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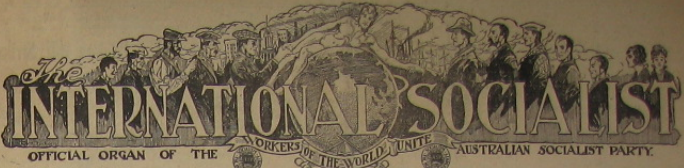

THE STRONG MAN: A CARTOON FOR LABOUR DAY MAY. "Yes, there can be no doubt about your strength, if you can support all those; but don't you think its time to take a holiday?"

One of the First of May of the victorious proletariat, arising organised on the ruling class. The leaders of this Congress were the French Proletarian and Hyndman, who in the end, became the greatest of French Socialists...

The Secret of the League.

Everybody knows that ordinary trade, occupying some themselves at a certain stage in their development and under certain conditions, will come to an agreement. Such agreements may be merely superficial and temporary, intended to be renewed only, but they may also be more stable... (text continues)

The problem of the undertakings between Great Powers may be divided into two parts. Have the existing circumstances created the conditions necessary for the formation of a coalition, of a syndicate, of a trust of the great capitalist trusts?

The first thing is to answer this question. No. So far we have had nothing which resembles a syndicate of all the Great Powers, nothing but groups of them. There were two conditions. Looking at them, we see that the conditions were not such as to encourage them to general coalitions. Nevertheless, by their

intentioned acquisition of Spain, Colombia and semi-colonies will be pilfered full steam ahead. Under such circumstances, an agreement between the master thieves is necessary, in order to secure to each their own downfall. Without it, the capitalist world will soon be an empty shell.

What will be the next grouping of the Powers?

Compromises between opponents are generally concluded where there is force. When the combatant party has the upper hand there is no reason whatever to compromise, for it can take by force what it cannot get by agreement. At the present point of view, it must be said that there is no compromise.

THE DAWN OF THE NEW ERA

By COLIN WADE. In the following translations and synopses of articles in the Socialist Press of Europe, Comrade Wade throws light on European events which will be of considerable value to our readers to read the capitalist cables in their true setting.

ROMANIA. After the departure of the German troops of occupation, active organization began among the workers, who for two years endured the greatest hardships. Strikes occurred everywhere, and the membership of the Socialist Party and of the trade unions rapidly increased. Romania, rapidly became a powerful force in the country, so much so that the Premier, Bratianu, decided to expel it. An caucus was hastily formed. It followed on a strike of typists, which met with the support of all organized labor in Bucharest, the government started to "restore order."

A great number of strikers was taking place at the Socialist Club, which, proving too small, the speakers were driven to the adjoining public square, Troika (the whole of the 9th Bureau) was broken up. For fear that they might refuse the dirty job, they had been liberally supplied with brandy. This fortified them, they appeared on the scene. Machine guns came into action, and more than two hundred workers were killed or wounded. (How like America!)

Britania was still dissatisfied. Military brutality increased. More than two hundred human Socialists were arrested, including the executives of the Socialist Party standing slow to the Socialist Party and their treatment in prison was that of one of the Socialist leaders died of it.

One of the usual Government excuses was German gold. The Socialists were organizing the revolution as part of a German plot.

The majority of the prisoners have regained their liberty, their complete innocence being demonstrated. All this took place a year ago, the situation on December 20th, 1919. It is the opposite effort to that desired by the bourgeoisie. Today, 100,000 workers have organized and have become powerful enough to drive all the other parties into a single national bloc, comprising the Conservatives and Liberals and the People's League.

On the anniversary of the big murder, 25/12/19, more than 50,000 workers marched through Budapest with folded arms, mourning to the bourgeoisie the approach of their last hour.

SPAIN. At the end of 1918 there were in the Socialist Party 250 branches and 18,000 members. A year later the figure rose to 400 branches and 24,000 members.

After a heated discussion the second motion was carried by 14,020 to 12,487. However, an amendment proposed by the Federation of Anarches was also carried, making the following a condition of admission, viz: "If at the Geneva Congress every real and sincere effort is not made to secure Socialist unity on the basis of the class struggle, the Party will give its adherence to the Third International."

