July 2001	Judith Collins, in July 2001, as chairwoman of the Casino Control Authority ruled on SkyCity's application for an earlier \$37 million expansion project. As now, it wanted permission for new gaming tables and gaming machines to help fund the building of new convention facilities.  Collins permitted 12 new gambling tables and 230 gaming machines, agreeing with the applicant that the new facility "would be likely to have a substantial positive impact on tourism, employment and economic development" in Auckland.
