Lula and Wade in Opposite Corners

The liberal doctrines imposed on the world's poorest countries no longer have a place in modern societies, says former president of Brazil, Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva. "The world economic order will no longer be shaped by a few dominant economies," he said. On his part, President Wade clearly presented himself as a defender of economic liberalisation. "I am a supporter of the market economy and not the state-run economy which has failed everywhere or near it in the world," he said, adding "I have followed your movement and I still ask - excuse my frankness - have you succeeded in changing the world at the global level?"