It was apparent at the discussion that the general opinion was that the Party must advance with and largely depend on the movement in England and France. This feeling caused the carrying of the above resolution, in spite of the general opinion that the Second International could never succeed in uniting the Socialist forces of the world.

Another notable resolution at the Congress was one affirming the necessity of independent class action, and renouncing any alliance or co-operation with any bourgeois party.

Russia has long recognized the independence of Finland, but as in a position to do so immediately crushing blow if she has her aspirations.

The Soviet Government has achieved a master stroke in relating to its cause these Muscovite populations residing from the Caucasus to the Himalayas.

These people are not acting solely from religious motives. It is palpably false to describe them as eternally opposed to the progress from the Kairen. They are better educated and better organized on foreign affairs than is generally believed. Russian Socialism has appeared to them as a means to freedom. Rightly or wrongly they have recognized the possibility of a new method. And that is why the advance of the Red Army beyond the Caucasus is so negligible, instead, and why their propaganda in the country between Old Russia and the valleys of the Ganges and the Tethys has achieved such surprising results.

Today the whole of Central Asia is full of rumors. England has already been accused by my suspicion of the Meas in India. To save India she has always been refused her goal and brutal interference against Constantinople and its associates.

It is not only England that is concerned in the development of the Meas in India. Italy is interested in Libya, and of this Italy has what an interest in the Central Asia, too, but to give on its part with Moscow.

ARMENIA. England, and incidentally the Peace Conference, as in a large measure about Asia Minor and Turkey have in general been unopposed.

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FINLAND. The Socialist Congress took place in December. Animated debates resulted in a decision condemning any compromise with the bourgeoisie, and to make a striking protest against the blockade of Russia. The immediate conclusion of peace with Moscow was demanded.

Last month some of the Baltic coast most representative in Helsingfors as a result of the Allied pressure. The most interesting happening at the Congress was the attitude of the Finns, who offered to lead another attempt against Russia if England and Co. would step up. Of course, it came to nothing, for so the Socialists who represent the bulk of the Finns, position demand immediate peace with Russia, so the Finnish population also desires peace. 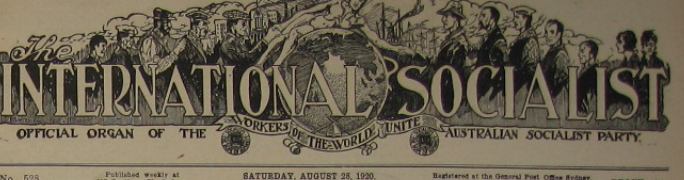

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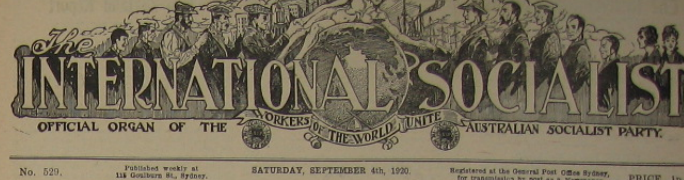

Women's Delegate Conferences were organised, which have rendered great services in this sense. These delegate conferences are composed of representatives from all the factories and works of the given ward or town, elected at general meetings of the undertakings. They play the part of institutions by means of which working women learn in practice how to carry on Soviet work, how to apply their forces and revolutionary energy to the common proletarian struggle and work of reconstruction. From another point of view, they constitute an excellent link between the Soviet institution and the masses of working women.

The delegates break up into groups, working in one or another Soviet institution (mainly, hitherto, in the following sections: social hygiene, education, health), and they assist in the creation, invention, and control of creches, homes, children's parks, elementary and other schools, public dining halls and kitchens. In this way, through the medium of the delegate conferences, it becomes possible to reach the widest possible masses of women workers, and more and more they begin to take an active part in the work of the Party and the Soviets can draw new forces.

