Dear Friends,

Your support of the Georgia Republican Party (GAGOP) during the 2010 election cycle helped us make unprecedented gains in our state. On November 2nd, 2010 we were able to add a Republican to our Congressional Delegation, retain the Governor's Office, elect Republicans to every Constitutional Office, and grow our Republican majorities in the Georgia General Assembly.

The GAGOP's many accomplishments are chronicled throughout this brochure. My hope is that this publication can be used in the future as a resource and example of the planning and strategic efforts that enabled the GAGOP to have a maximum impact during this election cycle.

I've often been asked why individuals should support the GAGOP when they can just give to candidates directly. The answer is clear: the GAGOP is the only organization in the state solely dedicated to electing Republican candidates from the top of the ticket to the bottom. On January 10th, 2011, Nathan Deal was inaugurated as the 82nd Governor of Georgia. Governor Deal launched his bid for the office in May 2009 to a crowd of more than 500 supporters in his hometown of Gainesville. 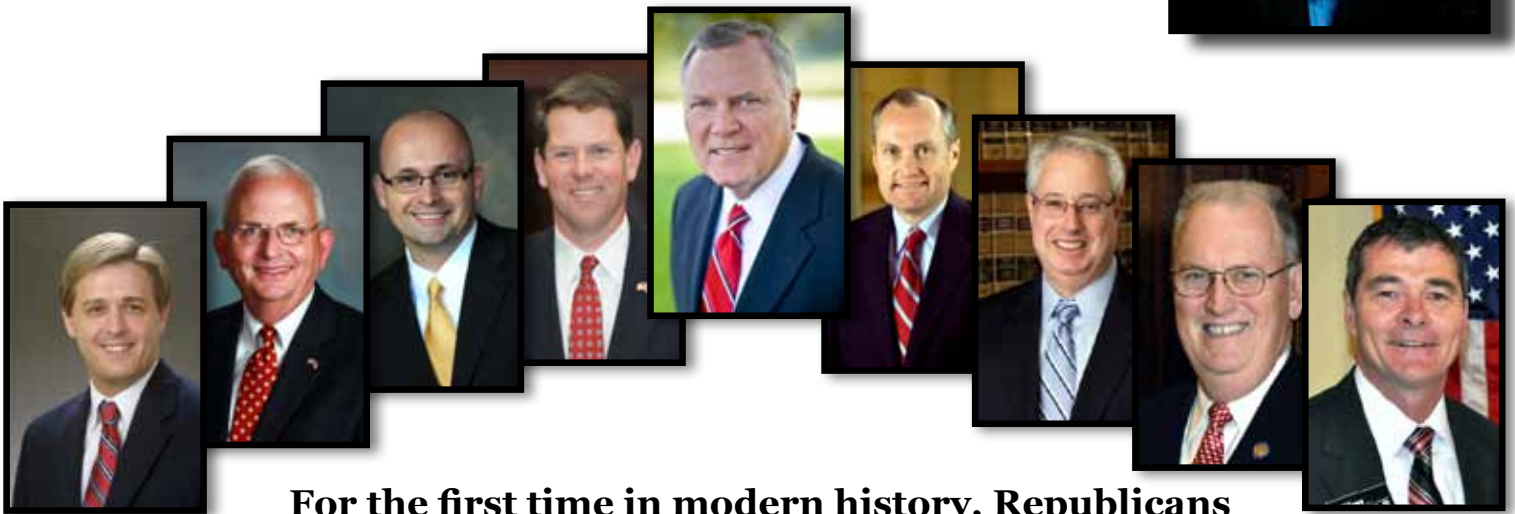

Astounding Victories, Historic Gains

U.S. Senator Johnny Isakson has been a fundamental part of building the Republican majority in Georgia. Prior to serving as a U.S. Congressman and then a Senator, Isakson served in the minority leadership of both houses of the Georgia General Assembly. Senator Isakson's re-election campaign and his margin of victory proved him to be one of the most beloved public figures in Georgia history. Georgians cast the most votes for a single candidate in the state's history during a non-Presidential General Election for Senator Isakson with 1,489,904. Senator Isakson won his second term with an impressive 58% of the vote.



For the first time in modern history, Republicans swept all of Georgia's statewide elected offices.

