HEAD COACH



When athletic director Jeremy Foley began his search for the University of Florida's next head football coach, he knew exactly what he was looking for in a coach: someone familiar with the Southeastern Conference, a coach who had competed on the big stage, a relentless recruiter who was familiar with the state of Florida and the SEC and someone with energy and passion. From the very beginning, the search honed in on one person and on December 11, 2010, former Gainesville native Will Muschamp was introduced by Foley as the 23rd head coach in Florida football history.

“It was very, very clear early on that this was the guy we wanted to bring to Gainesville to lead our football program and build on the wonderful foundation that's been left here by Urban Meyer,” said Foley at Muschamp's introductory press conference.

Muschamp, 39, came to UF after being the coach-in-waiting and defensive coordi-

prize in 2003 while defensive coordinator at LSU, and coached in a third BCS bowl game following the 2008 season, when Texas won the Fiesta Bowl. In addition to his national championship past, Muschamp has coached in the SEC Championship Game twice and in the Big 12 Championship Game once, coming out on the winning side in each of those three contests.

nator at the University of Texas since November 2008. He brings 16 years of coaching experience with him, including 12 years in the SEC, eight as a coach and four as a player at the University of Georgia. Muschamp has also served as defensive coordinator at Auburn University (2006-07) and LSU (2002-04; he was LSU's linebackers coach in 2001) and was a finalist for the 2007 Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. The son of a football coach, he turned down appointments at West Point and Annapolis to become a four-year letterman as a safety at the University of Georgia from 1991-94, where he was voted defensive co-captain as a senior.

“This is a dream come true to be the head coach of the Florida Gators,” said Muschamp, who spent nine of his childhood living on 22nd Street in this city. “I grew up watching the Gators and whatever other SEC team was on television. I have great memories watching SEC football with my father on Saturdays and playing football in the back yard with my two brothers right here in Gainesville.”

Not only does Muschamp, a highly-respected coach among both his peers and his players, bring collegiate and National Football League experience back to Gainesville, he also brings a wealth of big-game experience. He has coached in two national championship games, winning the ultimate

In his five seasons as an SEC defensive coordinator, Muschamp's defenses ranked among the nation's top 10 in total defense every single year, while always maintaining a top-15 rating in scoring defense, including three times inside the top 10.

In four of his eight seasons overall as a Division I defensive coordinator, the high-energy coach's team has allowed less than 100 rushing yards per game and has twice yielded less than 75 rushing yards per game. His 2003 LSU defense was third in the country by allowing 67 yards per game on the ground, the best mark by an SEC team in the 2000s, while Texas gave up just 72.3 yards on the ground in 2009 to pace the nation.

From 2008-10 under Muschamp's guidance, the Texas defense ranked No. 1 in the nation with 119 sacks for 949 yards lost. His unit also ranked in the top 10 nationally during the same time frame in several other major categories, allowing 2.9 yards per rushing attempt (third), 96.7 rushing yards per game (fourth), 297.4 yards per game (seventh), all of which are Big 12 bests during that span. He also helped the Longhorns' defense to top-20 rankings during his tenure at Texas, with 650 first downs allowed (18th) and a 114.3 pass efficiency defense (20th).

In 2009, the Texas Longhorns advanced to the BCS National Championship Game

as Muschamp's charges gave up just 73.1 rushing yards per game, the best figure by any BCS school from 2008-10. The Longhorns also led the nation in third-down defense (26.5 percent), turnovers created (37, tied with Ohio University) and interceptions (25) as Texas claimed the Big 12 championship in 2009.

Under Muschamp's tutelage at Texas, Brian Orakpo claimed the 2008 Rotary Lombardi Award (lineman of the year), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (most outstanding defensive player) and Ted Hendricks Award (top defensive end), while the Longhorns' defense saw Sergio Kindle become the first player in college football history to be named a finalist for both the Butkus Award (nation's top linebacker) and the Hendricks Award. Earl Thomas also earned finalist honors for the Jim Thorpe Award in 2009. In 2010, defensive end Sam Acho was named the winner of the William V. Campbell Trophy, awarded to college football's top student-athlete for combined academic success, football performance and exemplary community leadership.

In the last three NFL Drafts, Muschamp had a combined 11 players drafted, including nine in the first four rounds and two first-rounders in Orakpo and Thomas.

In a two-year stint as the defensive coordi-

nator at Auburn from 2006-07, Muschamp's defense ranked third in the nation in scoring defense (15.4 points per game) and fourth in the nation pass defense (170.7 pass yards per game). During the same time frame, Auburn ranked third in the SEC in total defense by holding opponents to 295.1 yards per game.

Muschamp's first full-time coaching experience in the SEC came at LSU as the linebackers coach for one season before being elevated to defensive coordinator from 2002-04. His 2003 defense helped

the Tigers to the national championship by leading the nation both in scoring defense (11.0 points per game) and total defense (252.0 yards per game), while finishing second nationally in pass efficiency defense (89.8) and third in rushing defense (67.0 yards per game). The Tigers allowed just 19 touchdowns all season in 2003, three less than the next closest competitor nationally.

Between his positions at LSU and Auburn, Muschamp spent a season with the NFL's Miami Dolphins in 2005 as Assistant Head Coach for Defense. He helped the Dolphins finish second in the league with 49 sacks, while leading Miami to top-10 finishes with 4.7 yards per play (seventh), 3.7 yards per rush (seventh) and 6.0 yards per pass (ninth).

The 1994 graduate of the University of Georgia moved immediately into coaching following his collegiate playing career, working as a graduate assistant at Auburn from 1995-96, earning his master's degree in 1996. He became a secondary coach at West Georgia (1998) and Eastern Kentucky (1999) before moving on to his first defensive coordinator position at Valdosta State for the 2000 season, where

he helped the Blazers to a 10-2 record and the Gulf South Conference championship with an 8-1 league mark.

In his playing career at Georgia, Muschamp earned his way from walk-on to scholarship player by the spring of his redshirt freshman season and eventually

was named co-captain for his senior season. He also earned a spot on the SEC Academic Honor Roll in 1993.

DE PATRICK KERNEY – Coached the two-time Pro Bowler in the last season of his 11-year career, as Kerney played 15 games and picked up five sacks.

- Offensive line coach of the 2009 Notre Dame team that had the second-most passing yards in school history with 3,882. Coached two offensive linemen that were selected in the NFL Draft and made active rosters.

two seasons, the most in a two-year period for the Fighting Irish since 1992-93. Under Weis' guidance, Notre Dame reached BCS Bowl Games in back-to-back seasons, earning a Fiesta Bowl bid in 2005 and a trip to the Sugar Bowl in 2006.

- Weis demonstrated his ability to tutor quarterbacks with the Fighting Irish as well, as Brady Quinn (3,919 yards in 2005) and Jimmy Clausen (3,722 yards in 2009) put up the two most prolific passing seasons in Notre Dame history.
- Wide receiver Golden Tate also established eye-popping numbers under Weis, setting a Notre Dame record with 2,707 career receiving yards and taking home the 2009 Biletnikoff Award as the top receiver in the country. Tate also set single-season school records in 2009 with 93 receptions and 1,496 yards and a school record-tying 15 touchdown grabs.
- During Weis' five-year stay with the Patriots from 2000-04, the club won three Super Bowls in a four-year span, only the second team in NFL history to accomplish the feat. New England was 53-27 (.663) during Weis' five-year tenure and had a 9-0 playoff record. New England won 32 of its final 34 games during Weis' second tenure with the team and finished the 2004 season on a 20-game home winning streak.
- Over Tom Brady's first four seasons as a starter in the NFL (2001-04), he ranked fourth in the NFL with 97 passing touchdowns and earned Super Bowl MVP honors in two of New England's three championship victories, while wide receiver Deion Branch earned the other. The Patriots produced two straight 14-2 seasons in 2003-04, each capped by winning the Super Bowl, and New England rushed for 2,134 yards in 2004, the team's highest total since 1985.
- In 2001, Weis' second season as New England's offensive coordinator, he added the responsibility of quarterbacks coach after the death of Dick Rehbein in August of that year.

Weis filled both roles for New England in both the 2001 and 2002 seasons. During the second game of the 2001 season, starter Drew Bledsoe was injured, and Brady stepped in to help the team achieve its first Super Bowl championship.

- From 1997-99, the Trenton, N.J., native spent three seasons on staff with the N.Y. Jets, working under head coach Bill Parcells. Weis came on staff as the wide receivers coach and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1998. That season, the Jets advanced the AFC Championship Game for the first time since 1982.
- In Weis' first stint with the Patriots, he helped the club earn its second AFC Championship in team history, reaching the Super Bowl following the 1996 season. Over the four years of his first tour with New England, Weis coached tight ends (1993-94), running backs (1995) and wide receivers (1996), helping players like Ben Coates, Curtis Martin and Terry Glenn emerge as playmakers.
- Weis first broke into the NFL as an assistant on Parcells' N.Y. Giants staff from 1990-92, as a defensive/special teams assistant in 1990 and as running backs coach in 1991-92. In his first season with the team, the Giants won the Super Bowl. He then helped Rodney Hampton to a pair of 1,000-yard rushing seasons.
- Weis spent time working in the Giants' pro personnel department in 1989 before joining the team on a full-time basis. While doing that, he served as head coach at Township (N.J.) High School and led the team to the state championship.
- From 1985-88, Weis worked as an assistant at South Carolina. He began his coaching career at Boonton (N.J.) High School in 1979 before serving five seasons at Morristown (N.J.) High School (1980-84).
- In 2003, Weis and his wife Maura created the Hannah & Friends Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and adults with special needs. The foundation funds Hannah's Helping Hands, which provides quality of life grants to families across the country who care for children and adults with special needs. The Weis family opened the Hannah and Friends Neighborhood, a 40-acre facility north of South Bend, Ind., that provides much-needed housing and care services for adults with special needs.
- In the spring of 2008, Weis traveled to the Middle East as part of a contingent of college football coaches who were visiting military personnel stationed in the region.



Gainesville, Fla. – The No. 4/3 Florida Gators opened the 2010 football season with a 34-12 victory over the Miami University RedHawks, debuting seven new starters in front of a crowd of 90,178, the fourth-largest crowd for a season-opener in school history. Redshirt junior quarterback John Brantley made his first career start for the Gators and went 17-for-25 for 113 yards and tossed two touchdown passes while connecting with five different receivers. The Gators defense came up big, picking off four passes on the game, returning one for a touchdown while scoring or setting up 21 of UF's 34 points. In the second quarter, cornerback Janoris Jenkins kicked things into high gear after snagging the Gators' second interception and first score of the game. Safety Ahmad Black captured the third interception of the first half and finished it with a 40-yard return to the MU 3-yard-line to keep the defense rolling for the Gators.

