLIAMENTARY QUESTION No 291741 on how many visas have been rescinded on the grounds that a spouse signed under duress or threat of violence; and what steps his Department takes against the perpetrators of such duress or violence.

You tabled the above Parliamentary Question and I undertook to write to you with a substantive answer.

The UK Border Agency cannot identify from its central records how many visas have been revoked for a particular reason.

Leave to enter (LTE) may be curtailed after a person has used their visa and arrived in the UK. Whilst the UK Border Agency keeps a record of cases where LTE as a spouse has been curtailed, it cannot identify from its records how many of these cases involved curtailment of LTE on the grounds that the UK spouse was coerced into sponsoring the overseas spouse's visa application. The numbers are, however, very low, as very few UK sponsors in this situation are willing to make a public statement withdrawing their support for their spouse's application. The joint FCO/Home Office Forced Marriage Unit (FMU), set up in 2005 to help victims of forced marriage and those at risk of being forced into marriage, has so far this year dealt with 14 cases involving curtailment of LTE.

The FMU works closely with the Association of Chief Police Officers and, where an individual discloses that they have been threatened with violence, they advise them to notify the police who can determine whether to take further action.