The Republican sweep on November 2nd, 2010 was a landmark achievement for a state that was not-too-distantly considered to be solidly blue. Nathan Deal, Casey Cagle, Brian Kemp, Sam Olens, John Barge, Ralph Hudgens, Gary Black, Mark Butler, and Tim Echols made up the victorious statewide Republican ticket. Winning by an average of 331,942 votes, this election was certainly a mandate. In fact, Gary Black won 131 of the 159 counties in his bid to be Georgia's first Republican Commissioner of Agriculture. And, in his first bid for statewide office, Mark Butler became the state's first elected Republican Labor Commissioner, garnering the largest margin of victory in the race since Republicans began consistently fielding candidates in 1994.

Building our majorities in the Georgia General Assembly

The Georgia Republican Senate Caucus successfully defended all of the Republican-held seats and increased its majority to 36 out of the 56 total members.

In Georgia Senate races, voters chose Republicans over Democrats by a 570,332 vote margin (1,417,304 to 846,972). In Georgia House races, the vote margin was 436,851 (1,323,754 to 886,903).

Speaker David Ralston and the Georgia House Republican Caucus reached an historic Republican majority when three additional members were elected to represent formerly Democratic-held districts.



The Pundits Didn't Expect Us to Win

Eighth Congressional District



Austin Scott-52.7%
Jim Marshall-47.3%

Republicans have targeted Georgia's Eighth Congressional District since Jim Marshall first won the seat in 2002. Formerly an Airborne Ranger and the Mayor of Macon, Marshall possessed high name identification and a substantial war chest. Many seasoned experts predicted a substantial Marshall victory as late as April 2010.

After being recruited by the GAGOP for this race, State Representative Austin Scott waged an aggressive campaign by building an impressive ground-game in combination with a strategic media effort. His campaign focused on Marshall's support of Speaker Nancy Pelosi and the need to get the economy moving again. On Election Night, Scott beat Marshall by over 10,000 votes and carried 17 of the 21 counties in the district. Already making an impact in Washington, Scott was elected as the President of the freshman class of the 112th U.S. Congress.



State House District 38



Sam Teasley-56.8%
Pat Dooley-43.2%

In 2008, Democrat Pat Dooley returned to the Georgia House by receiving 8,448 out of 16,412 votes cast in her election. When Sam Teasley entered the race, he was taking on one of Georgia's Democratic stalwarts.

Sam combined a proven commitment to his community with a straightforward and trustworthy reputation to mount one of the most aggressive campaigns in 2010. During the campaign, Teasley personally knocked on over 4,000 doors. After an impressive win, Representative Teasley is now one of the rising stars in the Georgia General Assembly this legislative session.



State House District 143



Matt Hatchett-54.7%
Pablo Santamaria-45.3%

Since 1983, Democratic House Minority Leader Dubose Porter has represented House District 143. In one of the most surprising House races this fall, well-known businessman Matt Hatchett ran as a Republican. A native of Laurens County, Hatchett had established a reputation for consensus building while serving on the Dublin City Council since 1999.

On Election Night, Hatchett stunned the pundits and won by 1,307 votes (54.7 percent). When 2011-2012 legislative session began, House District 143 was represented by a Republican for the first time since Reconstruction.

Laying the Groundwork for Victory: The Partnership of the GAGOP and its Grassroots Network

Georgia's Republican victories did not occur in a vacuum. In 2009, the GAGOP began implementing a strategic plan that resulted in the historic outcome of November 2nd, 2010. Nine GAGOP field staff members were dedicated to organizing volunteers and GOTV efforts in offices across the state. Our successes were a direct result of the hard and focused work of our grassroots partners across Georgia.



134 county parties and 13 congressional district committees partnered with the GAGOP on community outreach programs that encouraged voter participation. Through great teamwork, the GAGOP was able to facilitate the efforts of the grassroots network across Georgia. Together, we were able to execute the following landmark efforts:

- 24 cities visited on the “Real Jobs for Georgia Bus Tour”
- More than 20,000 voters engaged through 19 surveys
- More than 100,000 yard signs distributed to the attendees of the “Kick-off to Victory Rally”
- 250,000 door hangers distributed door-to-door, directly to candidates and to potential Republican voters at craft shows, fairs, football games and festivals
- More than 700,000 volunteer phone calls placed
- More than 5,000,000 direct voter contacts through mailers and autodialing technology
- In total, more than \$5,000,000 was spent towards the unprecedented Republican victories on November 2nd

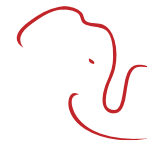

Firing Up the Troops: Strengthening and Educating our Grassroots

Republican Round-Up

In an effort to ensure the utmost preparation for the General Election, the Georgia Republican Party trained over 250 grassroots activists and candidates at this weekend-long event in May of 2010. Attendees learned how to best utilize new media, coalitions, grassroots organizations and Voter Vault. Candidates also learned about advertising, media relations and legal compliance. Instructors included seasoned political consultants and members of the Republican National Committee's staff.