Gainesville, Fla. – The No. 8 Florida Gators' first meeting with USF resulted in a 38-14 victory in front of a crowd of 90,612 in The Swamp. The win extended the Gators regular season win streak to 22 games. The Gators' defense pulled off a second consecutive four-interception game as three different Gators combined for the four interceptions which set up 21 of the Gators' 38 points. John Brantley threw for 172 yards and two touchdowns, while wide receiver Deonte Thompson led the Gator receiving corps with 83 yards on six receptions. With one minute remaining in the first half, safety Ahmad Black grabbed an interception to set up an 11-yard touchdown from Brantley to Carl Moore, which tied the game at 7-7. The Gators were able to capitalize on an early third-quarter fumble with a 1:27 drive that resulted in a 62-yard touchdown run by Demps, putting UF in the lead, 14-7. Knoxville, Tenn. – The No. 10 Florida Gators beat the Tennessee Volunteers, 31-17, in front of 102,455 fans at Neyland Stadium in Knoxville, Tenn. With the win, the Gators moved to 6-0 in SEC season opens under head coach Urban Meyer. The first half was a tale of two defenses, as both teams held each other to less than 100 yards of total offense in the first half, with UF holding a 7-3 halftime edge on Mike Gillislee's two-yard scoring run. The Gators extended their lead to 10-3 in the third quarter, but the Volunteers answered back quickly with a three-play, 71-yard drive for a Tennessee touchdown, tying things up at 10 with 8:59 remaining in the third quarter. With the Gators facing fourth-and-six in the third quarter, Florida drew up a fake punt play to Omarius Hines, who rushed 36 yards, giving Florida a first down. Brantley then found Frankie Hammond, Jr. in the end zone with a seven-yard pass, giving the Gators a 17-10 lead with 4:31 remaining in the third quarter. Gillislee added another touchdown late in the third, but in the fourth quarter, Chris Simms hit Justin Hunter with a 35-yard pass for a Tennessee touchdown on fourth down, closing Florida's lead to 24-17. Gainesville, Fla. – The ninth-ranked Florida Gators defeated the Kentucky Wildcats 48-14, delivering head coach Urban Meyer his 100th career win. Freshman quarterback Trey Burton led the way with a school-record six touchdowns the most by an SEC player since 2003. Burton had five touchdowns on five carries, and also added his first career touchdown reception to propel a Gator offense that finished with 466 yards in its most productive outing of the season. Burton's six touchdowns broke Tim Tebow's school record of five touchdowns set in 2007. He became just the fourth player in SEC history to have six or more touchdowns in a game. In front of a crowd of 90,547, Florida notched its 24th straight win against Kentucky, the second-longest active streak for a major Division I school against a major opponent. The win also extended a series of winning streaks for the Gators, 24 regular-season games, 14 home games and 16 regular-season SEC games. Late in the game, Omar Hunter accounted for Florida's first blocked field goal of the season. The blocked kick was the sixth against Kentucky and the 29th blocked kick in coach Urban Meyer's tenure. John Brantley threw for a career-high 248 yards, connecting on 24 of 35 passes to eight different Florida receivers. Leading the Florida receiving corps was Deonte Thompson with five receptions for 86 yards.

Tuscaloosa, Ala. – In front of a crowd of 101,821 at Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa, Ala., No. 1 Alabama (5-0, 2-0 SEC) defeated No. 7 Florida (4-1, 2-1), 31-6, ending Florida's streak of 24 regular-season wins, 16 SEC wins and 13 consecutive road wins. Florida recorded 279 total yards to Alabama's 273, but the Gators' four turnovers proved costly in the loss. John Brantley completed 16 of 31 passes for 202 yards, but the Crimson Tide's 170 rushing yards carried Alabama and held the Gators without a touchdown for the first time since Oct. 1, 2005, when Alabama defeated Florida 31-3. The Crimson Tide started the game with a 10-play drive that featured five first downs, but the Gator defense limited them to a field goal at the 5:32 mark in the first quarter. On the following possession, the Gators ended a long drive with a Trey Burton interception in the endzone. On Alabama's next drive, running back Mark Ingram recorded the first touchdown of the night to begin the second quarter. The Crimson Tide defense held the Gators to zero first downs in two drives on offense between two more touchdowns, but Chas Henry was able to score his first career field goal to make the score 24-3 at the half. After another Chas Henry field goal, the Gator defense forced an Alabama three-and-out. Florida got the ball back, but Brantley threw his second interception of the night for a pick-six that put the Crimson Tide up 31-6.

Gainesville, Fla. – The No. 14/12 Florida Gators (4-2, 2-2 SEC) fell to the No. 12/9 Tigers (6-0, 2-1 SEC), 33-29, in a down-to-the-wire finish. The loss was coach Urban Meyer's first at home since Ole Miss in 2008 and was in front of a crowd of 90,721, the fourth-best attendance in school history. John Brantley threw for 154 yards and went 16-for-24 with one interception, but it was Andre Debose who stepped up for Florida with five returns for 154 yards. Trey Burton then took back the lead for UF, 14-10, with a one yard touchdown run. Lee threw a 38-yard pass to Terrence Toliver for a touchdown putting the Tigers up, 17-14. After a Gator turnover, the Tigers would extend the lead to 20-14 before half-time. The third quarter was a defensive battle containing no scores. After a LSU fourth-quarter touchdown and failed two point conversion, Debose returned the kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown making the score 26-21, LSU. A 51-yard throw from Brantley to Carl Moore, Brantley's longest career pass, gave the go-ahead for a five-yard touchdown run by sophomore running back Mike Gillislee. The two-point conversion was successful putting the Gators in the lead, 29-26. After being stopped at the 36-yard line on a third-and-one, the Tigers faked a 53-yard field goal with 35 seconds left in the fourth quarter for a first down. The conversion set up the three-yard touchdown pass from Lee to Toliver, winning it for LSU, 33-29.

Gainesville, Fla. – Mississippi State (5-2, 2-2 SEC) held off No. 22 Florida (4-3, 2-3 SEC), 10-7, in another frantic finish in The Swamp. Playing on Homecoming in front of a crowd of 90,517 fans, it was the Gators' 40th consecutive home game with over 90,000 spectators. In the first quarter, MSU kicker Sean Brauchle booted a 31-yard field goal for the first points of the game. A 38-yard Gator drive in the first quarter was halted when Johnathan Banks intercepted John Brantley's pass. On the ensuing drive, MSU marched 64 yards and used a six-yard touchdown scamper by Relf and a successful point-after attempt to increase its lead to 10-0. Later in the second quarter, Brantley connected with four different receivers on a 15-play drive to get the Gators to the 21-yard line. However, Henry was wide left on a missed field goal from 38 yards to leave UF's deficit at 10-0. On Florida's initial drive of the third quarter, Omarius Hines scored his first career rushing touchdown from five yards out to cap off a 13-play, 80-yard scoring drive. The touchdown put the Gators on the board and left them trailing, 10-7. On the next possession, Florida drove down to Mississippi State's 17-yard line, but fumbled, ending what looked to be a promising drive. However, MSU was unable to capitalize on the fumble and was forced to punt the ball back to the Gators, who took over at their own four-yard line with a little over two minutes on the clock. UF used a 14-play, 71-yard drive to move into position for a game-tying field goal as regulation wound down. With nine seconds remaining in regulation, Chas Henry misfired on a 42-yard field-goal attempt that would have tied the game, and the Bulldogs ran out the clock to notch their first victory in Gainesville since 1965.

The teams played the annual game at EverBank Field in Jacksonville, Fla. in front of a crowd of 84,444. On Georgia's possession in the extra period, Will Hill intercepted a pass from quarterback Aaron Murray and raced down the sideline for an apparent game-ending touchdown. However, he was ruled out of bounds after an 89-yard return, meaning that Florida was to begin its possession at UGA's 25-yard line. After UF ran three plays and gained six yards, Henry delivered the game-winning 37-yard field goal giving the Orange and Blue its 18th win in the last 21 encounters with the Bulldogs. In the game, Hill had two picks and also thwarted a two-point conversion with a catch in the end zone. For Florida, Trey Burton had career highs in both carries (17) and yards (110), highlighted by a spectacular 51-yard touchdown with 6:56 remaining in regulation that gave the Gators a seven-point lead. Chris Rainey totaled 241 all-purpose yards, 148 on six kick returns, 84 rushing on 16 carries and nine receiving on two catches. He scored the game's first points on a season-high 20-yard rush in the second quarter. John Brantley completed 16 of 25 passes for 193 yards and one interception, while six different players had multiple receptions and accounted of 219 yards receiving for Florida. Burton had a team-high five catches for 35 yards, while Omarius Hines led the Gators with 50 yards on four receptions. Frankie Hammond Jr. also chipped in with three receptions for 46 yards.

Nashville, Tenn. – The University of Florida football team scored 41 points in the first half and never looked back, defeating host Vanderbilt, 55-14, at Vanderbilt Stadium. With their 20th consecutive victory over the Commodores (2-7, 1-5 SEC), the Gators improved to 6-3 overall and 4-3 in league play. Florida's 41 first-half points were the most in a half against a SEC team since scoring 49 in the first half at Kentucky on Sept. 24, 2005. The 55 total points were the most by UF on the road in a SEC game since a 55-28 win at Kentucky on Sept. 27, 1997. The Gators scored in all three phases of the game, led by Chris Rainey, who blocked two punts on the day that each led to scores and caught four passes for a career-high 75 yards and a touchdown. On the ground, Mike Gillislee ran nine times for 57 yards and had a team-high two rushing touchdowns. Florida's defense was anchored by several impressive individual performances that had 13 combined tackles for loss, four sacks, two forced fumbles and one interception.

Gainesville, Fla. – The No. 22/24 Florida Gators fell to the No. 23/22 South Carolina Gamecocks, 36-14, at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium. The Gators struck early with a touchdown on the opening kickoff by Andre Debose, who ran 99 yards to give the Gators an early 7-0 lead, but UF couldn't fight off a potent South Carolina offense, allowing the Gamecocks to chalk up their first-ever Gainesville win in front of a crowd of 90,885, the third-highest attendance at The Swamp. John Brantley led the Gators through the air, completing 16 of 31 passes for 130 yards and one interception. Brantley connected with seven different Florida wide receivers. Jordan Reed (New London, Conn.) went 3-for-7 for 46 yards passing and one touchdown. The Gators finished with 191 yards through the air, compared to USC's 156. Ahmad Black notched a career-high 16 tackles on the night after tallying nine in the first half alone. Debose made Gator history by becoming the first player in school history to run two kickoffs back for a touchdown in one season. The touchdown was also only the third time in school history that an opening kickoff was returned for a touchdown, the last time was against Arkansas in 1997 by Bo Carroll. With 159 kickoff return yards against South Carolina, Debose also jumped to the top of the UF record book for a first-place tie in kickoff return yards in a game.

Tallahassee, Fla. – The Florida football team capped its regular season with a 31-7 loss to Florida State in front of 82,324 fans that snapped the Gators' six-game winning streak in the series and its three-game streak at Doak Campbell Stadium. The Gators led 7-3 early in the second quarter, but were unable to overcome four turnovers as the Seminoles scored 28 unanswered points to take control. The Seminoles opened the scoring with a Dustin Hopkins' 38-yard field goal on their opening drive. On the ensuing possession, the Gators responded with a touchdown, taking advantage of a 62-yard kickoff return by Andre Debose that set them up at the Florida State 32. Debose's return was his third this season in excess of 60 yards. Florida State regained the lead by capitalizing on a second-quarter fumble by Rainey, who appeared to be on his way to picking up a first down, when he lost the ball at Florida's 17-yard line. Seminole running back Lonnie Pryor found the end zone two plays later from nine yards out to put FSU in front, 10-7. On the Gators' next possession, a Jordan Reed 12-yard run was followed by three plays that left them five yards short of a first down. On fourth down, punter Chas Henry attempted to run for a first down on a fake punt and was stopped a yard shy of the marker. Christian Ponder hit Rodney Smith for a 39-yard touchdown on the next play from scrimmage, giving the Seminoles a 17-7 edge. After another Gator three-and-out, the Seminoles marched down the field, increasing the score to 24-7 at half-time. The Gators would not score after the opening possession, eventually losing the game 31-7.

