- ➤ Margin Of Error +/- 3.5% (Higher For Subgroups)










A Narrow Plurality Identify As Republicans With A Larger Margin For Conservatives








Nearly One In Five Are Dependent On Manufacturing With A Similar Number Unionized

Is your household income dependent on manufacturing?

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
Do you, or does any member of your household, belong to a labor union?

How would you rate your economic situation - excellent, good, just fair, or poor?








Kasich Is The Only Politician Tested That Is Viewed Net Favorably In Ohio



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Obama Is A Polarizing Figure — A Majority Feel Either Very Favorable Or Very Unfavorable Towards The President





Kasich Favorability
















While Terrorism Tops Voters' Concerns, Debt To China, Jobs Going Overseas & Loss Of Manufacturing Jobs Are Also Major Worries








Which of the following industries is most important to the overall strength of the American economy?






Voters See Jobs Shipped Overseas As The Biggest Reason For Job Loss In Manufacturing, Not Technology Or Skills

Participants Blamed Outsourcing For The Decline In Manufacturing Jobs

"I think that profit is a really huge incentive to owners of companies. Whereas you could spend money on the robots to do the manufacturing to eventually phase out the workers who cost you more money or you could just send your stuff to somewhere else where it is cheaper to make and your profit increases exponentially quickly. I think the interest in profit to those who own the companies and the idea of getting it "I want it now" is going to take precedence over the idea of a gradual eventual replacement of employees with machines." – OH Dem female


"No, I still think that we are outsourcing and the unfair trade and things like that. I think going to whatever way we can make more money if we can build a factory and it doesn't have the same health regulations in Mexico and we don't have to provide them with healthcare and we don't have to worry about if they take a day off because we will fire them, all of those things." – OH Dem male

"I think things move because of the cost of production. The cost of production is not just the wages of people, but it is also the associated taxes, the regulations that area associated with it. Everything goes into the cost of the item. A company is going to naturally look if I can produce this for half price somewhere else I am going to do that. The corporation has no loyalty." – OH GOP male





"When I think of made in America I think it actually was made here. Designed here, made here, everything. That is what I would think it means. – OH Dem female

"If ...there was some part or...part of the process that wasn't made in America..."— OH Dem female "Then that's not right."—OH Dem female

"I would feel cheated." - OH Dem female

"Yes, "assembled in America," but they are bringing the parts from all the different components and they assemble it. I worked for Black and Decker and all of our tools said made in America but actually it was assembled in America, everything was made in Mexico, but then assembled here and we could put the stamp on it." – OH Swing female

"I don't know. If you got to buy one piece [outside the U.S.] but everything else is in America it doesn't really make a difference if it says two percent overall of the automobile is from a different place. So it was assembled, the plant was ours, we built it here everything else and I don't think you get a 100 percent in a lot of things." – OH Swing female

"I think if it is a very low percentage [from outside U.S.] then it is okay, but if it is like 50 percent or something then it's like okay, no." – OH Swing female

"I think the lowest possible." – OH Swing female











Infrastructure Investment Was Important To The Swing Voter Group


"Some bridges or highways and all these things that will fall apart here shortly from a manufacturing standpoint ...why don't we coordinate all of our resources for a ten year timeframe so we can build all ...build bridges, whatever it is. I am not an engineer, but what does it take to build the infrastructure back up to the 21st century? That to me would be the most logical way to promoting manufacturing right now. – OH swing male

"(In regards to government priority of infrastructure) It is going to have more cataclysmic events. Unfortunately we have it in Minneapolis with the bridge falling down and with other rail lines falling off tracks and something happens. To be honest, somebody who is very, very important in this political landscape and so something happens. I don't think anything will happen. – OH swing male

"I would like to see it number one, because I think it goes hand in hand with everything that we are talking about, manufacturing, we put people to work, we put products to work, it will all go hand in hand. We did a shuttle project when Obama came into office and we filled a bunch of potholes. That is basically what we did with the money that we got as states, because the states have the responsibility for repairing everything. That was nowhere near the money that is indicated here." – OH swing male



"Just the fact that (Trump) is a businessman. It just kind of makes sense if you want to build American's infrastructure and economy then maybe just give a businessman a shot." –OH GOP male

"I've heard Trump say that he is going to make China bend over and kiss our ass or something. [Laughter] "— OH Dem male






A Vocational President, Setting A High Bar For Trade Agreements, Leveling The Playing Field, And A Pro-Growth Agenda Are All Successful Messages

Rubio's Focus On Vocational Training Resonated Across Party Lines

"Really in high school having programs where kids can go in and do something that would be good, instead of going to gym class or some of these other stupid classes that high schoolers have to go to, that really doesn't help them in any way. So I think that would be good, to have something like that that is building skills, even if that is not their career choice." – OH swing female

"Redefining success to be college and career ready. College isn't for everybody. I have seen it every day when we try to shove a square peg in a round hole. I think it is to the determent of many kids, we try to get them to college and that's what schools trumpet, the college admission numbers but college graduation numbers I think tell a different story. I think we do a disservice to so many kids not even presenting that as an option. I think they should be given the option, I think it should be sold to them and I think those options should be laid out. You have this career path that you are clearly entitled to take and you can leave high school ready to be a skilled worker, productive." - OH Dem female

"I circled the education system part of this and the skilled trades. I believe that if you want cohesiveness you need to have both the higher educated, and more computer people working together with people who have hands-on abilities as well." – OH GOP male



Clinton's Focus On Revitalizing Hard Hit Communities Received Mixed Reactions

"I was kind of on the fence about it, because it seems like I don't know like a bailout type deal where the companies have been screwing up and we keep bailing them out and they aren't learning anything or is it just more of just to help the communities." – OH Swing female

"I circled renovating, refurbishing, and repurposing [as positive]. I hate driving by someplace and seeing something empty. It kind of hurts to see a plant empty and people are not working. Why? It hurts." – OH GOP male

"Well you would not be hearing this in Silicon Valley, you wouldn't. Why be so microscopic in approach. If you are going to take this within Southeast Ohio yes, it is going to ring pretty true, but if you are going to take this to Silicon Valley...I just think sometimes when somebody speaks they are obviously speaking to their audience. So if this person is going to get up and speak to this point they need to broaden it a little bit, but I also understand they are speaking to a specific audience." – OH swing male

"I was in the middle...because of one thing in there. I just think it is going to be government run. It is going to take control. Our government is messed up so much that to me that scares me. Other than that I liked it." – OH GOP male

Strategic Conclusions

- Ohioans see manufacturing as central to our economic strength
- They see it in decline, importantly because of jobs being sent overseas
- > Voters want to see the threat from China addressed
- Apprenticeships, a renewed focus on vocational education, ending tax policies that reward companies for shifting earnings overseas, loans for small business and spending taxpayers' money at home all garner strong, bipartisan support as ways to revitalize manufacturing
- > Ohioans say they are not hearing much about these issues though Trump has begun to break through
- Generally all the candidates have persuasive language on these issues – but Trump has found a way to discuss them issues in ways that are memorable and understandable
