I am writing to provide information in response to the Parliamentary Question below which you tabled on 19 November 2010.

To ask the Secretary of State for Culture, Olympics, Media and Sport, how much English Heritage spent on preparing its report on the economic impact of heritage in Yorkshire and the Humber. [26037]

English Heritage spent £53,991 on a report into the economic impact of heritage in Yorkshire and the Humber. The report was commissioned by English Heritage on behalf of the Yorkshire and Humber Historic Environment Forum because decision makers in the region had identified a lack of hard evidence on the contribution made by the historic environment to the region's economy. The report's findings – that the Gross Value Added impact of the region's heritage assets is around £3.1 billion per annum, over 15% of the total regional GVA – are being used to inform decision making on economic development and regeneration in the region.