This was strikingly illustrated by the Party "week" in Moscow, for example, where during the Party "week" about 15,000 new women were enrolled. Large percentages of the new membership was given by these very delegate conferences. Large possibilities for agitation are contained in the daily conferences of women workers, which in separate towns, provinces and counties are now being approximately every 2d month. 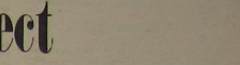

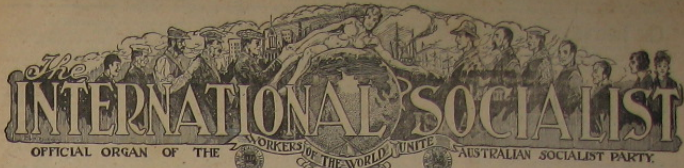

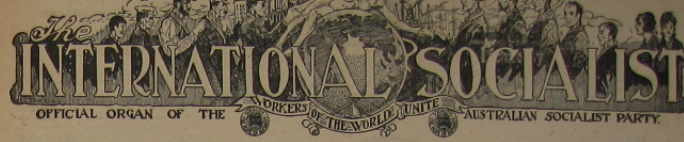

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Iron Discipline

Found, the Secretary of the French Socialist Party, has given the conditions of membership in the Communist Party of Russia as he saw it there.

"The Communist Party, as we have already said, is the solid core of the present revolution. It has had no more than thirty thousand members at the end of the October Revolution, but thirty thousand well-trained, well-disciplined, ready to die for every socialist idea. They have been through every type of sacrifice. The Communist Party knows that it is the only party which has the power to bring the revolution to the end. It is not a party of words, and it does not hesitate to enter upon periods of purgations from its ranks."

The Communist Party is strongly controlled, as before in a revolutionary period. In the intervals of the congress, the Central Committee, composed of 25 members, disposes of large powers. Not only does it administer the Party and conduct its policy, but it also controls the whole Soviet organization. The Central Committee of the People, composed exclusively of Communists, retains its full importance. Reproductive organization does not exist in the Party. The majority decides, and the majority—over three-fourths of the vote in the Congress—decides. This is a most useful system.

"The conditions of admission to the Party vary according to the origin and position of the applicant. The Party here is controlled by five members. They are admitted into the local group after an interview on certain affairs, and signing the Communist Programme and engaging to submit to the discipline of the Party.

"A preliminary stage of three months is imposed upon the applicant, and presenters of a strictly negative admission. They are initiated gradually into Communist activities. During this period, they do not have the right to participate in meetings of the group. Only after the three months is the applicant interviewed on certain affairs, and signing the Communist Programme and engaging to submit to the discipline of the Party.

"It is very natural that a proletarian party master of political power and presenters of a strictly negative responsibility, must impose on its members uniform and often severe discipline. Every Communist must be ready to be punished. Presenters must have the discipline of workers; workers must have the free choice of Communist Party membership. The Communist Party must stay on propaganda at the request of the Party organization and must be ready to take orders in proportion to its discipline. If he has any special matter to report to the Party, he must write to the organization, and the Party has the right to use it whenever needed. If he is a member of a military unit, he must be ready to resign his membership in the military unit if he follows a course of action which is not in the interest of the Party. Party organizations must be able to take orders in proportion to its discipline. Attendance at all the meetings of the Party is obligatory. Whenever a member makes a speech, or takes part in a meeting of a group, under the control of the central organization. A member must give a monthly report on his Socialist activities."

Why "Communist"?

When Marx and Engels wrote the "Communist Manifesto" they could not put it in a Socialist Manifesto owing to the number of workers who were connected with that name. Both with the disillusionment of the various nations and the relegation of their general announcements to the pages of history, the term "Socialist Manifesto," meant interference by those who are opposed to the Marxian philosophy.

In 1841 the Socialist movement was a middle class movement, and responsible to the middle class elements that realised the necessity of a complete social revolution, and they were of the working class, and of course, to no way looked upon as being "respectable."

...of Capitalism, would result in ever increasing chaos and enslavement of the masses, but also by means of the concentration of industry, the formation of a new working class, the abolition of the bourgeoisie, and the formation of a new order of society, the rise of the proletarian dictatorship of Socialism would also be created.

