

"Dargavillian" New Zealander Senior Of The Year



Kiwibank's Senior New Zealander of the Year Award has this year gone to local identity Noel Hilliam. The purpose of the awards is to recognise, encourage and reward New Zealand's most vital resource - its people. The awards seek out and promote the incredible achievements of individuals, organisations and community groups and create a sense of national pride, unity and inspiration through their example as mentors and role models to the wider community.

Noel certainly fits the criteria. Starting a life long involvement in Scouting in 1947, he served a building apprenticeship before marrying Miss Julia Webb and taking up a farm at Mt. Wesley.

In the 1960s decade Noel became seriously interested in local and maritime history, searching for and finding many wrecks on Northland's west coast, and trying to trace the early history of the Northern Wairoa.

Over the years he has interviewed and recorded stories and the early memories of many older Maori and Dalmatians of the district.

To help his beach searches he decided to join the Northern Wairoa Aero Club and build his own aeroplane. In the process he helped many others to build their own plane.

Sometimes working with Kelly Tarlton he recovered and preserved

relics from shipwrecks including L'Alcemene, S. S. Niagara and Lord of the Isles. His discoveries lead to his building New Zealand's first marine relic preservation tank, and becoming an acknowledged expert. Many of the treasures are now on display at Dargaville Museum.

Probably though, Noel is best known for his vision and efforts to get Dargaville Museum up and running in the 1980s, helping with the designing, planning and building. He also came up with the idea of rescuing the Pouto Lighthouse equipment and the Rainbow Warrior masts that now stand on the hill at Mt. Wesley.

Elected Chairman of the Committee in 1976, he became President of the Dargaville Museum Society in 1977, a position he held for eleven years. He is now a Museum Life Member and also President of the New Zealand Under-Water Heritage Group.

This award is a tribute to a man who has devoted his life to his community and historical research. Much of his research is ongoing and may well contribute to a new understanding of the origins of human habitation in New Zealand which up till now is still shrouded in question marks and mythology.



1830 Outbreak of the Girl's War at Kororareka

The Girl's War is the name given to a conflict fought in March 1830 between northern and southern Nga Puhi.

It had its roots in inter-hapu rivalry and competition for European trade at Kororareka. The conflict was sparked by a fight among some young high-born Maori women, including the wives of a European whaler, W.D. Brind. A minor incident led to an exchange of threats between the girls' tribes. Things turned violent when someone was accidentally shot.

At Kororareka, northern Nga Puhi under the leadership of Ururoa (the brother-in-law of Hongi Hika) clashed with southern Nga Puhi led by Kiwikiwi. The battle was largely inconclusive with Kiwikiwi retreating to Otuihu. The missionaries Samuel Marsden and Henry Williams acted as intermediaries in the peace negotiations that followed. Kororareka was left in the control of northern Nga Puhi, leading to intermittent fighting for control of the town over the next seven years.

1960 Barry Crump's novel A good keen man published



Barry Crump established himself as the iconic 'Kiwi bloke' before his death from a heart attack in 1996. His many books captured the humour and personalities of rural New Zealand. Crump appealed to many Kiwi males with his rough and rugged ways and established a reputation as a man's man, who could tell a great yarn.

His broad appeal, humour and unique down-to-earth style was recognised by Toyota when they used Crump in a series of successful TV advertisements promoting 4-wheel-drive utility vehicles. Crump, with his rugged 'she'll be right' attitude, was counter-posed with the city slicker Lloyd Scott in pulling off a number of daring feats while driving the ute.

While he inspired many Kiwi blokes, others criticised Crump for what they saw as the less-endearing aspects of the 'good keen man'. He married

five times and fathered nine children to four different women but had little to do with most of these children. He converted to the Baha'i faith later in his life.

Computer Tips

Not so fast- Don't press the F1 key if a Web site asks you to!

Windows XP - Internet Explorer 7 or Internet Explorer 8

This tip applies only to Windows XP users who are using IE7 or IE8. According to Microsoft, Windows Vista and Windows 7 users are not vulnerable to this particular attack.

If you are using Windows XP and running Internet Explorer 7 or Internet Explorer 8, and you are presented with a dialog on any Web site asking you to press the F1 key, don't do it. Doing so will expose your system to attack and infection. There are two workarounds to this security issue - don't press the F1 key when prompted by a web site, or lock down Windows help (i.e. turn it off altogether). We'd suggest the former - it's easier. Locking down Windows Help may also prevent you from accessing it, and if you need help, that's probably not such a good thing. The simplest solution is: Don't press the F1 key if a web site asks you to.

More Food Ideas – This Week Lamb!