Tampa, Fla. – The Florida Gators (8-5, 4-4 SEC) defeated the Penn State Nittany Lions, 37-24, in the 2011 Outback Bowl in front of a crowd of 60,574. The Gators made their 20th-consecutive bowl appearance, the longest active streak in the SEC and the second-longest in the nation. The New Year's Day win marked the last game of head coach Urban Meyer's tenure at Florida, finishing with a 65-15 record over six seasons. The Nittany Lion defense stepped up when cornerback D'Anton Lynn intercepted John Brantley's pass on Florida's first play of the game, leading to a Penn State touchdown pass for the first points of the game. Black tjem had his first interception of the game off a pass by Matt McGloin and took it 49 yards to the PSU 15, but a Florida fumble gave Penn State the ball back. Cody Riggs later grabbed an interception that gave the Gators possession at the 15-yard line, putting them in the red zone for the second time of the game. Two plays later, Hines ran for 16 yards and a touchdown to put the Gators on the scoreboard and tie the game at 7-7. A blocked punt by Solomon Patton midway through the second quarter allowed Lerentee McCray to take it home for Florida on a 27-yard touchdown return. The Lions answered the Gators' score with a five-play, 72-yard touchdown drive, tying the game at 14-14, and a late first half field goal by Penn State gave the Lions a 17-14 advantage at half. After Chas Henry tied the game at 17-17, the Lions scored on a two-yard touchdown run by McGloin, making the score 24-17. The Gators followed the PSU touchdown with a 47-yard field goal by Henry, a career-long and the longest field goal this season by the Gators. The Gator defense again stepped up, intercepting McGloin for the third time, this one by Brandon Hicks. The Gators capitalized on the interception with a one-yard Mike Gillislee touchdown run, giving the Gators a fourth-quarter lead of 27-24. Henry added a field goal for a 30-24 lead. As Penn State tried to drive for the winning touchdown, an 80-yard interception return for a touchdown by Black sealed the game for the Gators, 37-24.

Winning their second national championship in three years, the No. 2 Gators defeated the No. 1 Oklahoma Sooners, 24-14, in front of a record football crowd of 78,468 at the FedEx BCS National Championship Thursday at Dolphin Stadium. Florida completes its national championship run with a 13-1 record on the season, tying a school record for wins (13), last achieved during UF's 2006 national championship run when it finished 13-1 as well. Oklahoma finished its season 12-2 overall. The 2009 FedEx BCS National Championship win marked Florida's fourth BCS bowl win all-time, as the Gators improved their bowl record to 3-1 under head coach Urban Meyer. Gator senior wide receiver Louis Murphy (St. Petersburg, Fla.), junior wide receiver/running back Percy Harvin (Virginia Beach, Va.) and redshirt junior wide receiver David Nelson (Wichita Falls, Texas) were touchdown targets of junior quarterback Tim Tebow (Jacksonville, Fla.), who threw for 231 yards (18-of-30) and racked up 109 yards on the ground on 22 carries in the win over Oklahoma. Senior kicker Jonathan Phillips (Wellington, Fla.) tacked on three more points, connecting on a fourth quarter field goal to help lead the Gators over the Sooners. Oklahoma quarterback Sam Bradford finished the night 26-of-42, throwing for 256 yards, while Gresham led the Sooners in receiving with eight catches for 62 yards and two touchdowns. Oklahoma running back Chris Brown led OU on the ground with 110 yards on 22 carries. Passes from Tebow to sophomore tight end Aaron Hernandez (Bristol, Conn.), Nelson and Harvin composed a 76-yard game-winning scoring drive by the Gators when Tebow found Nelson for the second time on the drive for a four-yard touchdown, giving Florida a 24-14 lead, the final margin.

Senior quarterback Chris Leak (Charlotte, N.C.) threw for a touchdown and senior running back DeShawn Wynn (Cincinnati, Ohio) ran for another score to lead the second-ranked University of Florida football team to a 41-14 victory over Ohio State in the Tostitos BCS National Championship Game, earning the Gators their second-ever national football championship. With the win, Florida became the first school in NCAA Division I history to win capture national titles in football and men's basketball during the same calendar year, having earned its first title on the hardwood by defeating UCLA in April. Ohio struck first when Ted Ginn, Jr., returned the game's opening kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown. The Gators, however, battled back to tie the score at 7-7 when Leak connected with senior wide receiver Dallas Baker (New Smyrna Beach, Fla.) for a 14-yard touchdown pass just 4:13 later. The Gators took a lead they would not relinquish at the 5:51 mark of the first quarter when freshman wide receiver Percy Harvin (Virginia Beach, Va.) took an option pitch from Leak and scampered four yards for his third touchdown of the season. After senior cornerback Reggie Lewis (Jacksonville, Fla.) intercepted Ohio State quarterback Troy Smith with 2:49 left to play in the opening quarter, Wynn plowed into the end zone from two yards to cap a 10-play 71-yard drive that gave Florida a 21-7 lead. After the teams dueled to a scoreless third quarter, freshman quarterback Tim Tebow (Jacksonville, Fla.) put the Gators ahead, 41-14, with a one-yard plunge at the 10:30 mark of the final period. Leak finished the game 25-of-36 for 212 yards and a score, while Wynn paced the team with 70 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries. Harvin hauled in a career-high nine receptions on the night, good for 59 yards, and senior Jemelle Cornelius (Fort Meade, Fla.) chipped in with five catches for 49 yards. Senior linebacker Earl Everett (Webster, Fla.) notched a team-high seven tackles, and Harvey contributed a career-high three sacks, resulting in a loss of 31 total yards for Ohio State.

The third-ranked Gators lay claim to their first national championship as they stripped top-ranked Florida State's hopes for a perfect season with a 52-20 victory before a Superdome Sugar Bowl record crowd of 78,344 and an ABC national television audience in the 1997 Nokia Sugar bowl. With Ohio State's 20-17 defeat of undefeated and second ranked Arizona State the day before in the Rose Bowl, Florida was voted national champions in both major polls for the first time in school history. Both teams opened the contest throwing the football combining for 238 passing yards and a 10-3 Gator lead at the end of the first quarter on a nine yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback Danny Wuerffel (Ft. Walton, Fla.) to junior wide receiver Ike Hilliard (Patterson, La.) and a 32-yard field goal by senior Bart Edmiston (Pensacola, Fla.). Florida, which worked out of the shotgun for much of the game, twice extended its lead to 14 points in the second quarter on a two-yard scoring run by junior tailback Fred Taylor (Belle Glades, Fla.) and another Hilliard touchdown. But the Seminoles responded each time. Scott Bentley trimmed the Gator lead to 24-20 on a 45-yard field goal less than five minutes into the second half, but the Seminoles would not score again. Florida sealed the victory by scoring the final 28 points of the game, a run that began with Hilliard's third touchdown of the contest. The Gator defense was strong from start to finish, stopping the Seminoles on downs at the UF 23 on the game's opening possession and holding FSU to just 42 net yards rushing total, just two yards shy of the UF bowl record set against Baylor in the 1960 Gator Bowl. The Seminoles were successful on only five of 18 third down conversions, with two Gator interceptions. The Gator special teams also play well, with sophomore punter Robby Stevenson (Bradenton, Fla.) pinning the Seminoles inside the five-yard line on two different occasions while averaging 48.1 yards per punt.

Using a solid defense, Florida defeats Alabama 28-13 at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. to capture its second official SEC title and earn a berth in the New Year's Day Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La. The Gators run their record to 10-2 becoming just the second team in school history to win 10 games.

Alabama scores on the first possession of the game, using a Tarrant Lynch one-yard touchdown run and a Michael Proctor PAT to go up 7-0 just 4:47 into the contest. However, the Crimson Tide does not score another touchdown as the Gator defense limits the David Palmer-led Alabama offense to just a pair of field goals the rest of the way.

A Terry Dean to Harrison Houston pass and the ensuing PAT by Lou Groza Award winner Judd Davis knots the game at 7-7 with 1:02 left in the first quarter. Alabama's Proctor hits a 45-yard field goal with 12:02 remaining in the first half and the Crimson Tide leads 10-7. But with only 1:10 left in the second quarter, Florida's Dean lunges into the endzone from two yards out and the Gators are up 14-10, a lead they would not relinquish.

The Crimson Tide closes the Gator lead to one when Proctor hits his second field goal of the day, a 25-yarder with 2:14 left in the third quarter, making the score 14-13. On their next possession, Gator punter Shayne Edge, facing fourth-and-eight from his own 37, fakes the boot and rambles 20 yards to the Alabama 43-yard line. On the very next play, Dean hits Jack Jackson on a 43-yard touchdown pass and the Gators lead 21-13. An Errict Rhett three-yard run with 11:59 left in the game caps the scoring, giving the Gators the 1993 Southeastern Conference Championship with a 28-13 victory.

Game at a Glance

Sixth-ranked Florida (10-1-1) captures its second consecutive Southeastern title and third league championship in the last four years with a 24-23 heart-pounding victory over No. 3 Alabama (11-1) in the SEC Championship Game.

With Florida clinging to a 17-16 fourth quarter lead, Gator quarterback Danny Wuerffel's pass is picked off by Alabama linebacker Dwayne Rudd who returns it 23 yards for a touchdown and a 23-17 Tide lead with 8:56 to play.

The Gators respond with one of the most memorable drives in school history.

On the second play of the drive, Wuerffel comes off the field with a fake limp in a pre-planned signal for strong-armed back-up quarterback Eric Kresser. With Alabama thinking run with Kresser in the contest, the back-up quarterback takes his first snap and lofts a 25-yard pass down the left sideline to Ike Hilliard to put UF on the UA 42.

After freshman Fred Taylor uses a second and third effort to gain two yards on a fourth-and-one play, Wuerffel throws a lateral pass to Reidel Anthony, who gains nine yards. On the next play, UF Head Coach Steve Spurrier calls for a double-pass, as Wuerffel laterals it to Doering, who then delivers it to Aubrey Hill for a 20-yard gain to the two. Wuerffel then finds Doering in the back of the endzone for the winning touchdown with 5:29 to play.

Florida then turns the game over to its determined defense. With Alabama driving for the winning points and near midfield, Gator Fred Weary tips a Jay Barker pass and Eddie Lake gathers in the pass to seal the victory with less than a minute to play. All told, the Gator defense holds Alabama to 297 yards in total offense, while sacking Alabama quarterback Barker five times on the afternoon and recording six tackles for lost yardage.

Game at a Glance

In front of a primetime national television audience and a sold-out crowd of 71,325, second-ranked Florida assures itself of a trip to the Fiesta Bowl to play for its first national championship with a 34-3 victory over Arkansas in the fourth edition of the SEC Championship Game, giving the Gators their third consecutive SEC title. Florida becomes just the second school to capture three consecutive outright SEC titles, a feat only accomplished by Alabama several times, the last being from 1977-79.

Arkansas opens the game in impressive fashion, driving inside the Florida 20-yard line and eating up more than seven minutes off the clock. But the Gator defense sets the tone for the entire game and allows the Razorbacks to come away with just a 36-yard Todd Latourette field goal.

The Gator offense answers back immediately as it drives 80 yards in seven plays, culminating with a 22-yard scoring toss from Danny Wuerffel to Chris Doering. Just over three minutes later, UF strikes again following a Teako Brown interception, this time on a one-yard keeper from Wuerffel. The Gators add a 31-yard field goal from Bart Edmiston midway through the second quarter to take a 17-3 lead into the locker room.

