The I.W.W., according to information we have here, is branded as an unlawful assication. is oraneed as an uniawini assication. Twelve members incarcerated under charges of arson, treason, sedition, etc., and on the plea that all unlawful associations must be put down for public safety, all other unlawful associations are henceforth bracketed under this Act, as menaces to public safety, also to be put down with a strong hand should occasion arise. So with a strong hand should occasion arise. So far so good, but have we any organization that far so good, but have we any organization that interferes with the supply and manufacture, and production of any war material brought under these penalties, should any organization dare to cause any delay in furnishing such war material. This Act, estensibly directed to the suppression of one so-called unlawful association by the powers that be (the LW.W.) Is, in reality, directed against all unloss and organizations of a Labor movement, and hangs to-day, like the famous sword of Damocles, suspended and threatening, over the head of every worker in Australia. every worker in Australia.