It is by an intelligent grasp of historical materialism, that is to say, the concept of the course of social development, which seeks the ultimate cause and the great moving power of all important events in the economic development of society, in the changes of the mode of production and the corresponding changes of society into distinct classes and in the struggles of these classes against one another, that Communism stands revealed as a practical method of achievement, a plan which can be carried out through the clear understanding of all the intricate interrelations which hold together the form of society in which we are living.

Communism consists of a clear and intelligent observation of all the complicated processes of the economic world, and in a simultaneous study of the conditions in which the proletarian class, capable of concentration in a class and carries into its economic struggle that shapes its own peculiar politics. Upon these precise data, the Communist can see scientific deductions and make connections with that point of view the proletarian bourgeoisie and slugs the political policies of the State. This point must coincide with the one where Capitalism becomes null and void.

Marx and Engels spoke of the society of the future, assuming the Dictatorship of the Proletariat as a fact, not from the intuitive point of view of one who thinks he can see the future, but from the point of view of a principle of the economic structure, which should develop in accordance with the present society. During Feb., 1920, eleven men were taken from the Keesburgh mine, New South Wales.

Local members of the A. W. U. suspected that some were playing the part of industrial spies and they advised the committee to hold a meeting, and the men decided to stand together for the committee men's rights.

At this meeting, Mr. Murray, a high A. W. U. official, appeared on the scene. He was accompanied by Pullidians, squatters, bosses and strike-breakers who were led to defeat the solidarity of the men. Again, the men won the battle for transport cost it was not a defeat.

It was at this time that we received a letter from the A. W. U. and the Labor Party, asking us to leave up the A. W. U. and the Labor Party. To date you have not reported that your officials, Jones and Boyd, were at a meeting at Longreach a week after we had left the district, and your own members refused them a hearing, and you ground that if they had a case, why did they not bring it forward while we were present at Longreach? The Labor Party in Action.

British law and order were ably upheld on Wednesday morning of this week in Sydney's main street when an unemployed procession from the Trades Hall was ambushed by squads of New South Wales policemen. The procession was suddenly attacked from both sides as it had reached a narrow cross street. Press reports there is absolutely no doubt that the ambush and the police used instructions from the Labor Government, which was not the least surprised should anything more serious than the arrest of thirteen men result.

It had a fairly rough time. The inspectors were right in the fact of the affair. Mr. Mackay had his uniform badly torn.

"As soon as the men realised what had happened they made every effort to get away. As the 'beat' represented by the solitary number indicates, most of the men were unemployed."

"The prisoners were subsequently taken to the Central Station, and charged with offensive behaviour, based on the Trades Hall. Some of them displayed bravely on the face and body. The reason why there is no work is that the factories and work cannot be run at a profit. So far as public works are concerned, the money market is not too far at present, making it difficult to borrow. The Labor Government has to be extremely careful in starting construction works.

How can the unemployed get work?

By using their own jobs.

Because the Labor Government, as Mrs. John Stuy has insisted, believes in the constitution, it cannot help the workers to earn their jobs. The funds, factories, and workshops are the private property of certain individuals. The Constitution guards this private property.

There is only one way open to the unemployed to use their jobs. By having a government of workers for workers, by workers, a part of whose duty shall be to use in workers' police—the Guards—keep the present labor class out of trouble—to arrest those for offensive behavior to the unemployed.

This is the program of the constitution, and it is not possible while the present governments exist.

that harkens country is one of the blackest lands in the world of our day which tells the story of the building up of the British Empire.

The Sinn Fein Party are up against the British ruling class, an era we and we heartily echo all the charges which they make against the despots who are crushing them under the iron heel of militarism.

You have amongst the Sinn Fein movement a mass of men who are not only up to the eyes in their own life, but who are engaged, they have offered life, limb, goods—everything, to the cause of their country.
Rather should we be better advised to view the Irish question, and to decide our attitude towards its solution.

It is not our purpose to deal in detail with the atrocities and outrages which have been perpetrated on the unfortunate inhabitants of Ireland, but we are being written on the subject. Unhappily, Ireland would be treated as a foreign nation, and an armed force on her shores until she was laid waste and desolated.