The Florida defense comes up with perhaps the biggest play of the entire night with just under five minutes left in the third quarter and UF holding a 24-3 edge. With Arkansas threatening on the doorstep, Ben Hanks recovers a fumble by Razorback quarterback Barry Lunney on a thwarted option play and rambles 95 yards untouched to give the Gators an insurmountable lead. It was UF's first defensive touchdown of the season and is one of four forced turnovers for the defense, three of which lead to 17 of UF's points. Arkansas is held to just 299 yards in total offense, including just 142 yards and only nine first downs in the second half.

Danny Wuerffel continues to shatter the record books as he sets a SEC and UF record for career touchdown passes with his 75th, a 29-yard pass to Ike Hilliard midway through the third quarter. He also finishes the year with a pass efficiency rating of 178.4, the best single-season rating ever in NCAA history. Hilliard and Doering both eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark, becoming the first UF tandem to accomplish that feat.

Game at a Glance

A week after having their national championship hopes seemingly vanish, fourth-ranked Florida defeats No. 11 Alabama 45-30 in the SEC Championship Game before 74,132 fans and an ABC national television audience. Florida's win, coupled with Texas' 37-27 upset over Nebraska earlier in the day in the Big 12 Championship Game, puts the Gators back in the national championship hunt with a rematch against Florida State in the Nokia Sugar Bowl on January 2nd.

The SEC title is Florida's fifth since 1991 (1991, 1993-96) and fourth consecutive crown, the second best achievement in league history (Alabama won five straight SEC crowns from 1971-75).

Senior quarterback Danny Wuerffel completes 20-of-35 passes for 401 yards and six touchdowns against the nation's No. 1 rated pass defense. Wuerffel's six touchdown passes, which was one more than the Alabama pass defense had surrendered all year in 11 games, ties his SEC record for most touchdown passes in a league game.

Reidel Anthony catches 11 of Wuerffel's passes for 171 yards and three touchdowns. Anthoyn, who finished with a nation's best and SEC-record setting 18 touchdown grabs on the year, hauls in touchdown passes in the second, third and fourth quarters.

Overall, the Gator offense tallies 470 yards in total offense against an Alabama defensive unit that ranked first in the SEC and sixth in the nation allowing just 236 yards per game coming into the game.

After the Gators fall behind seven-plus minutes into the game, Florida reels off 24 straight points to build a 17-point cushion nearing the end of the half. A Michael Vaughn touchdown pass from Fred Kitchens with 29 seconds left in the half, coupled with a five-yard run by Dennis Riddle after a blocked UF punt early in the third quarter, cuts the UF lead to three at 24-21.

The two teams score three touchdowns in the next 2:05, with UF stealing any Tide momentum with an 85-yard pass from Wuerffel to a streaking Jacquez Green to give the Gators a 38-28 lead. Anthony then adds his third touchdown catch of the day on the first play of the fourth quarter to give Florida an insurmountable 17-point lead.

Game at a Glance

Florida won its sixth SEC title in the past 10 years as it took advantage of three Auburn turnovers and jumped out to a 21-0 second quarter lead en route to a 28-6 victory over the Tigers before a 73,427 SEC Championship Game crowd at the Georgia Dome. The victory gave Florida a berth in the Sugar Bowl, a school and SEC record eighth consecutive January bowl game appearance and a school record seventh straight win over Auburn. Florida also won at least 10 games for the eighth time in Steve Spurrier's coaching tenure.

Florida capitalized on Auburn's three turnovers to take command. On Auburn's first play from scrimmage, Florida's Mike Nattiel recovered a Tiger fumble following a 10-yard pass play. Five plays later, Florida quarterback Rex Grossman found Reche Caldwell in the end zone for a 10-yard touchdown pass and 7-0 lead. Two series later, Florida's Lito Sheppard prevented an Auburn touchdown as he intercepted a Ben Leard pass at the Gator seven yard line. The interception set up a Caldwell's second touchdown reception of the game as he caught a Grossman pass, beat a defender and rambled 66 yards for a 14-0 Gator lead. In the second quarter, Nattiel ended another Auburn scoring threat as he recovered his second fumble of the game at UF's 3 yard line. The turnovers set up an eight play, 97-yard scoring drive which ended in Florida's third score - a 27 yard pass from Grossman to Gaffney.

In all, Auburn turned the ball over four times (two interceptions, two fumbles) and had to settle for six points on two Damon Duval field goals. Auburn tailback Rudi Johnson, the SEC's leading rusher who entered the game with a 138.2 yards rushing per game average, was held to 47 yards on 17 carries and no TDs. Florida's Earnest Graham rushed for a career-high 169 yards (also a SEC championship game record) on 19 carries and quarterback Rex Grossman completed 17 of 26 passes for 238 yards and four touchdowns. Grossman threw for nine touchdowns against Auburn on the year.

Reche Caldwell finished with three receptions for 91 yards and two touchdowns and Jabar Gaffney led the Gators with five catches for 84 yards and a touchdown. Gaffney also set the NCAA Division IA freshman receiving yards record and completes the season with 71 receptions for 1,184 yards and 14 touchdown catches- both NCAA Division IA receiving records for a freshman. Lito Sheppard led the Gator defense with two interceptions while Nattiel finished with two fumble recoveries.

Game at a Glance

The fourth-ranked University of Florida football team (12-1, 7-1 Southeastern Conference) got second-half touchdowns on a muffed punt, a 67-yard run and a pass from a wide receiver en route to defeating No. 8 Arkansas, 38-28, to win its seventh SEC title. The victory gave the Gators their 12th win of the campaign, matching the school record that was set in both 1995 and 1996.

With UF trailing 21-17 late in the third quarter, Arkansas sophomore Reggie Fish fumbled a punt after trying to field it over his shoulder inside the Razorbacks' five-yard line, allowing freshman cornerback Wondy Pierre-Louis to pounce on the ball in the endzone for a touchdown that gave Florida a 24-21 lead. After the Gator defense forced an Arkansas punt, freshman wide receiver Percy Harvin took off on a career-long 67-yard touchdown run on Florida's first play of the fourth quarter, widening the lead to 31-21.

The Hogs quickly cut the margin back to three points, at 31-28, when senior wide receiver Cedric Washington hit sophomore running back Felix Jones for a 29-yard touchdown on a double pass with 12:29 left to play. Florida, however, would strike back on its next drive, marching down the field on an eight-play, 80-yard drive that culminated in a five-yard touchdown pass from junior wide receiver Andre Caldwell to junior tight end Tate Casey to reach the eventual winning score of 38-28.

Junior safety Reggie Nelson and junior cornerback Ryan Smith sealed Florida's win with fourth-quarter interceptions, with Smith's coming in his own endzone on Arkansas' final drive. The pair now has a nation-leading 14 combined interceptions on the year, as well as six combined picks against top-25 opponents.

UF got on the scoreboard first via a 33-yard field goal by senior Chris Hetland and took a 3-0 lead into the second period. Sophomore running back Kestahn Moore ripped off a 28-yard run, and Harvin chipped in with an 11-yard jaunt, on the drive that led to the game's opening score.

Florida's lead was still 3-0 with just over nine minutes left to play in the first half when freshman wide receiver Jarred Fayson blocked an Arkansas punt, which senior cornerback Tremaine McCollum recovered at the Hogs' nine-yard line. The blocked punt was the Gators' eighth blocked kick of the year, breaking the school record of seven that was established in 1995. Senior quarterback Chris Leak plunged into the endzone for a nine-yard scoring run on the first play of the ensuing drive to give his team a 10-0 advantage.

Just over four minutes later, Leak would cap UF's first-half scoring with a 37-yard strike to Harvin, pushing the advantage to 17-0. Leak became Florida's all-time leader in passing yards on the play, breaking Danny Wuerffel's career record of 10,875. The Gators headed into the locker room with a 17-7 lead after Arkansas sophomore quarterback Casey Dick hooked up with junior wideout Marcus Monk on a 48-yard touchdown pass to get the Razorbacks on the board.

Arkansas cut the lead to 17-14 on their first drive of the second half behind a two-yard touchdown pass from sophomore running back Darren McFadden to Jones. The Hogs took the lead less than four minutes later when sophomore defensive lineman Antwain Robinson intercepted Leak and returned the ball 40 yards for the score, giving Arkansas a 21-17 edge. UF would retake the lead on Pierre-Louis' special-teams touchdown on the very next series, and would not trail for the remainder of the contest.

Leak finished the game 16-of-30 for 189 yards and a touchdown through the air, while adding 19 yards and a score on 11 carries; he now has 11,000 career passing yards and 87 collegiate touchdown passes. Harvin led the team with a career-high 105 rushing yards and a touchdown on six carries, giving him an average of 17.5 yards per attempt for the game. Sophomore tight end Cornelius Ingram grabbed six passes for 71 yards - both career bests - to pace the Gators.

Junior linebacker Brandon Siler posted a season-high 12 tackles, including nine solo efforts, to lead a defense that intercepted three passes in a game for the fourth time this season and recorded four tackles for loss that pushed Arkansas back eight yards. UF defenders also broke up five passes against the Hogs, running their total of passes defended to eight for the game.

The Gators limited McFadden, the SEC's leading rusher, to just 73 yards on 21 carries, and held Jones to 57 yards on 13 attempts. Dick was able to complete just 10-of-22 passes for 148 yards and a score against the Florida secondary, while Monk caught a team-high three passes for 69 yards.

The win marks the seventh SEC title in UF history, and the sixth SEC Championship Game victory. The Gators have now won five games at the Georgia Dome in seven outings, and have taken five of their last seven games in the city of Atlanta.

The Crimson Tide opened the second half with a 91-yard, 15-play scoring drive that ate up 6:53 on the clock. Running back Mark Ingram punched in his first touchdown of the night from two yards out to even the score at 17-17 with 6:20 remaining in the third quarter. Alabama took the lead for the second time in the game following a successful field goal by Tiffin to give the Crimson Tide a 20-17 lead in the closing seconds of the third stanza.

The Gators answered on the following drive on a one-yard touchdown run by freshman athlete Jeff Demps with 9:21 to play in the game to give the Gators a 24-20 lead. The drive, which spanned 63 yards in 11 plays, was highlighted by a 13-yard reception by Nelson and a six-yard grab by Hernandez on third down.

The aggressive Gator defense was too much for the Crimson Tide as they held Alabama to a three-and-out spurred by a quarterback sack by junior defensive end Jermaine Cunningham on third down and eight. Following a 37-yard punt by P.J. Fitzgerald, the Orange and Blue took the reigns at their own 35-yard line. The Florida offense drove the ball 65 yards in 4:37 to add their final score of the night and increase their lead 31-20 off a five-yard reception by Cooper.

An interception by sophomore cornerback Joe Haden with 1:39 remaining in the game sealed the Gators' SEC title.

Alabama quarterback John Parker Wilson was 12-of-25 for 187 yards with one interception and zero passing touchdowns. Coffee rushed for 112 yards on 21 carries, while Jones led the Crimson Tide with five receptions for 124 yards.

Game at a Glance

No. 2 Florida (12-1, 8-1) defeated No. 1 Alabama (12-1, 8-1) in front of a record crowd of 75,892 at the Georgia Dome on Saturday night to claim its eighth Southeastern Conference title in school history. Under head coach Urban Meyer, the Gators are 5-1 against opponents ranked inside the top five by the AP and 9-4 against top-10 ranked opponents.