Bacon with home-made baked beans

Ingredients:

250g dried white beans, soaked overnight
(or 250g tinned haricot, cannellini or butter beans, drained) **
50ml olive oil
1 medium onion chopped
4 garlic cloves, finely chopped
salt and pepper
1 tablespoon tomato puree
200ml red wine
1 400g tin tomatoes
1 bay leaf
2 tablespoons brown sugar
sweet or hot paprika (optional)



** use two tins - one of butter beans and one of cannelinni beans

Method:

Place dried beans in a large saucepan, cover with cold water and bring to the boil. Remember to soak these overnight before doing this! Simmer for 30-40 minutes or until cooked. Drain and reserve.

If you are using the tinned beans then start here:

Preheat an oven to 180°C. Heat the olive oil in a heavy pan. Add the onion, garlic, salt and pepper and 2 teaspoons of sea salt. Cook gently for 10 minutes or until soft.

Add the tomato puree and cook for 2 minutes, then add the wine and cook until the liquid is reduced by two-thirds. Add the tomatoes, bay leaf, brown sugar and beans.

Fill the tomato tin with water and pour into the pan. Bring to the boil. Transfer to a covered baking dish and bake in the oven for 1.5 hours, stirring every 30 minutes. If necessary add more water.

When tender season to taste and add paprika if desired.

This dish is perfect eating over several days. Given the effort required it might be best to double or triple the recipe and either bottle or freeze what you don't use.

Herb crusted rack of lamb

Ingredients:

2 large racks of lamb (8 bones in each portion)
olive oil for cooking
sea salt and freshly ground pepper (for seasoning)
2 tablespoons of English mustard (I used Colmans powdered mustard)

Herb Crust: 4 slices day old bread (without crust) large handful of parsley (Italian parsley is less pungent) small handful of coriander ** small bunch of thyme ** few rosemary sprigs (not too much as it will quickly overpower) 50 g parmesan cheese, freshly grated **



** All ingredients indicated can be left out of if you don't have them in your pantry

Method:

Preheat your oven to 200°C.

Score the lamb fat in a criss-cross pattern and season with salt and pepper. Seal the racks in a hot cast iron pan with a little olive oil, until golden brown (about four minutes each side).

Transfer the racks to an ovenproof dish or roasting tray and pop into the oven for 10-15 minutes. It's ready when the meat feels firm but springy. Take the meat out of the oven to rest.

While the meat is resting (or you can do this well in advance) make the herb crust. Tear the bread into pieces and put into a food processor. Roughly chop the herbs and add to the bread with the grated parmesan. Whizz to make fine crumbs.

Brush the scored side of the lamb with mustard then press the herb crust mixture onto the lamb. You need a firm thick coating. Return the meat to the oven and warm through for another 5 minutes. I turned the oven up to 250°C for this final 'warming'.

Slice the lamb into individual chops, or as many as you think looks attractive. I did pairs which looked more substantial, especially since the lamb racks were quite small.

Serve with new potatoes and an salad you think appropriate.

Moroccan lamb tagine

Ingredients:

1 tbsp turmeric 1 tbsp (2 tbsp) ground cinnamon 1 x shoulder of lamb, trimmed and cut into 5cm chunks (you need about 1.1kg in total) 2 large onions, diced 4 tbsp olive oil 3 cloves garlic, crushed 500ml tomato juice 2 x 400g tinned chopped tomatoes 115g dried apricots, cut in half 55g dates, cut in half 55g sultanas or raisins 85g flaked almonds 1 tsp saffron stamens, soaked in cold water 300 ml (600ml) lamb stock 1 tbsp clear honey 2 tbsp coriander, roughly chopped 2 tbsp flat leaf parsley, roughly chopped



1. Preheat the oven to 150°C.

Method:

Place the cayenne, black pepper, paprika, ginger, turmeric and cinnamon into a small bowl and mix to combine.
 Place the lamb in a large bowl and toss together with half of the spice mix. Cover and leave overnight in the fridge.
 Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large casserole dish. Add the grated onion and the remaining spice mix and cook over a gentle heat for 10 minutes so that the onions are soft but not coloured. Add the crushed garlic for the final 3 minutes.

4. In a separate frying pan, heat the remaining oil and brown the cubes of lamb on all sides then add the browned meat to the casserole dish. De-glaze the frying pan with ¼ pint of tomato juice and add these juices to the pan.
5. Add the remaining tomato juice, chopped tomatoes, apricots, dates, raisins or sultanas, flaked almonds, saffron, lamb stock and honey to the casserole dish. Bring to the boil, cover with a fitted lid, place in the oven and cook for 2-2½ hours or until the meat is meltingly tender.

6. Place the lamb in a tagine* or large serving dish and sprinkle over the chopped herbs. Serve.


