In the life of the Church 1966 will prove a momentous year; for it will be the year in which the post-conciliar commissions proceed to translate the decrees of the Second Vatican Council into the terms in which they will be incorporated into the teaching, general outlook, and activity of the Church ...

Pope Paul VI has made it clear that he is troubled at some of the manifestations of what may be called theological vitality and high spirits ... *Aggiornamento* can have both a good and a bad side: good where it means

getting rid of habits of mind and speech which come out of a very different past; but bad if it means trying to adapt the Church to the values, and even to the moods, of the contemporary world ...

What Chesterton wrote of individuals – that there were few more valuable things a man could do than to resist the major tendencies of his own day, because they would almost certainly be carried to excess ... with most men following the fashion they find – is uniquely true of Church.

Pope Benedict XV's Christmas message: A cloud of sadness darkens, this year, the happy celebration of the Nativity. We are confronted again with the savage spectacle of human slaughter; and if, last year, we deplored the extent, the ferocity, and all the results of this tremendous conflict, we must to-day mourn over the wider spread, the greater pertinacity, the excess, which, with their terrible consequences, have turned the world to an ossuary and a hospital, and the progress of

human civilization to an anti-Christian retrogression.

How many times has our heart sought refuge in prayer as in the only hope of safety! If God does not give succour, what is there that we can do?

Called to the government of the Church in the most terrible days in all history, we fondly hoped that the love of the father might not prove altogether unfruitful. Vain hope! ... Every wish, every hope, every project has been shattered. Indeed here also we have been compelled to confess ourselves powerless.