Working Women in Soviet Russia

It was in the fall of 1918, a few months before the collapse of Denikin, when labor for the first time was the slogan of the day. The working-women's section of the Communist Party recognized in addition to their usual only one means of expressing their indignation to work in the Soviet organs, so that they might learn to take part in the administration of the country and in other ways to keep a watchful presence.

The ratio of population and military strength already quoted prove beyond a doubt the hopelessness of Ireland's position in such a case. The loss of 500,000 men would be fatal to the Irish; the vast question would be merely settled for good. The position arises, what then can Ireland hope for?

The hope lies chiefly with the working class of England. When an outbreak occurs against the British master class and chaos control of State, then the Irish workers will become a very large force of freedom, but hardly before.

The Irish as a race have a white-hot sentiment for the English, and this would not be lessened if they were told that the British workers are downtrodden and exploited by the same tyrants that rule so despotically over them; they would be the first to say, 'Fight against them!' But even so, they would not have set the same revolutionary spirit which has actuated the Irish labor coalition, even though they may have been often misled, and there is no doubt that the latter will be heard and so on their side.

Today an Communist movement is made the Sinn Fein movement to criticize and often disagree with its tactics, perhaps, but still to be brave carrying the banner of Communism and propagating its teaching.

In this way we shall be turning a mass of people whose revolutionary instincts among the nations of the world, from using their energies towards a new Nationalist movement, into taking their place in the International Movement, which ALONE stands for the emancipation of the workers of the world.

While France was going through its great middle class revolution, and opening vistas of a new historical life to the whole continent of Europe, England stood dead in the lead of the counter-revolutionary coalition, although it was far more advanced than France from the point of view of capitalism. The British labour movement of the period had, by a flash of intuition, arrived at some of the conclusions of later-day Marxists.

At the time when it was going to the world the first vast, politically-organised movement of revolutionary proletarians—Bolshevik—effective middle class revolution were taking place in various countries of Europe, and France was witnessing its first great civil war between the proletariat and the bourgeoisie. The middle classes detested the objective of national unification, and they used, by no means different methods in each country.

England offers a striking instance of a country, where, in the words of Engels, the middle-classes, actually in combination with an aristocracy gradually moving into the upper middle class, was created an upper stratum of the proletariat, not only in its middle classes. Thus advanced capitalism country was, as far as the revolutionary struggle was concerned, several decades behind more backward countries. The proletariat of France seemed to have exhausted its strength in the two bloody years of the working class against the bourgeoisie in 1848 and 1871, the importance of which in the world's history cannot be overstated. In the revolution of 1848, when Germany was communally behind France and England, the supremacy in the international labour movement passed into her hands. While, however, Germany had emancipated those two countries in the course of two or three years, the second decade of the twentieth century, the world's second party of German Marxists was headed by a gang of abominable rogues, by a band of scoundrels who had sold themselves to the capitalists, by Bolshevism and Kautsky, by David and Legine, the most villainous scoundrels that were ever sent against working men by unscrupulous and counter-revolutionary middle classes.

The course of the world's history inevitably points to the dictatorship of the proletariat, but its course is far from being straight, smooth, or simple.

At a time when Karl Kautsky was still a Marxist and was the receptacle, he became when he joined Bolshevism in his struggle for unity with bourgeois democracy in the fight against the revolution of Soviet, democracy, he wrote (at the very beginning of the twentieth century) an article entitled, “The Mass and the Revolution,” in that article he drew attention to such historic conditions as were pointing to the possibility of the supremacy in the international labour movement passing into the hands of the Slavonic peoples.

Now this has come true. For a time—temporarily for a very short time—the supremacy in the proletarian revolutionary international belongs to the Russians, as a variety of phases of the present epoch it belonged successively to the English, the French, and the Germans.

