As Director General for the Office for National Statistics, I have been asked to reply to your recent Parliamentary Question asking what the average weekly gross earnings of full-time (a) men, (b) women and (c) people in York were (i) in 1996-97 and (ii) at the latest data for which figures are available (A) in cash terms and (B) at constant prices. (321695)

Average levels of earnings are estimated from the Annual Survey of Hours and Earnings (ASHE), and are provided for all employees on adult rates of pay whose pay for the survey period was not affected by absence. The ASHE, carried out in April each year, is the most comprehensive source of earnings information in the United Kingdom.

I attach a table showing the median gross weekly earnings for full-time, male full-time and female full-time employees for the York unitary authority area for the years 1997 and 2009, the earliest and latest periods for which figures are available. The all-items Retail Prices Index for April of each year has been used to calculate the equivalent constant price estimates.