In addition to the training classes, the Republican Round-Up included a dinner featuring Republican National Committee Chairman Michael Steele and a breakfast with former Presidential Advisor Karl Rove.

Small Business Town Hall Meeting

The Georgia Republican Party partnered with the Republican National Committee to sponsor a Small Business Town Hall Meeting. Then-candidates Gary Black, Mark Butler, John Barge and Mike Keown answered questions regarding government policies that affect small businesses.

The moderators for the event included GAGOP Coalitions Chairman Vicki Willard, Senate Economic Development Committee Chairman Chip Pearson, and the Metro Atlanta Chamber's Small Business Growth Council Vice President Pat Gartland.

The purpose of the event was to raise awareness of the relationship between economic development and legislation. Over 150 Georgia small business owners and employees were in attendance.





Kick-Off to Victory Rally

In an effort to effectively distribute candidate yard signs to every corner of the state, the GAGOP held a “Kick-off to Victory Rally” in September. Over 100,000 yard signs were distributed by the GAGOP to county and district chairmen, state committee members and grassroots activists at the rally held in Gwinnett.

The GAGOP carefully allotted each area of the state a specific number of signs according to population density. The goal was to maximize the impact of each sign that was dispersed.

With many of the candidates present to give rousing speeches to the crowd, this event served as the true kick-off to an all-out campaign season.

Real Jobs for Georgia Bus Tour



The “Real Jobs for Georgia Bus Tour” served as the final push for statewide exposure of the Republican ticket. With an emphasis on job creation and economic development, over 20 candidates including Senator Johnny Isakson and Nathan Deal visited 24 Georgia cities during the five day tour.

Sponsored by the Georgia Republican Party, the bus tour gave federal and state candidates an opportunity to meet face-to-face with Georgia voters in some of the critical last days of the campaign.