It was easier for us to begin, firstly, because the extraordinary backwardness of the Third International resulted in an unopposed violence of the revolutionary result of the mass. Secondly, the backwardness of Russia led to a variety of revolutionary countries, merged the proletarian revolution directed against the bourgeoisie into the peasants' revolution directed against the landlords. We began at that point in October, 1917, and our victory would not have been such as we may feel we started from any other point. As early as 1885, Marx, in speaking of Russia, pointed to the possibility of revolutionary proletarians joining hands with revolutionary peasants. From the beginning of 1900, the Bolsheviks had upheld the idea of the revolutionary dictatorship of the proletariat and of the peasants. Thirdly, the year 1905 proved an excellent political training ground for the working and peasant masses, both in helping them to the first political triumph, that of the “dictate in Women's Societies” and in initiating them in revolutionary activity. But for the “dress rehearsal” of 1905, the revolution of 1917, both the middle class one, in February, and the proletarian one, in October, would have been out of the question. Fourthly, the geographic conditions of Russia enabled it to hold out for a longer time than this was possible in other countries, against the onslaught of advanced capitalist countries. Fifthly, the peculiar interrelations of the proletariat and the peasant facilitated the transition from a middle class revolution to a Socialist one, by affording facilities for the urban proletarians to influence the peasant stratum of the peasantry. Sixthly, the lessons taught by every year of struggle by means of strikes, and the experience of the labour movement in Europe, combined with an extremely difficult and acute revolutionary situation, contributed to the opening up of that peculiar and unprecedented form of revolutionary organisation—the workers' (workers and soldiers) and peasants' councils.

This list is, of course, far from complete. But we may say at that, the Soviet, or proletarian democracy has come to life in Russia. As compared with the Franco-German, this is the second step of momentous importance in the history of the world. The Soviet Republic of the present and possibly here proved to be the first viable and lasting Socialist Republic. As a new type of State, it was no longer die. It no longer stands alone.

A great deal, a very great deal, is still required to bring to completion the construction work of Socialism. The Soviet Republics may be formed in countries more civilized than Russia, in countries where the proletariat carries more weight and has a greater influence, here all the chances of a successful Russia, provided they first arrive at the dictatorship of the proletariat.

The Second International, which has proved a signal failure in now dying a natural death, and the period of putrefaction has already set in. It is now acting as a hindrance to the international bourgeoisie. It must first be struck and the Yellow International, its main principal leaders, such as Kautsky, are now glorifying bourgeois democracy which they call “ab-

solvent democracy,”—one which is still more absurd and more counter-revolutionary.
Bourgeois democracy is dead, as dead as the Second International, and will perform a very useful and historically inevitable task at a time when the preparation of the working masses for Socialism, with the basis of that bourgeois democracy was the order of the day.
The most democratic bourgeois republic has never been, and cannot be anything else but a machine for the oppression of labour by capital and a political weapon of exploitation, or anything but the dictatorship of the bourgeoisie. The democratic bourgeois republic promised to give power to the majority, but the principle so proclaimed could never be put into practice as long as the bourgeoisie owned the instruments of production were objects of private ownership.
“Freedom,” in the interpretation of the bourgeois democratic republic, was reserved for the wealthy.

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Communist Persecution in New Zealand.

The New Zealand authorities are pretty active and present trying to suppress Communist activities by preventing revolutionary publications from entering the country. As a consequence, many of our comrades in the War Legislation and the Customs Act have been jailed.

The authorities' attitude is expressed in answers to questions by H. B. Holland, M.P., that the widest possible tolerance should be shown to all parties, but the advocacy of violence is a means of attacking them will not be tolerated. However, under the guise of suppressing violence, numerous books and pamphlets that do not advocate it have been prohibited, and a number proceeded against for having them in their possession, for bringing them into the country or for selling them.

Comrade Johnson, of Wellington, one of the victims had four charges against him. Three under the War Regulations, that he sold to Ada Heger, a police constable, "The Russian Revolution"; "Inside Soviet Russia," and "Communist Tactics of Revolution." On each of these charges he was sentenced to three months imprisonment, the terms to be concurrent. On the fourth charge, under the Customs Act, that he had been in possession of "Knowledge and Unity," a Communist publication, he was sentenced to three months imprisonment. Comrade Johnson claims that he charge were an absolute farce on the part of the police.

An incident of the trial, which expresses clearly the attitude adopted by Johnson in his prosecution, occurred after the Magistrate had passed sentence. Johnson said:

"Can I take a case for appeal?"