The Gators tallied 358 yards of total offense compared to Alabama's 323. Florida rushed for 136 yards against an Alabama defense who allowed only 73.6 rushing yards per game, which ranked second in the nation. Alabama entered the game allowing opponents 11.5 points per game (third nationally).

UF was led by quarterback Tim Tebow, who was 14-of-22 for 216 yards and three touchdowns. The Maxwell Award finalist also led the team on the ground with 57 yards on 17 carries. Senior wide receiver Louis Murphy led the Orange and Blue with four receptions for 86 yards.

The Gators got out to an early lead after holding Alabama's offense to a quick three-and-out to start the game. The Florida offense drove down the field, capping a 59-yard, nine-play scoring drive with a three-yard touchdown reception by junior Carl Moore. The score, which came with 8:17 to play in the first quarter, was the first of Moore's career at Florida. A successful extra-point attempt by senior Jonathan Phillips gave Florida a 7-0 lead.


Alabama responded quickly, evening the score only 54 seconds later. Sparked by a 64-yard catch by wide receiver Julio Jones, running back Glen Coffee found the end zone on the ensuing play for an 18-yard touchdown run. Leigh Tiffin's extra point tied the game, 7-7, with 7:23 remaining in the first quarter.

The Crimson Tide's Javier Arenas put Alabama in good field position following a 20-yard punt return. However, the Gator defense remained physical, forcing UA to settle for three points. A 30-yard field goal by Tiffin gave the Crimson Tide a 10-7 advantage with 3:28 in the first and marking the first time that the Gators have trailed in a game since the loss versus Ole Miss on Sept. 27.

After scoreless possessions by both sides, UF started its fourth drive of the game at its own 31-yard line following a fake field goal that was broken up by redshirt sophomore defensive tackle Terron Sanders. Junior wide receiver Riley Cooper came up big for the Gators with a 51-yard reception, his longest of the season, to put UF in scoring position. Phillips converted on a 19-yard field goal attempt to even the score, 10-10, with 8:59 left in the first half.

After forcing Alabama to a three-and-out on the ensuing possession, the Florida offense had excellent field position, starting at the 38-yard line, following a 15-yard horse collar penalty on the punt return. A 22-yard pass up the middle from Tebow to sophomore tight end Aaron Hernandez gave UF first down and 10 from the Alabama five-yard line. Two plays later, Tebow found junior wide receiver David Nelson in the end zone for a five-yard TD. Phillips' successful point-after gave the Gators a 17-10 advantage with less than three minutes to play in the first half. The PAT by Phillips set a new school and SEC record for most point-after attempts made in a season.

Carlos Alvarez finished his career as the all-time leading receiver in UF history. He has spent the last 25 years as an attorney after graduating from Florida with High Honors in 1972. He got his law degree from Duke in 1975, graduating with Honors. Alvarez was a three-time Academic All-American and earned a NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship Award in 1971. He was inducted into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1989.



ERIN ANDREWS (FLORIDA, 2000)

Erin Andrews, who earned her telecommunications degree from UF in 2000, has become a familiar face on ESPN broadcasts as a reporter since joining the network in 2004. Andrews, who provides coverage of everything from college football and basketball to Major League Baseball, was a member of the Dazzlers – a dance team of UF students that performs on the sidelines of Gator athletic events.

DR. J. ROBERT CADE

The legendary University of Florida scientist who led the research team that gave the world Gatorade. Cade and his research fellows began experimenting with Gatorade in 1965 with the Florida football team and it has grown into a multibillion-dollar sports drink industry that has brought in more than \$150 million in royalties to UF.

HAZEL CLARK (TRACK, 1996-99)

The three-time NCAA national 800-meter champion led the Clark family to an unprecedented 1-2-3 sweep

of the open spots in the half-mile on the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team. Clark is a three-time Olympian, representing the U.S.A. in the 2000, '04 and '08 Olympic Games.

CRIS COLLINSWORTH (FOOTBALL, 1977-80)

The All-Pro wide receiver with the Cincinnati Bengals, who was named the 1981 NFL Rookie of the Year, has emerged as a five-time Emmy Award-winning studio analyst for his broadcast work on FOX, NBC and HBO, where he was a co-host on the award-winning HBO show "Inside the NFL." He is currently NBC's game analyst on its weekly NFL Sunday Night Football broadcast.

JACK KATZ (FOOTBALL, 1962-64)

Jack Katz, a football letterman from 1962-64 and starting lineman, was one of the stars of the great upset victory over Alabama in Tuscaloosa in 1963. He founded Panama Jack following his graduation from UF. Katz was inducted into the UF Athletics Hall of Fame in 2008.




DELISHA MILTON-JONES (BASKETBALL, 1993-97)

The second overall selection in the 1997 ABL draft and the fourth overall pick in the 1999 WNBA Draft, Milton-Jones guided the U.S. Olympic Team to gold in 2000. The two-time WNBA All-Star has won two WNBA titles playing with the Los Angeles Sparks, has played 12 seasons in the WNBA (Los Angeles, 1999-2004, 2008-present; Washington Mystics, 2005-07) and was named to the 2007-08 U.S. Senior National Team.

HEATHER MITTS (SOCCER, 1996-99)

A 1999 first-team NSCAA All-American, Mitts was one of the most popular players for the now disbanded WUSA's Philadelphia Charge. Mitts helped the 2004 and 2008 U.S. Olympic Teams win back-to-back gold medals and trained with the 2006 U.S. National Team. An injury kept her off the 2007 U.S. World Cup Team, but Heather worked for ESPN and its coverage of the event. She was a member of the 2011 U.S. Women's World Cup team that competed in Germany over the summer.



In 2007, Florida became the first school in history to have three players selected among the first 10 picks of the NBA Draft. Overall, five Gators were selected in the 2007 NBA Draft: (L-R) Chris Richard, Al Horford, Taurean Green, Corey Brewer and Joakim Noah.

GARY ROLLE

(FOOTBALL 1982-84)

An Academic All-American and winner of the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award, Rolle attended Medical School at Florida before completing his residency at the Alton Ochsner Medical Foundation and his fellowship at the UF's College of Medicine. Dr. Rolle now practices at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Clinic, where he specializes in knee surgery and sports medicine.

EMMITT SMITH (FOOTBALL, 1987-89)

The first-round selection of the Dallas Cowboys, Smith was named the 1990 NFL Rookie of the Year, before earning NFL MVP honors in 1993 and being named MVP of Super Bowl XXVIII (1994). He became the all-time rushing leader in NFL history during the 2002 season. Upon retirement from the NFL, Emmitt showed his footwork remained intact by winning the 2006 "Dancing with the Stars" title. He was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2010.

DARA TORRES (SWIMMING, 1985-89)

The 1988 overall SEC Female Athlete of the Year who was a 28-time All-American at UF made U.S. history in 2000 when she became the first woman to swim on four U.S. Olympic Teams. Torres topped that in 2008 when she became the first female swimmer over 40 to compete in the Olympic Games. At 41, she won three silver medals and has a total of 12 Olympic Medals.

Ring of Honor

Emmitt Smith

A unanimous first-team All-America selection, Smith finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting in 1989 and ninth in 1987...Three-time first-team All-Southeastern Conference pick...SEC Player of the Year in 1989...SEC Freshman of the Year in 1987...Was enshrined at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind., during ceremonies this summer...Broke 58 school records en route to rushing for 3,928 yards and 36 touchdowns in only three seasons as a Gator...Rushed for 1,599 yards and 16 scores as a junior...First-round draft pick by the Dallas Cowboys in 1990...Enjoyed 15 seasons in the NFL with the Cowboys and Arizona Cardinals...The NFL's all-time leading rusher with 18,355 career yards, 164 touchdowns and three Super Bowl rings...Led the NFL in rushing four times (1991-93, 1995) and rushing touchdowns three times (1992, 1994, 1995)...NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1993, the MVP of Super Bowl XXVIII and made eight Pro Bowls throughout his career...Holds the career Super Bowl record for rushing touchdowns with five, and his 175 total touchdowns rank him second to only Jerry Rice's 207 scores...Sum of his rushing yards, receiving yards (3,224) and fumble return yards (-15), gave him a total of 21,564 yards from the line of scrimmage, making him one of only four players in NFL history to eclipse the 21,000-combined yards mark...Inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2006 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2010...Inducted into Florida's Ring of Honor in September 2006.

Steve Spurrier

The 1966 Heisman Trophy winner, Spurrier earned All-America status in 1965 and 1966 (unanimous)...Shattered every school record at the time for game, season and career in passing and total offense on his way to establishing numerous SEC marks...Completed 392 passes for 4,848 yards and 36 touchdowns in his UF career...Compiled a 122-27-1 record from 1990-2001, the most wins for a Gator coach in school history and a winning percentage (.817) that ranked among the top three in SEC history...The 1996 season saw the team capture its first-ever National Championship with a 52-20 win over rival Florida State in the Sugar Bowl...Led the Gators to six SEC titles (1991, 1993-96, 2000), second only to Paul "Bear Bryant," and was a three-time SEC Coach of the Year recipient...Only coach in SEC history, and one of only two coaches in major college history, to lead a squad to six-straight seasons of 10 or more wins (1993-98)...Achieved 100 career victories at Florida in a faster time period (10th season, eighth game) than any major college coach at a school in the 20th century...One of only five major college coaches in history and only the second in SEC annals, to lead a school to 100 wins during a decade (102-22-1 at UF from 1990-99)...Coached UF to back-to-back National Championship Game appearances (1995 and 1996)...Became the first

person to have both won a Heisman Trophy and to have coached a Heisman Trophy winner (Wuerffel in 1996)...Inducted into Florida's Ring of Honor in September 2006.

Danny Wuerffel

Perhaps the most decorated player in Florida's football history, Wuerffel won the 1996 Heisman Trophy while quarterbacking the Gators to the consensus national championship...Led the Orange and Blue to four SEC titles and a pair of national championship games...Only Heisman Trophy recipient to receive the Draddy Scholarship Trophy, which is presented by the National Football Foundation and the College Football Hall of Fame to the nation's top football scholar-athlete...First-team All-America selection in 1995 and 1996 and two-time recipient of the O'Brien National Quarterback of the Year Award in those same campaigns...Completed his Gator career completing 708 of 1,170 passes for 10,875 yards with 114 TD passes, best in SEC history and second-most in major college history...Career pass efficiency rating of 163.56 was the best in major college history and his percentage of passes which went for a TD (9.74) ranked first in collegiate history...In 1995, his efficiency rating of 178.4 set a single-season collegiate record...During his Heisman-winning season of 1996, he completed 207 of 360 passes for 3,625 yards (an SEC record at the time) for 39 TDs (leading the nation and tops in SEC history) and his efficiency rating of 170.6 made him the first QB to ever post a rating of 170 or better in back-to-back years...Named to the Gainesville Sun's UF Team of the Century in 1999 and was chosen the century's top Gator offensive player by that publication...Inducted into Florida's Ring of Honor in September 2006.

Regarded as best defensive end in Gator history...Named to All-SEC team for decade of the 1970's, and went on to become an All-Pro star with the Los Angeles Rams after being a first-round draft selection in 1971...Was the Most Outstanding Player in the 1971 Senior Bowl...Was enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1992 and became the first player from Florida to be inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in 2001...After leading the team with 66 tackles in 1969, he made All-America the following season...The Rams' defensive captain, he was a three-time winner of the Dan Reeves Award given to that team's Most Valuable Player each season...Was All-Pro in 1974, 1975, 1976, 1978, and 1979 and All-NFC seven times...Played in seven-straight Pro Bowls following each season from 1973 to 1979...Rams played in five NFC championship games and advanced to Super Bowl XIV following the 1979 season...Played in a Rams' record 201 consecutive games and only missed one game in 14 seasons, that one miss coming in his final year in 1984...Inducted into Florida's Ring of Honor in September 2006.

