ANTI-SEXIST PRACTICE!

A thing I like about Big Flame politics is our commitment to feminist/socialist politics. Feminism is not just about 'women's issues', rather a way in which we are all struggling for liberation. That's the theory.

Now, I went to a BF dayschool in January where, after separate women's and men's meetings, the men came back with a list of titles for articles that we were going to write for the paper about anti-sexism and how we brought it into our politics. One woman said she was really pleased to hear that but she'd believe it when she read the articles in print and not before. Other women laughed but the men were quiet, to be honest I was a bit peeved at first, but then I realized I'd heard it all before as well.



'BUT IT'S ALL SO DIFFI-CULT, ISN'T IT?'

M ost people are involved mainly around one particular area of politics which takes up most of their time. Do any BF men have anti-sexism as a prior-

ity for political work?
One good reason why not is that feminism isn't just another area in which we fight oppression, but that feminism and socialism go hand in hand, that we'll get nowhere unless the demands of women about society - feminist demands - are accepted as the demands of us all. This means putting a femi-nist perspective into all our work on Ireland, tenants groups, anti-racism, the struggle to be able to define our own sexual-

But men are not doing it! I know I don't challenge sexism in myself and other men the way I challenge racism against Irish people (I'm Irish so that comes a lot easier). The one thing all

BF men agree on is how hard it

I still remember my embarassment at trying to explain why I thought shared childcare and other anti-sexist practices were revolutionary to a man who thought anything other than 'building the party' was a waste of time. I was embarassed because his whole attitude seemed to call my manhood into question, talking about kids when I should be fighting the state.
The threat of getting a kicking or putting our lives at risk from fascists and the state does not stop us practically campaigning in solidarity with the Irish strug-gle. But the damage to our pride and the threat to our masculinity is enough to assure that practical campaigning around 'feminist solidarity' never gets

off the ground.
Our anti-sexist politics are right and crucial, we need to learn how to apply them to our lives. There's only one way, practice!



FOCUS FOR ANTI-SEXIST PRACTICE

I'm suggesting that some men choose anti-sexism as a priority for political work. I am not saying that feminism has now become 'just another issue', I am not saying that most men can now take it easy because some men are 'doing' anti-sexist work Feminism is and must be at the centre of our politics.
Anti-sexist men need to find

ways of sharing our ideas and

experience of anti-sexist practice. How?

Male violence against women or the threat of it is one of the most obvious ways in which men maintain their oppression of women. We can publicly op-pose men's violence with our friends, our workmates, in our unions and elsewhere. But that's still talking.

We can consistently graffiti on walls with feminist de-

mands in line with the political work women are doing.

* We can print stickers ag-ainst pornography, take them to our local W.H. Smith (etc) and stick them on the inside of porn magazines there. A man who opens 'Penthouse' and finds 'Rapists read porn', 'Keep your sperm to yourself', and 'Women will fight back', will feel uncom-fortable and is unlikely to buy porn from that shop again.



We can help to fund Rape Crisis Centres and women's re-fuges, continually asking men to contribute financially to the work

If we haven't children of our own, there's always the other people on our branch/workplace/ street. Minding kids is just as pólitical as writing a leaflet. We can do it alone, or even better, with other

men.

* We must be prepared to give practical support to women's groups such as WAVAW. At all times we should be accountable to the women's organisations involved.

'HITTING THE HEAD-LINES'

One thing we don't do is march from Hyde Park to Trafalgar Square with a placard

saving 'sexism out now' Mon are too keen on political work which is seen as being 'up front', activities where women can actually see us doing a fine job and we can feel pious about it. At the moment, I'm not sure about picketing films such as 'Dressed to Kill' and occupying porn shops, partly for this reason.



THE PERSONAL IS POLI-TICAL

When women look after children, we in BF believe that they are doing an unpaid full-time job and that this is political. When men look after children, we (men) see it as giving women the time to organise politically and do other things than changing nappies. We have not yet accepted that childcare is as politically important as going on a demo.
Anti-sexism involves support ing feminist demands on us

as men. It will not bring re-flected glory.

Right, what about these short articles on anti-sexism we promised to write? I'm going to do one for next month's paper on why men shouldn't use porn. I'm going to try to write it in a way that it can be cut out and stuck up for men to read in work, the launder-ette and the back of bus seats. It's important to spread our ideas by using written pieces

over and over again. Meanwhile, if you're reading this, Nye, I liked what you were trying to say in your letters to this paper, please keep writing and struggling.

HOME THOUGHT FROM ABROAD 3 repudiations

The dramatic turn taken in the old dispute between Argentina and Britain over the Malvinas is likely to have tragic consequences for the peoples of both countries.

In the face of these events and the sometimes hasty interpretation given to the different currents of Argentinian opinion, we, the undersigned, Argentinian exiles and residents in France, repudiate:

1) The sending of the British fleet to the South Atlantic which we consider to be an act of colon ialist aggression;

2) The use by the military power of the just claim of the Argentinian people - their indisputable sover-eignty over the Malvinas archipelago - in order to make them for-get the permanent violation of human rights and the economic, political, cultural and trade union dismantling which it has pursued for the last six years. The law at present being drafted by the junta which allows for the handing over of Argentinian underground resources to private capital - i.e. foreign capital - demonstrates if it is necessary, the little credit that should be accorded to the nationalist' motivations of the Argentinian military.
3) The support given in various

forms by the superpowers to the criminal regime of the Argentinian generals.

In the present case, they are trying to give the regime a false 'anticolonialist' image which will allow it to continue exporting oppression to Central America, as it has done up to now in the other countries of the Southern Cone of Latin Ame-

Only a democratically-elected government will be able to legiti-mately achieve the national aspirations of the Argentinian people.