"Yes, you can, please you choose as that matter," replied the Magistrate.

"Then you appeal for the working class to take sentence to secure their political interests."

Johnson's appeal to the working class will no doubt have the effect of bringing the revolutionary forces in New Zealand, but nevertheless, if the revolutionary forces think that by filing individuals they will succeed in keeping back the tide of Communism, they are mistaken.

Out of the Alliance there has emerged but one fact, the formation of an emergency army of three hundred thousand men. Let us take up some points on the "Manchester Guardian Weekly" of April 15. We find the following paragraph, which is intended to sum up the position:

How totally the writer misapprehends the actual significance of the formation of an Emergency Army will be made apparent by the following Editorial Note in "The Communist" (London) of April 15:

"Join the Defense Corps.
 "We would advise the appearance of the Defense Corps in the Army, the fact, weapons of the military service, which people are so familiar with the use of military weapons. It therefore becomes able at once time to impose its will upon the disarming military authority. And this time arrives at once as the mass of the people—country and city workers and farmers—has the will. At this point the army of the classes becomes the army of the masses, the machine refuses to work, military power is under in the dialectic of its own development."

English has much more to say than it is interested, but the foregoing is sufficient to show that Marxism as a revolutionary theory does not see a "goal" as a revolution, it is because Marxism insists upon the most exact calculation of the factors of the situation at any particular moment, and refuse to be driven by the momentary instabilities of the action. And it is here interesting to note that, so long as the writer in "The Manchester Guardian Weekly" takes an analysis of the composition of the Defense Corps he is able to suggest the essential danger to the capitalist class in the move.

It would not, therefore, be the least reason in looking to England for a revolution "in our time" in fact, very soon. All the factors seem to be developing, rapidly the inability of the capitalists to provide work and food for the masses, the growth of an active Communist Party, and the discrediting of the Labor leaders, and of bourgeois performances, the coming of the workers.

Yet we are so greedy wary and will not be disappointed in the great day and appear to be a little time. We can with all confidence look to our comrades in Britain, the great work of analyzing the situation and determining what the revolutionary should we say revolutionary—cannot be arrived. —A.T.

The revolutionary proletarian must always immediately begin to prepare the necessary force for the dissolution of their single units in the villages and together with the industrial proletariat, directly in industry, the proletariat must find a revolutionary way to this class. Columns of wisdom are at present being deviled by the able W. "Gave" papers in an endeavour to induce the Labor Government to apply the recent reduction in wages to its public servants. Why?

Considering the social position of the civil servant, no casual difference exists between his position and that of any other worker, whether he be miner, quarryman, chemical worker, transport worker, etc.

All workers engaged in social service, whether productive or otherwise, under capitalist enterprise must sell their energy and skill in exchange for wages.

The public servant does not produce value, because he merely consumes the surplus value which is embodied in his wage. He is not a worker in any way in handling or transporting commodities, and cannot, therefore, be considered as adding to the social production of the product, or as creating value.

The necessity of taxation. Because of the development of Capitalism, the need of a standing market for the production of commodities, a clash of interests is bound to occur.

For the purpose of successful expansion, a large army of soldiers is necessary. These are recruited from the ranks of the unemployed, and also from the ranks of the underemployed.

In the shape of taxes. It was in which these taxes are paid leads to the illusion, that, because wages appear to be paid out of the wages of the worker, the government is democratic, and that they are free citizens.

Reviewing the question, we see that the price is determined for a reduction in wages because the higher wage is a drain upon master's surplus value.

Although the Labor Party legislates in the interests of the capitalist class, it is at present hesitating to carry into effect any such reduction as that suggested. Why?

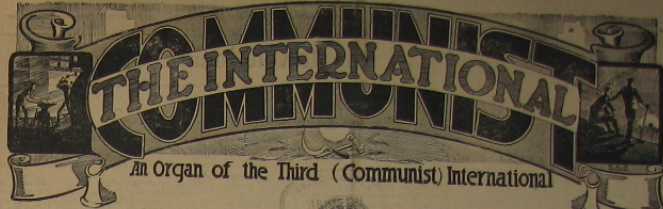