Wilber Marshall

A two-time consensus first-team All-American and the 1983 National Defensive Player of the Year, Marshall played linebacker for the Gators from 1980-83...ABC Television selected him as the National Defensive Player of the Year in 1983...Finalist for the Lombardi Award in both his junior and senior seasons...Finished his career with 343 tackles (210 solo), including a school-record 23 quarterback sacks...Was selected in 1999 as The Gainesville Sun's Defensive Player of the Century...First-round draft pick by the Chicago Bears in 1984 and enjoyed a 12-year career in the NFL...Was a three-time All-Pro selection (1986, '87 and '92) and also earned a pair of Super Bowl rings with Chicago and Washington...In the 1985 season, he was part of a Bears' defensive unit which allowed the fewest yards, rushing yards and points per game in the NFL...Won another championship ring with the Redskins in the 1991 season...During his dozen NFL seasons, Marshall recorded 45 sacks and intercepted 23 passes, which he returned for 304 yards and three touchdowns...Recovered 16 fumbles, returning them for 70 yards and one touchdown...Among the few players who have recorded 20 sacks and 20 interceptions in their career...Has been nominated for the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, and was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2008...Inducted into Florida's Ring of Honor in September 2008.

For a player or coach to merit consideration for induction into the Gator Football Ring of Honor, at least one of the following criteria must be met. In addition, the individual must have been departed from UF for at least five seasons, and he must be in good standing with the institution.

Community Programs

Gator Literacy

Designed to promote reading and literacy in Alachua County. Once a week, student-athletes read stories with children during their lunch time.

Gator Club

The Gator Club program is a partnership with the Shands Medical Plaza. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, the UF football team visits with the pediatric patients at the Medical Plaza.

Stephen Foster Intramurals

The children of Stephen Foster Elementary look forward to Tuesdays and Thursdays, when the Gators come to play intramural activities with them.

Gator Tracks

Gator Tracks is an "angel tree"-type program that takes place during the holiday season. Local elementary school teachers provide the Gators with children's first names and shoe sizes, after recognizing that they are in need of new sneakers.

BLAQUE

In the spring of 2008, Florida Coach Urban Meyer initiated a mentor program for young at-risk males. Working with the African-American

Accountability Alliance of Alachua County task force, the program BLAQUE (Bold Leaders, Achieving Quality, Unity and Excellence) was developed. The program partnered 15 area middle school children with a Gator football player and a community leader. The goal is to affect change in the lives of at-risk black youth.

Gator Charity Challenge

The UF football team holds an annual Gator Charity Challenge strong-man competition at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium to close its offseason workouts. The event, which was started in 2008, is free and open to the public and partners with several charities affiliated with Shands Hospital in an effort to raise awareness within the community for the various causes. Fans in attendance have the opportunity to make a pledge to the charities associated with the Gator Charity Challenge.

Swamp Field Trip

A program that started in the spring of 2009, the "Swamp Field Trip" is available to local middle schools as a reward for their students who achieve good grades, are involved in community service, have had major improvements, etc. The students have the opportunity to speak with a group of players and have a special tour of the football facility given by the players.

Walk-ons

For years, the University of Florida football program has encouraged and fostered a walk-on program that gives many young men every year the opportunity to live their dream of playing major college football.

Many former walk-ons have eventually earned scholarships (45 alone since 1990), earned starting positions, gained All-SEC and All-America honors and even eventually played pro football. None of those players would have lived their dream and reached their potential if the University of Florida hadn't extended the opportunity they were seeking. Their eventual

success has become a cherished part of the Gator football tradition and heritage.

- Fourteen former Gator walk-ons have gone on to play pro football: LS James Smith, DB Hagood Clarke, DB Allen Trammell, DB Bruce Vaughan, LB James Harrell, WR Lee McGriff, PK John James, PK David Posey, QB Kerwin Bell, DB Louis Oliver, WR Chris Doering, TE Tremayne Allen, PK Jeff Chandler and FB Billy Latsko.
- Former walk-on Louis Oliver was selected in the first round of the 1989 NFL Draft by Miami.
- Former walk-on John James went on to earn All-Pro honors as a punter in the NFL.
- Former walk-on Kerwin Bell earned SEC Player of the Year honors in 1984 and completed his career in 1987 as the greatest statistical passer in SEC history.
- Former walk-on DB Louis Oliver earned first-team All-America honors in 1987 and 1988.
- When Bobby Raymond completed his career in 1984, the former walk-on's name appeared in the NCAA place-kicking records in five separate categories.
- Walk-on WR Gary Rolle was named Academic All-America and winner of the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award in 1984.
- Twenty-six members of the 1991 Southeastern Conference championship team, the first official SEC title in school history, were walk-ons.
- One hundred and twenty-eight (128) Gator walk-ons have earned Academic All-SEC honors.
- Former walk-on Kerwin Bell became a prominent Heisman Trophy candidate in 1987.
- Former walk-on Louis Oliver was one of three finalists for the Jim Thorpe Defensive Back of the Year Award in 1988.
- Former walk-on Judd Davis was named the 1993 recipient of the Lou Groza National Place-Kicker of the Year. He was also named a first-team All-American that season and completed his UF career in 1994 with 225 points, the top total in school history.
- Former walk-on Chris Doering completed his Gator career in 1995 with 31 career TD catches, the top total in SEC and UF history. Doering was named second-team All-America, as well as first-team All-SEC in 1995, after grabbing 17 TD receptions, the best seasonal mark in SEC and UF history.
- Jeff Chandler joined the Gator program as a walk-on in 1998 and by the time he departed after the 2001 season, he had become UF's all-time leading scorer (368 points) and field-goal maker (67). He was a two-time semifinalist for the Groza Award, a two-time first-team All-SEC choice and a second-team All-American in 2001.
- The 1985 Gator team that finished 9-1-1 and fifth in the final national rankings had 18 prominent players that originally joined the program as walk-ons.
- Seven former Gator walk-ons – WR Lee McGriff, WR Chris Doering, DE Preston Kendrick, PK David Posey, QB Kerwin Bell, DB Louis Oliver and PK Jeff Chandler – have gone on to earn first-team All-SEC honors.
- The 2006 BCS National Championship squad featured 36 walk-ons, including five student-athletes that earned scholarships.

On March 13, 2010, junior running back Jeff Demps became the first student-athlete at the University of Florida to be a part of a national championship team in two different sports. Demps won the BCS National Championship in 2008 with the football team and the NCAA Championship in 2010 as a member of the indoor men's track team.

Heisman Trophy

- Florida is one of two schools in the SEC to have three Heisman winners
- Florida is one of nine schools nationally to have three or more winners of the prestigious award.
- Florida is one of only two schools in the nation with three quarterbacks to win the Heisman.
- Florida is one of three schools nationally to have multiple Heisman winners since 1996.
- Steve Spurrier became the first Heisman winner (1966) to coach a Heisman recipient (Danny Wuerffel in 1996).
- Danny Wuerffel is just one of 12 Heisman winners to lead his team to a national championship, pulling off the feat in 1996.
- Tim Tebow became the first sophomore to win the Heisman Trophy, claiming the award in 2007.

Dale Van Sichel
END
1928

Florida's first All-American. A two-way offensive and defensive standout. Noted as one of college football's premier pass receivers. Played on the nation's highest-scoring team (336 points in nine games). The late Van Sichel went on to become one of Hollywood's top stunt men for nearly five decades and was twice president of the Motion Picture Stunt Men's Association. Died as a result of complications from injuries in the 1960s.



Forrest "Fergie" Ferguson
END
1941

Great two-way end who made as many big plays on defense as he did on offense. Star receiver during days of limited passing attacks, he set records which would stand from the early 1940s until the pro-style passing game of the 1960s, including most receptions (43), receiving yards (668), TD passes in a season (five in 1941), longest scoring reception (74 yards from Tommy Harrison vs. Miami in 1941). Injured in Normandy invasion in 1944, awarded DSC for Gallantry in Action, and died of his war wounds in 1954.



Charlie LaPradd
TACKLE
1952

Rugged lineman who was an Army paratrooper prior to resuming his collegiate career. One of the most outstanding linemen in Florida history, he played offense and defense on the Gators' first bowl team, which won the 1953 Gator Bowl. Later went into coaching at FSU then began a career in athletic administration. Was president of St. John's River Community College from 1966-72. LaPradd passed away on Feb. 1, 2006.



John Barrow
GUARD
1956

Consensus All-American and SEC Lineman of the Year in 1956. Played in 1957 Senior Bowl game, plus North-South game. Went on to become an All-CFL lineman with Hamilton, playing 15 seasons. Retired and became general manager at Toronto and other CFL teams prior to going into business in Canada. His son, Greg, was a letterman Gator tackle in 1980.




Vel Heckman

1958

Came out of Pennsylvania to become one of the finest defensive tackles in Gator history. Not unusually big, he made up for it with great quickness and nose for the football. Played in 1959 Senior Bowl game. Following graduation, he went into coaching and finished his career in that area as head football coach at Lakeview of Winter Garden. Still resides in Winter Garden, where he is in private business.

In 1964, became only the third back in league history to earn first-team All-SEC for the third time. Captain and All-American that season. An explosive, quick and durable runner who was second on the all-time Florida rushing list with 1,725 yards in three seasons. Played in 1965 Coaches' All-American game. Currently in private business in his hometown of MacClenny, Fla.




Lynn Matthews

Quick, tough and competitive end generally regarded as the finest at his position during the Ray Graves decade at Florida. Three-year starter who capped his career by helping lead Gators to Sugar Bowl berth. Was noted as a "big play" man for his ability to force and recover fumbles and make tackles in enemy backfield. Former president of New York Times Regional Newspapers in Tampa.



Bruce Bennett
DEFENSIVE BACK
1965

Two-year All-SEC choice named top safety in the league in 1965 and first-team All-American the same season. Set school career record for interceptions with 13, tied for single-game mark with three. Defensive captain of 1966 Sugar Bowl team. Went on to All-CFL stardom with Regina, and after nearly a decade in that league he returned to coach high school football in Georgia. In 1999, named to Gainesville Sun's UF Team of the Century.



Larry Gagner
GUARD
1965

High school fullback converted to offensive guard. He started two seasons and helped lead the 1965 team into Sugar Bowl. Played in 1966 Senior Bowl and College All-Star game. Started on offensive line for Pittsburgh and Kansas City. Majored in art at Florida and is currently an artist in Tampa.



Charley Casey
END
1965

Two-time All-SEC and leading receiver in league history at the end of his career. Caught 58 passes to top SEC in 1965 and was second-leading career receiver for Florida with 123 catches from 1963-65. Academic All-SEC in 1965. In 1966, he played in Senior Bowl and Coaches' All-America Game. A stockbroker in Ft. Myers.

1966 Heisman Trophy Recipient







In his first three seasons in this NFL, he was an All-Pro wide receiver with Cincinnati Bengals. Now the color analyst for the NFL's Sunday Night Football. Came out of the shadow of his older brother Larry Little, All-Pro guard for years with the Miami Dolphins, to become one of the most outstanding linebackers in a long history of good ones at Florida. Started three years. Intercepted nine passes. Played in 1981 Japan Bowl and East-West game. Had 375 tackles during Gator career. A starter at LB for the Steelers for several years. In 1999 named to the Gainesville Sun's UF Team of the Century. Little passed away in 2005.



