Parking is not enforced after 4 p.m. on Fridays. Rwanda suffered a devastating genocide in 1994. Close to a million were killed by neighbors, friends and even family members. Horror swept through the entire country. And when it was over, those who remained were broken, dead inside. The country has made great strides in economic recovery, but "people are not like roads and buildings" says Kiki Katese, a pioneering Rwandan theater director. "How do we rebuild a human being?" Kiki decided to start Ingoma Nshya, Rwanda's first and only women's drumming troupe, open to women from both sides of the conflict. There was only one requirement: to leave the categories of the past at the gate. For the women—orphans, widows, wives and children of perpetrators—the group has been a place to begin to live again, to build new relationships, to heal the wounds of the past. Yet the struggle to survive and provide for their families still persists. So when Kiki came up with the idea to open Rwanda's first and only ice cream shop, the women were intrigued ... What was ice cream exactly and how would they do it? Kiki invited Jennie and Alexis of Brooklyn's Blue Marble Ice Cream to come to Rwanda to help the drummers open their shop, which they aptly named Inzozi Nziza (Sweet Dreams). Sweet Dreams follows this remarkable group of Rwandan women as they emerge from the devastation of the genocide to create a new future for themselves. "Because of our history, people know how to fight against, but not for," Kiki says. "We want to change that equation." For more on the film, you can go to

The Grand Finale of the Tamejavi Culture and Art Series takes place from 6:30 – 9 p.m. at La Plaza Arte Americas, 1630 Van Ness Ave, Fresno. This will be the culmination of a unique 18-month program that celebrates the diversity of the Valley's immigrant population. Combining the artistic multiplicities of dance, music, poetry, storytelling, theater and photography, the Grand Finale will synthesize the stories of seven fellows into a universal story that conveys the human side of migration. The experience will allow the audience to hear firsthand about the struggles and challenges immigrants face when beginning a new life in America. The ultimate goal is for these stories to serve as

the inspiration for building more welcoming communities – those that acknowledge immigrants new and old as positive contributors to the Valley's economic, social and cultural wellbeing. The Central Valley's social and cultural identities have long been defined by the immigrant groups drawn to this region to work in industrial food production. Besides contributing the fruits of their labor, immigrants bring with them their own food production systems, culinary traditions and consumption practices, along with innovative cultural and artistic traditions that help shape this region's distinctly diverse landscape. TCAS ran from March through August and included eight separate events in four Central Valley cities: Fresno, Madera, Livingston and the unincorporated town of Tonyville in Tulare County. Ten fellows made up of Mexican Indigenous, Salvadorian, Hmong, Cambodian, Punjab and African-American immigrants spent 18 months interacting in a multicultural environment and honing their cultural organizing skills. Within their learning groups, the fellows studied their community's pressing concerns while gathering cultural and artistic assets, and then communicated their findings with a public story. Through art and cultural expression, their presentations illustrated stories of resilience to war trauma, cultural colonization, social inequity, intergenerational cultural gaps and immigrant youth identity definition. Audiences attending the Grand Finale will have the opportunity engage in five cultural and artistic spaces:

> The Artistic Expression Space The Human Side of Migration

Through theater skits, storytelling, poetry, music and dance, this act narrates the experiences Central Valley immigrants face when leaving their homelands. It illustrates the pain families face when leaving their homeland in search of a better life, how it feels to be forced from your home and left to seek refuge in a strange place, and the repercussions of losing your cultural identity.

The Food Tunnel

Food, Spices, Herbs: The Journey of Flavors

This cultural space will activate the audience's senses while they enjoy the aromas and flavors of herbs, spices and crops that have made their way into the Valley's cuisine with the arrival of immigrants from Asia and the Americas. Audiences will hear stories of how hierva santa, papalo, epazote, cilantro, turmeric, ginger and other spices and herbs essential to the culinary and healing practices of indigenous people became staples in Valley homes and markets.

The Media Space

Constructing a Humane Migration Narrative

The media space will engage audiences in social media forum discussions on the issues of cultural organizing, decolonization and identity, while giving guests the opportunity to share their own migration stories.

The Photo Gallery
The Faces of Migration

Audiences visiting the photo gallery will have the opportunity to meet the Tamejavi fellows and see firsthand their communities' cultural and artistic expressions. The Hmongstory 40 project will present a second photo gallery.