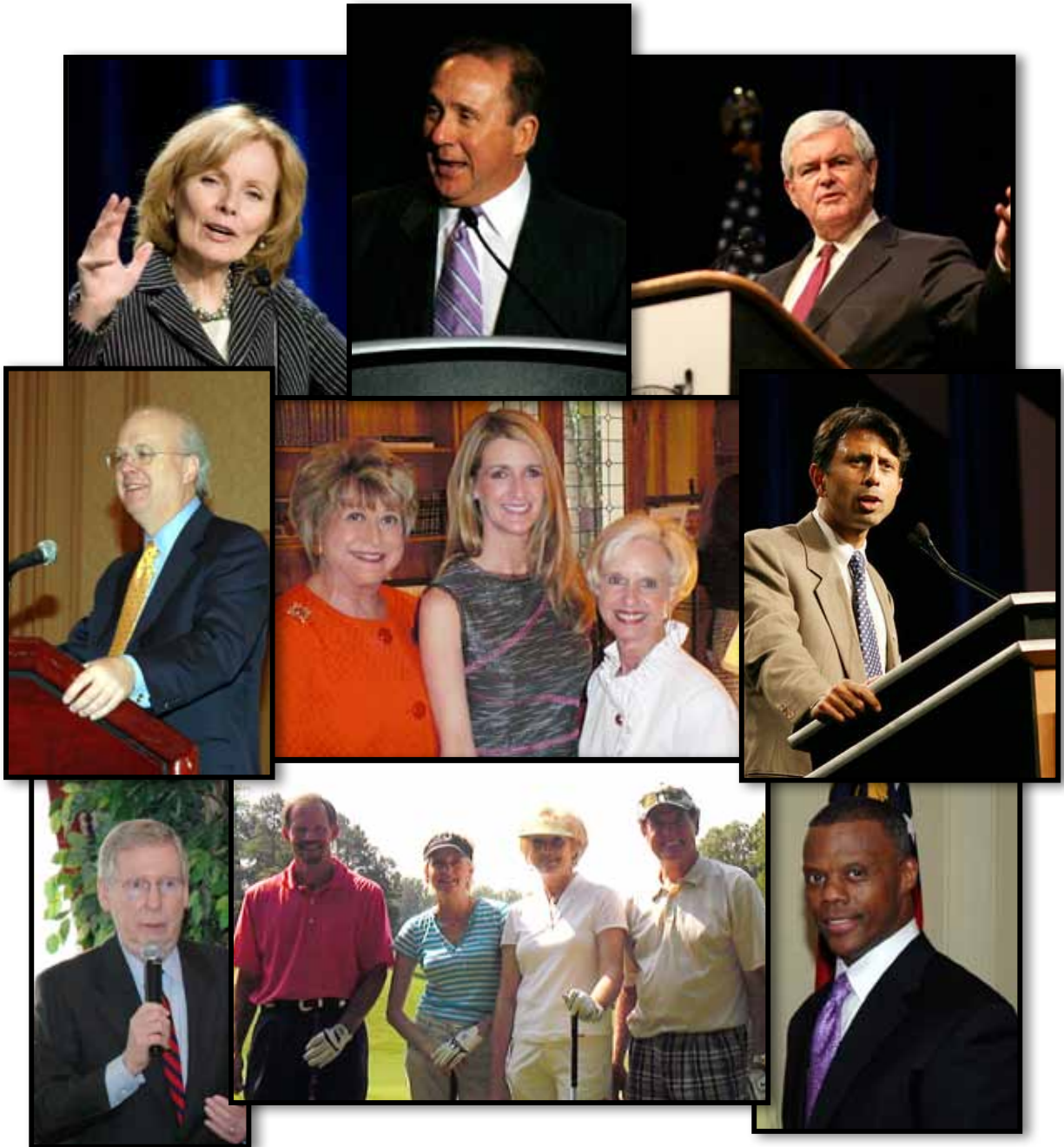

21st Century Politics: Technology & the Social Media Effect

Since the beginning of 2009, the GAGOP's IT system has evolved from mismatched and aging pieces to a sleek and unified system. Dell and Cisco components were chosen for their reliability, sturdiness, and reputation. Storage, network, processor, and memory capacities were all upgraded. The phone system, which was aged well past 14 years, was replaced with a VOIP system that allows for future expansion. The core equipment was moved to a co-location facility and plugged into a fiber backbone that allows for significant traffic. The GAGOP now has a top-of-the-line IT infrastructure.

The Georgia Republican Party implemented an aggressive social media and technology strategy across multiple platforms. Efforts included a redesigned, interactive website; frequent postings on Twitter and Facebook; a site dedicated to documenting Democratic gubernatorial candidate Roy Barnes; and an innovative newsletter featuring elected officials and grassroots groups that was distributed to over 150,000 Georgians.

The Georgia Republican Party met and exceeded its goals, increasing support in its online communities by over 500 percent. In fact, in July of 2010 the GAGOP website was the most visited state committee site in the U.S. and our Twitter account pulled in the most new followers in October of 2010.



“We saw the importance of social media in the 2008 election when Republicans were too late to take advantage,” said Chairman Sue Everhart. “We wanted to connect with voters early and inspire them to stay active throughout the election cycle.”



Direct Mail: Establishing the Message

The Georgia Republican Party engaged in an active voter outreach campaign that ensured every potential Republican voter in the state received multiple contacts regarding our candidates as well as reminders to vote. Political mail pieces, absentee ballot request forms, and reminders to return absentee ballots were all used as part of the GAGOP's direct mail initiative.

Utilizing mail coupled with television, radio, telephone, and volunteer contact the GAGOP reached targeted Republican voters an average of eight times before the November 2nd election. Through a sophisticated micro-targeting effort, the GAGOP was able to focus its resources in key areas and to specific demographic groups. These efforts drove candidate name ID, issue awareness, and helped voter turnout reach the level needed to secure the sweeping Republican wins.

GAGOP Election Law Team: Ensuring Fair Elections

On Election Day 2010, dedicated GOP lawyers from around the state offered their time and talent to staff the GAGOP's Election Day legal operations. These lawyers, along with several law students and paralegals, worked from dawn to well past midnight on Election Day to ensure that elections were conducted fairly and that all eligible voters were allowed to vote.