A consensus first-team All-America selection as a redshirt sophomore in 2001, only the second sophomore wide receiver in school history to achieve that distinction. A finalist for the Biletnikoff Award that season as the nation's premier wide receiver. His 27 TD catches over the course of the 2000-01 seasons ranked as the most for a player over the course of their combined freshman and sophomore seasons in major college history. National Freshman Player of the Year in 2000. A second-round selection in 2002 NFL Draft by the Houston Texans, has played nine seasons for Houston, New England and Denver.

Became the first sophomore QB in school history to garner first-team All-America honors in 2001. The runner up for the Heisman Trophy that year (only the fifth sophomore ever to rank in the top two of that balloting), and was named the National Player of the Year by Associated Press. A consensus All-American who was a first-team member of the following teams: AP, Walter Camp, *The Sporting News*, Football Writers Association, CollegeFootballNews.com, ESPN.com, CBSSportsline.com, Phil Steele. Was named the Player of the Year by the AP and CBSSportsline.com. Was a first-team Academic All-American. The recipient of the Walter V. Campbell Trophy in 2009. The only player in NCAA history to pass and run for 20-or-more touchdowns in a single season. His 23 rushing touchdowns were an SEC record among all players and an NCAA single-season record for quarterbacks. Passed for 32 touchdowns and his 55 touchdowns in 2007 combined established an SEC record. The only player in SEC Division IA history to have rushed and passed for at least one touchdown in 14 straight games. Set a new single season record for Florida in total offense with 4,181 yards in his sophomore campaign. At the conclusion of his collegiate career, he also held the NCAA record for highest passing efficiency rating (170.79) and SEC career records for most touchdowns responsible for (145), most rushing touchdowns (57), most total offense (12, 232 yards) and lowest pass attempt to interception ratio (1:62.2 passes). Was a member of the winningest class in SEC history, finishing their career at 48-7. Selected in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos. As a rookie he started the Broncos last three games of the 2010 season.

A finalist for the Bronko Nagurski, Chuck Benarik and Dick Butkus Awards, as well as a two-time semifinalist for the Lombardi Award and quarterfinalist for the Lott Trophy. A two-year captain of the winningest class in SEC history, going 48-7 record over four years, finishing his career with 307 total tackles, 31.5 tackles-for-loss, 14 pass breakups and 6.5 sacks. The only player in Florida's history to return four interceptions for touchdowns. Garnered first team All-SEC honors from the AP, Coaches' and *Sporting News* polls. During the 2008 BCS Championship run, the lone upperclassman led the team in tackles (93) and was a driving force on a defense which led the SEC in many defensive categories; points per game (12.9), red zone defense (69.2%), fourth down conversions allowed (33.3%), and turnover margin (1.57). Established UF records for receptions by a tight end in a single season and in a career (111). Caught for 50-or-more yards in 14 games, accumulating 1,382 yards in three seasons as a Gator. Selected to the first-team All-SEC by the AP, Coaches' and *Sporting News* polls, as well as Phil Steele in 2009. Was a fourth-round selection in the 2010 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots. As a rookie he accumulated 563 yards receiving on 45 catches, including six touchdowns.

A first-team All-American selection by the Walter Camp Football Foundation, Football Writers of America Association and *The Sporting News*. Awarded the Rimington Trophy, given to the nation's best center, after the 2009 season. Forrest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award

The Forrest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of the all-time great athletes at Florida. It goes annually to the senior football player who displays outstanding leadership, character and courage.

Ferguson started at end for the Gators from 1939-41 and wrote pass receiving records which would stand until the pro-style passing era of the 1960s. He was an All-American in 1941. He was also a collegiate state boxing champion and in 1942 won the National AAU javelin championship.

Fergie entered the Army in 1942 as a second lieutenant and was severely wounded in the Normandy Invasion in 1944. He won the Distinguished Service Cross for his heroism under fire. He died of his war wounds 10 years later.

James W. Kynes Award

Presented annually to the offensive lineman who best exemplified the mental and physical toughness and "iron-man" determination Kynes exhibited as a Gator player and in his lifetime.

Kynes, Florida's first All-SEC offensive lineman and captain of the 1949 team, was the last Gator football player to play every minute in a game, something he accomplished several times during his career, including in his final game against Alabama. He went on to become the youngest Attorney General in the state of Florida's history at age 37 and was a business and civic leader in Tampa until his death of cancer at age 60 on Oct. 13, 1988.

Close friends Tom MacDonald and George Levy originated the Kynes Award in 1986. The first recipient was offensive tackle David Williams.

Ray Graves Award

Presented annually to the team's Most Valuable Player as selected by a vote of the entire squad. Head coach Steve Spurrier initiated the award in 1990 in tribute to Graves, who was head coach from 1960-69.

He compiled a 70-31-4 record at the Gator helm, then the record for most wins (70) in school history for a head coach. Graves led Florida to winning records in nine of his 10 seasons at the helm, including nine or more wins three times. Graves' teams also appeared in five bowl games, posting a 4-1 record. He coached Florida's first Heisman Trophy winner in Spurrier, who captured college football's most prestigious honor in 1966.



The current Florida coaching staff boasts 53 years of NFL experience (35 coaching, 18 playing) and has won six Super Bowl rings. Charlie Weis has won four as an assistant coach (three with the Patriots, one with the Giants), while Bryant Young (49ers) and Derek Lewis (Rams) each won one during their playing careers.

Florida Players Selected in the First Round of the NFL Draft

- UF now has 43 all-time first-round draft picks in school history, the fourth best total in the nation and tops in the SEC. A breakdown of those selections includes nine running backs, nine defensive linemen, six wide receivers, six offensive linemen, five defensive backs, four linebackers and four quarterbacks.
- The Gators have had at least one first-round draft pick each of last five years, marking the longest active streak in the country. UF is the only school in the nation to have a first-round pick in each of the last five drafts. UF's total of eight first round draft picks in the last five drafts is tied for the top total in the nation.
- Florida has had a first-round draft pick at 11 different positions (C, QB, RB, FB, WR, OT, DE, DT, LB, CB, S).
- Florida tied a school record with three first round draft picks in 2010 (UF also had three in 1989).



Mike Pouncey was the sixth UF offensive lineman selected in the first round and at 15th overall was the third-highest OL ever drafted from Florida. The Gators have had a first-round OL in each of the past two seasons.

Florida Field Timeline

1906-1911

When the Gator football program first started up in 1906 under head coach James Forsythe, prior to the existence of The Swamp, Florida played home football games in Gainesville at the city ballpark. While the name of the park is unknown, the Gators compiled an 18-1-1 record from 1906-11.

1912-1929

From 1912-1929, Florida football was played at Fleming Field on the UF campus. Situated just north of the current Ben Hill Griffin Stadium, the Gators went 46-6-1 on Fleming Field prior to playing on Florida Field.

April 16, 1930

Construction begins on original Florida Field.

October 27, 1930

Construction completed on original Florida Field (capacity 21,769). The original stadium consisted of the lower half of the current stadium.

November 8, 1930

Dedication of Florida Field as sellout crowd of 21,769 watches Florida vs. Alabama. The legendary Red Barber, a UF student, calls the play-by-play.

October 13, 1934

Florida Field dedicated to memory of servicemen who died in World War I.

December 16, 1949

Plans drawn to add 11,200 seats to west stands. Expansion completed for 1950 season, bringing total capacity, including temporary bleachers, to 40,116.

September 23, 1950

The first night game is played at Florida Field versus The Citadel.

December 1965

Construction starts on east-side 10,000-seat addition, bringing permanent seating to 56,164. Also temporary bleachers moved to south end zone for total capacity of 62,800 during 1966 season.

April 1971

Artificial surface installed.

August 1982

Completion of south end zone, bringing capacity to 72,000. Athletic training center, skybox tower and modern press box also involved in this project.

September 9, 1989

Football stadium named Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field during dedication ceremonies. The stadium is named in honor of Ben Hill Griffin Jr., a life-long Gator supporter and fan who had been extremely benevolent and generous to several sectors at the University of Florida.

June 30, 1990

Natural grass replaces artificial turf at Florida Field.

September 1991

Construction completed on new north end zone. Capacity now stands at 83,000, making Florida Field one of the eight largest on-campus collegiate football stadiums in the nation and the largest in the state of Florida. The north end zone addition costs \$17 million, but involves no state funding.

November 30, 1991

Ben Hill Griffin Stadium is the site of the largest football crowd (collegiate or professional) in state of Florida history (85,461 vs. FSU). During the 1991 and 1992 seasons, the stadium will be the site of the 12 largest crowds in state history.

October 12, 1991

The official dedication of the new north end zone is held as Florida meets Tennessee. Red Barber, who called the original dedication game in 1930, is UF's special guest of honor.

End of 1991 Season

Head Coach Steve Spurrier tags Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field "The Swamp." Spurrier says, "The Swamp is where Gators live. We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Prior to 1998 Season

Florida completes a \$5 million renovation of the Ben Hill Griffin Training Complex in the south endzone, making the facility one of the nation's elite.

Prior to 2003 Season

Construction completed on a two-year, \$50 million stadium expansion/renovation that includes the addition of 2,900 luxury club seats, expanded press level, renovated and enlarged Bull Gator Deck, enlarged President's Suite and 34 additional suites funded by private support from Gator Boosters and fans.

Prior to 2004 Season

A high-resolution video board highlights the brand new Daktronics scoreboard in the north end of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium. In addition, a state-of-the-art sound system is installed throughout the stadium. The project cost is \$2 million.

February 2007

Construction to the southwest area of the stadium begins, including renovation to the football offices, weight room, training room and team areas.

August 2008

The \$28 million in construction and renovation to the James W. "Bill" Heavener Football Complex is completed, including an expansion of the strength and conditioning room, a new Gator Room, renovation to the football offices and a trophy complex with a tribute to Gator greats.

August 2009

Prior to the 2009 season, construction is completed on a \$5.6 million project installing Daktronics HD-16 high resolution screens to replace the old north and south end zone scoreboards.

April 2011

Statues of Florida's three Hesiman winners -- Steve Spurrier, Danny Wuerffel and Tim Tebow -- are unveiled on the west side of the stadium at halftime of the spring game.

Dr. J. Bernard Machen

Bernie Machen has led the University of Florida since he took office as the 11th president in January 2004.

During his tenure, Dr. Machen has expanded the university's research and scholarship endeavors, elevated its educational programs and increased access to students from a diversity of economic backgrounds – all while shepherding the university through an era of growing financial challenges.

Under President Machen's leadership, UF's annual research funding has soared to \$678 million, including a \$64 million grant for research on aging that is the largest in UF's history. He has presided over a major expansion of research facilities, including the 280,000-square-foot Cancer and Genetics Research Complex, the university's largest research building. Dr. Machen has also nurtured UF's technology commercialization enterprise, spearheading the development of a 25-acre innovation community within walking distance of UF's main campus.

He has hired more than 60 new professors through the "Jumpstart" initiative recruiting prominent scientists and promising junior faculty members during a period when most universities are thinning their faculty ranks. To support UF's nearly 5,000 full-time faculty members, he instituted the UF's Faculty Challenge and Faculty Now campaigns, raising \$393 million for research and instructional assistance for faculty and graduate students.

Leadership in development is hallmark of President Machen's administration. He has presided over UF's Florida Tomorrow capital campaign, a five-year effort that has raised \$1.31 billion toward a goal of \$1.5 billion by 2012.

