Audi A4 1.8 with CVT

The all-new A4 is an obvious contender, but we went with the front-drive four-door sedan with the 1.8-litre low-pressure turbocharged engine. The German sedan is attractive, both inside and out, and surprisingly swift. The four-cylinder engine delivers decent outputs across a broad rev range, with 118kW between 4500 and 6200 revs and 250Nm from 1500 to 4500 revs. Driving the front wheels through a continuously-variable transmission helps make any trip a smooth, quiet and swift event that won't break the bank when it comes to filling up. Importantly, the ride quality of the new A4 is better sorted than its predecessors and the overall package is quality, confidence and competence. Stuart Martin - Adelaide Advertiser

BMW 135i auto

More proof that great things come in small packages. The baby BMW's edgy styling won't win any beauty prizes and the two-door body is a pain, but think of V8 performance from a compact coupe and you get the picture. This is an indulgent driver's car with a Jekyl-and-Hyde personality: well mannered and almost docile when not pushed, but a master blaster when you ride the turbo-packed surge of power . The 135i Sport has brilliant performance, reassuring handling, ballsy brakes and razor-sharp steering which can be controlled by the throttle. Fiat 500 1.4

According to carsguide.com.au, the Fiat 500 would be at home in Rome, Paris or inner-metropolitan Australia. It is a "slick city, ideal for commuting in style" and a "tremendous revision of the original" 500*. There are a multitude of choices for buyers starting from the base Pop model and branching out to either the Sport or more luxury-oriented Lounge. There are also millions of different options when choosing exterior colours, trim colours, patterns and stripes. The 1.4 litre engine in the Sport also packs some punch.

The Italian baby is a dinky little city car that is right at home in the centre of the action. But when you do hit the open road, you'll be pleasantly surprised. The 1.4-litre pumps out a respectable 74kW and it will happily maintain 110km/h in sixth gear, enough to keep pace with B-Doubles which dwarf the baby Fiat and can buffet it around. Tackling hills, though, requires liberal use of the sweet shifting gearbox to maintain momentum. Cabin ambience is a plus and most drivers will find an agreeable driving position. Luggage space behind the rear seats however is miniscule so pack lightly. The bonus around town, and even on the highway, is the car's excellent fuel economy. But you'll need it as the fuel tank only holds 35 litres. Neil McDonald - Herald Sun

<u>Volkswagen Tiguan TDi</u>

It may have a funny name _ made up, they say, from tiger and iguana _ but there is nothing silly about the Tiguan. This second cousin to a Golf is a delight to drive, belying the fact that it is a soft-roader. With few of the vices associated with many SUVs trying to be all things to all people, the Tiguan is a relaxed drive with high levels of noise, vibration and harshness exclusion. The well-proven 2-litre turbodiesel is suited to the car with ample performance from its 103kW and 320Nm available over a reasonable spread. Interior space is good with room and comfort guaranteed for four adults and space left over for a child in the rear seat. Boot space is sufficient for a small family weekend away but capable of being considerably increased by folding part or all of the rear seat. Kevin Hepworth - Daily Telegraph