Since its inception in the late 1990's, the Election Law Team (ELT) has grown tremendously in both size and scope. What started as a group of election lawyers willing to give many hours before, on and after Election Day, has grown into a diverse group of lawyers with all kinds of practices who are dedicated to fair elections, willing to learn about election law and then work on the hotline or in other election activities.

Beginning early last year, the State Party began recruiting volunteers, while members of the ELT were updating litigation documents that might be necessary on Election Day. The State Party continued to add to its litigation databank with documents created locally and by the RNC. As Election Day drew closer, the State Party and its General Counsel, Anne Lewis, participated in weekly calls with the RNC on legal issues related to Election Day.

In October, the leaders of the ELT trained the volunteers. The training included a basic primer on elections in Georgia, instruction on the common errors and resolution of those errors on Election Day and a discussion of the abnormalities that are not the result of error but of fraud. Members of the ELT learned how to handle calls on the hotline and how to deal with problems in the field, if the ELT member was working as a statewide or local poll watcher.

On Election Day, ELT members began arriving at the State Party headquarters before dawn and were manning the hotline by 7:00 am when the polls opened. The GAGOP provided a phone bank, laptops and all technology necessary for operation of the hotline, along with food and beverages for the volunteers. Volunteers received complaints and concerns via the hotline, email and text messaging. All of the contacts were logged and displayed on a running screen so that the volunteers could see the types of complaints coming in, the resolution of those complaints and which complaints were still open. Lawyers manned the hotline until the last poll closed in the state.

Following the poll closings, ELT members manned tabulation centers in various areas of the state, monitoring returns and observing the counting of absentee ballots. This group was led by Matt Mashburn, who stayed in the Second Congressional District until the wee hours of Wednesday morning.

Following Election Day, another group of the ELT worked on recount issues. This group compiled all the races in which a recount request was possible under the law, had regular contact with the parties involved and provided checklists for recounts to those who faced one.

Finally, the contests group of the ELT was ready to work on contests if any arose. This year, happily, the victories were decisive enough that the group ended up having no further work.

In early December, Chairman Sue Everhart hosted a lunch honoring the members of the ELT who contributed their expertise and time at no cost to the Party. Members were presented with certificates and enjoyed hearing from the newly-re-elected Secretary of State and Chief Elections Officer, Brian Kemp.

Chairman Everhart again extends her thanks to all of the Election Law Team and extends special recognition to those who organized and managed the team: General Counsel Anne Lewis, Deputy General Counsel Stefan Passantino, Matt Mashburn, Ray Smith and Bryan Tyson. The ELT will be back in full force in 2012!

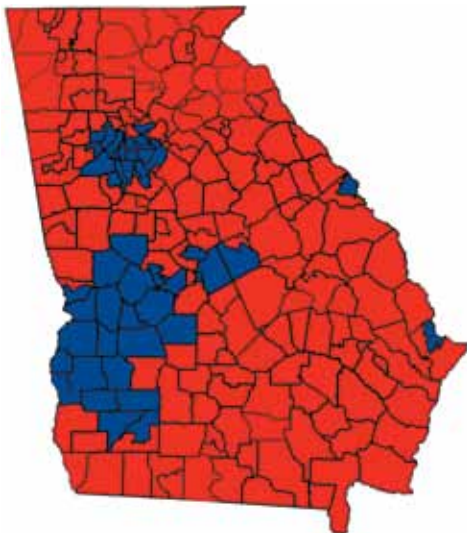

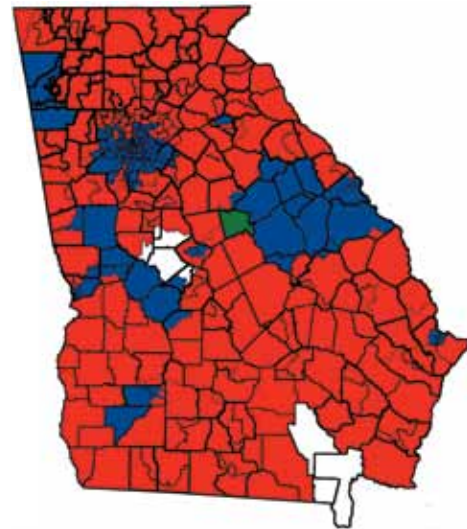