A longtime advocate for giving students from all walks of life the chance to attend college, Dr. Machen in 2005 pioneered the Florida Opportunity Scholars program, which pays tuition and room and board for students from families earning less than \$40,000 annually and who are the first in their families to attend college. As of spring 2011, nearly 2,000 students – more than three quarters from minority populations – had attended UF as recipients of the scholarship. Dr. Machen also spearheaded a new alternative spring-summer academic schedule to begin in 2012 that will eventually open UF's doors to an additional 2,000 students.

Like other universities nationwide, UF has faced several years of declining state support. Dr. Machen has led Florida's 11 public universities' response to these declines, successfully advocating lawmakers to step up statewide tuition increases while allowing universities greater flexibility in setting their own tuition. Lawmakers have also funded a major UF research facility near Orlando, and in 2011 they relocated the Institute for the Commercialization of Public Research to UF's Florida Innovation Hub.

President Machen's administration has been marked by a strong commitment to environmental causes, including launching a university-wide sustainability campaign that is considered a model in public higher education. The UF Water Institute also was created during his time at UF, and a UF-owned and managed nature preserve was designated as a National Science Foundation-sponsored National Ecological Observatory Network, or NEON, site.

Prior to his arrival at UF, Dr. Machen served for six years as president of the University of Utah, where he is credited with expanding the health sciences program, stabilizing the university's finances and bolstering diversity.

From 1995 to 1997, he was provost and executive vice president for academic affairs at the University of Michigan, and from 1989 until 1995, he served as dean of Michigan's School of Dentistry. From 1983 to 1989, he was professor and associate dean at the University of North Carolina Chapel Hill's School of Dentistry.

President Machen has held several prominent positions in national higher education leadership. Since 2005, he has served as a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board. He chaired the Board of Directors of the National Campus Compact from 2002-2004 and served as a member of the board beginning in 1998. Additionally, beginning in 2010, he served as President of the Executive Committee of the Southeastern Conference and Chair of the Southeastern Conference Academic Consortium.

In 1987, Dr. Machen was president of the American Association of Dental Schools. From 1992 to 1995, he was a member of the National Academy of Science's Institute of Medicine Committee on Educating Dentists for the Future. He has a past appointment as chief of the Department of Extension Service at the U.S. Army Institute of Dental Research.

A native of Greenwood, Mississippi, Dr. Machen grew up in St. Louis. After attending Vanderbilt University for his undergraduate studies, he earned his doctor of dental surgery degree from St. Louis University and his master of science degree in pediatric dentistry and doctorate in educational psychology from the University of Iowa.

President Machen and his wife, Chris, a former neonatal intensive care nurse, live in Gainesville. They have two sons: Lee, an engineer at Intel in Portland; Michael, an attorney in Chicago; a daughter, Maggie, a veterinarian and resident in small animal cardiology at the University of Pennsylvania, and four grandchildren.

Members of the IAC include six faculty, two students, the faculty athletics representative, two administrators and three nonvoting ex-officio members from the UAA.

Jeremy N. Foley

Jeremy N. Foley, who has handled virtually every aspect of the University of Florida's \$96 million athletic program during his athletic administrative career – which began with an internship in the Gator Ticket Office in 1976 – was named UF's Director of Athletics in March of 1992. He is the fourth longest tenured athletic director among Bowl Championship series conference schools.

A man with great vision and experience, Foley, 58, brings a passionate top-to-bottom team approach to the top athletic post at the University of Florida. Foley's philosophy involves the continued building of a comprehensive athletic program, with the goal of having the overall UF program ranked as the top athletic program in the nation.

As chief financial officer for the University Athletic Association (UAA), Foley has spearheaded a number of capital improvement projects in the athletic department. The project list includes two major expansions of the football stadium, a multipurpose athletic field house, new facilities for tennis, track & field, soccer, baseball, golf, softball, swimming and lacrosse. Foley also played a role in the academic advising center on the University of Florida campus, which serves UF students and Gator student-athletes and assisted in funding the renovation of the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. The James W. "Bill" Heavener Football Complex, a project that enhanced the football experience for Gator student-athletes, staff and visitors, was completed in July of 2008 and received platinum certification from the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Green Building Rating System, the highest ranking available. It was the first building in Florida and the first athletic facility in the nation to achieve platinum status. Foley's most recent project was the lacrosse facility – a 1,500 seat-stadium offering fans a great view of this fast-paced sport – completed prior to the inaugural season in the spring of 2010.

Foley's commitment to the overall athletic program includes a plan of increased opportunities for women, as three women's sports have been added under his tenure – soccer, softball and lacrosse.

Also, in an era when the NCAA estimates 90 percent of Division I schools are losing money on intercollegiate athletics, the University of Florida Athletic Association has contributed more than \$61 million in the last 21 years to help fund University of Florida academic endeavors.

Florida has been equally successful on the field of play and in the classroom during Foley's administrative tenure. The Florida athletic program has ranked among the nation's top 10 for 28-straight years (1983-84 – 2010-11) and among the top five for 14 times in the of the last 21 years, according to national all-sport rankings.

UF became the first program in collegiate history to own both the men's basketball and football national titles in the same calendar year, after capturing crowns in 2006. The men's

basketball team then became the first repeat champions in their sport in 15 years after cutting the nets down again in 2007.

Foley is the only athletic director in Division I history to supervise a program that has won multiple national titles in football (1996, 2006, 2008) and men's basketball (2006, 2007) and overall 17 Gator teams have been crowned national champions under his watch.

The 2010-11 athletic year was another banner year in Gainesville. The men's indoor track and field team and the women's tennis team won national championships and seven teams (volleyball, gymnastics, softball, baseball, women's tennis, men's indoor track and field, men's outdoor track and field) were ranked No. 1 in their respective sports at one point during the season.

In Southeastern Conference action, Florida picked up seven league crowns in 2010-11 action (Volleyball, Soccer, Women's Cross Country, Men's Basketball, Men's Indoor Track and Field, Women's Tennis, Men's Golf). UF has now has a total of 200 SEC titles since the league began in 1932 and half of those SEC titles have come under Foley's watch. In addition, the lacrosse team won the American Lacrosse Conference regular season title in just the program's second year.

UF's commitment in the classroom is equally impressive. Under Foley, UF student-athletes have been honored 82 times as Academic All-Americans. The University of Florida has more than 2,500 SEC Academic Honor Roll honorees since 1992-93.

The Gator athletic coaching family, which Foley had a large part in assembling, has collected 69 conference Coach-of-the-Year awards during the last 19 years. The Gators had an amazing 10 coaches earn the league coach of the year honors during the 2010-11 year. Equally impressive is that 10 UF student athletes won their respective conference player of the year in 2010-11.

Gator student athletes, coaches and administrators have also been a fixture in the community, taking part in a variety of community related endeavors.

Florida student athletes remained involved in the community and beyond. A total of 434 UF student athletes have participated in 4,588 hours of community service in 2010-11, partnering with 22 schools, 10 civic organizations and 27 non-profit organizations. Florida was honored with a White House commendation for volunteerism in 1994.

Foley was named the Street & Smith's SportsBusiness Journal National Athletic Director of the Year in June of 2006 and the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame awarded him the 2007 John L. Toner Award. The Toner Award is designed to honor and acknowledge outstanding athletics directors who have demonstrated superior administrative abilities especially in the area of college football.

Foley also served on the NCAA Division I Management Council from 1997-2002.

Foley was named Honorary Alumnus of the University of Florida by the Florida Alumni Association Board of Directors in October of 2000.

Born in Washington, D.C., but calling New London, N.H.,

home, Foley received his undergraduate degree in 1974 from Hobart College in Geneva, N.Y., where he also coached and scouted for the tradition-rich lacrosse program following graduation. He went on to earn his Master's Degree in Sports Administration from Ohio University in 1976 and then joined the Gator athletic program as an intern in the ticket office. In 1995, the Ohio Graduate School presented Foley with the school's Distinguished Alumni Award. The Ohio University Alumni Association also awarded Foley with the Medal of Merit in September of 2008.

In 2008, the Hobart Alumni Association presented Foley with the Medal of Excellence, their highest honor, for outstanding achievements as Athletic Director at the University of Florida, which has brought honor and distinction to his alma mater.

The Holderness School, a small, private, college preparation school in Plymouth, New Hampshire presented Foley, class of 1970, with their 2007 Distinguished Alumni Award in November of 2007.

An avid sports and Boston Red Sox fan, Foley ran the Boston Marathon in a 3:39.51 clip in April of 1995 and completed the course in 3:28.10 in 1998. A dog lover and proud owner of one Labrador retriever, he is involved with the Humane Society and local charities.

- The Florida athletic program swept the SEC All-Sports standings for the third year in a row and the 11th time overall in 2010-11.
- The men's golf team captured Florida's 200th SEC title in April and UF now has 201 team titles all time, the most of any conference school.
- Florida won nine conference titles in 2010-11; UF had a league-high eight SEC crowns and the lacrosse team won the regular season title in the American Lacrosse Conference.
- The Gators picked up an astounding 12 conference Athlete of the Year awards (11 SEC, 1 ALC) during the 2010-11 school year and 10 Coach of the Year awards (9 SEC, 1 ALC).
- UF has added three athletic programs since 1995 (soccer, softball, lacrosse) and all three advanced to the NCAA Tournament in just their second season of play. The lacrosse team earned the No. 4 national seed in 2011 in just the programs second season.
- Seven teams had a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) as reported by the NCAA in October of 2010 and had an overall GSR of 82 percent, ranking second in the SEC behind Vanderbilt.
- 68 Gator student-athletes graduated during the 2010-11 school year and 49 (72%) of them were part of a national and/or Southeastern Conference championship team during their Gator careers. 40 of those graduates earned Academic All-SEC honors during their time at UF.

Compliance Information

NCAA Rules Education Prospective Student-Athletes

PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETE

You are a “prospective student-athlete” when you start ninth-grade classes. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if a college gives you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

You become a “recruited prospective student-athlete” at a particular college if any coach or representative of the college’s athletics interest (booster or representative) approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college. Activities by coaches or boosters that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are:

- providing you with an official visit;
- visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus;
- placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family; or
- signing a National Letter of Intent or a University of Florida written offer of athletically related financial aid.

ACADEMICS AND AMATEURISM

It is extremely important for you to give maximum academic effort as you conclude your high school attendance while maintaining your amateur status before entering college. To practice or play during your freshman year, you must meet the provisions of NCAA Bylaw 14.3, which include: (a) graduating from high school, (b) achieving a minimum cumulative grade point average in 16 core courses, and achieving a corresponding minimum combined score on the SAT, or a minimum sum total score on the ACT as determined by the NCAA Eligibility Center. You must also meet the provisions of Bylaw 12.3, which include verification that you have retained your amateur status prior to entering college. The NCAA Eligibility

Center must certify the initial-eligibility and amateur status of all incoming freshman student-athletes. Therefore, you must register with the Eligibility Center as soon as possible. For online web access contact: www.eligibilitycenter.org.

INDUCEMENTS

All institutional staff members and boosters are prohibited from offering or providing any financial aid or other benefits to you or your relatives or friends other than those expressly permitted by NCAA regulations. Specifically prohibited inducements include:

- providing cash or loans in any amount, or
- signing or co-signing for a loan
- providing gifts of any kind, including clothing or equipment
- providing special discounts for goods or services
- providing free or reduced housing/rent
