SOME OF OUR LITIGATION VICTORIES IN 2015

Ensuring Basic Needs Programs and Security for Poor Families

Lawsuit eliminates Alameda County food stamp application backlog

The permanent injunction, along with class certification, requires Alameda County, which had sat on thousands of CalFresh applications, to act on emergency applications in 3 days and all others in 30 days.

Securing Safe Housing

Kern reforms its low-income rental assistance program

The Housing Authority of the County of Kern revised its entire Administrative Plan, added professional hearing officers, retrained its staff, and restored eliminated vouchers.

28 Day Shuffle Enjoined in Orange County

An injunction barred enforcement of a Costa Mesa ordinance prohibiting tenants from staying more than 30 days in a motel, thus forcing them each month to move from the only affordable housing in the city.

Health Care for All

Health care coverage protected for seniors, families, and immigrants

The state can not terminate a Medi-Cal recipient for making an error on a redetermination form unless it provides notice that they will be immediately reinstated if the error is fixed within 90 days.

Mr. Kim's Story

Mr. Kim is a U.S. citizen who only speaks Korean and received regular, life-saving care for epilepsy through the Medi-Cal program. In 2014, he was sent Medi-Cal redetermination forms in English, which he couldn't understand. Mr. Kim had previously visited the local welfare office and was not provided with translation assistance or information about interpretive services, so he enlisted the aid of a friend who spoke a little more English then he did. The friend inaccurately filled out the form and shortly thereafter Mr. Kim's benefits were abruptly terminated, without further inquiry, when he was misclassified as undocumented. Mr. Kim went to the welfare office but was unable to communicate with them and for three months went without epilepsy treatment. Ultimately, he contacted the Korean Resource Center where advocates jumped in to help him resolve the problem.

The County's failure to help put Mr. Kim and hundreds of thousands like him in grave danger so Western Center and our co-counsel filed KCCEB v. Douglas. In 2015 the Alameda Superior Court issued a preliminary injunction to enforce critical due process rights for



all Medi-Cal recipients facing terminations for alleged failure to provide ongoing eligibility information. The litigation continues with a trial scheduled for late 2016.

Help for Seniors, People Who are Homeless, and Adults with Disabilities

Medical care for people with life threatening illnesses

Elderly residents and persons with complex medical conditions, such as cancer and AIDS, can now more easily keep their established doctors and not be forced into Medi-Cal managed care.

Saavedra v. Douglas

Kern County increases grants and overhauls welfare program for homeless and disabled residents

Indigent residents, who had unlawfully been denied public assistance, won a dramatic overhaul of Kern County's general assistance program. The County increased the monthly grant from \$226 to \$331; eliminated a burdensome application process to receive aid, which is now available immediately; provides transportation assistance; and makes accommodations for disabled applicants and recipients.

SOME OF OUR SPONSORED BILLS SIGNED INTO LAW IN 2015:

Domestic Violence Survivors Protected

AB 418 (Chiu) makes permanent a temporary state law that allows a survivor of domestic violence to terminate a residential lease early without economic ramifications in order to move to safer housing. It also decreases the survivor's remaining rent obligation from 30 days to 14 days.

Streamlined and Modernized Access to School Meals and CalFresh for Homeless, Poor and Immigrant Children

SB 708 (Mendoza) requires school districts using the online free/reduced cost school meal application to provide links to translated versions of the application and to online CalFresh and health care applications. The law also requires applications to include instructions for homeless and migrant families.

Affordable Housing Projects Protected

AB 447 (Maienschein) prohibits insurance companies from discriminating against property owners who rent to Section 8 tenants.

AB 433 (Chu) provides for transitional assistance and referral to mental health services for a family receiving CalWORKs when a child has died.

SB 405 (Hertzberg) requires courts to allow individuals to schedule court proceedings, even if bail or civil assessment has been imposed, and clarifies the traffic amnesty program.









State Budget Victories

Creation of a \$380 million State EITC program that will lift incomes for approximately 825,000 low-income California workers.

\$40 million expansion of Medi-Cal for all children, regardless of immigration status, which is estimated to cover 170,000 low-income children the first year.

15,000 new preschool and child care slots for low wage working families and a rate increase for child care providers.

\$15 million for immigrant legal assistance for deferred action programs and naturalization services.

\$15 million augmentation for the CalWORKs housing support program to help thousands of families avoid homelessness.

10% increase in the Medi-Cal dental provider payment to expand low-income dental care.

Traffic fine amnesty program that will allow Californians to pay off a debt, get their driver's license restored and get back to work.

SOME OF OUR ADMINISTRATIVE ADVOCACY WINS IN 2015:

Specialty Medicine Costs Lowered

Covered California was persuaded to dramatically lower the cost of specialty prescription drugs for the lowest income enrollees. For example, a prescription that costs \$2,250 now will cost \$150 in 2016.

Understandable Medi-Cal Notices

Western Center and other advocates negotiated for appropriately translated and consumer friendly Medi-Cal notices so that those enrolled actually understand decisions about their eligibility.

Improved Medical Care for Pregnant Moms

The CA Dept. of Health Care Services agreed to allow pregnant women to stay with their doctor, rather than being forced to enroll in a new plan.

Food Benefits Restored for 19,000 Angelenos

Western Center and Public Counsel successfully demanded that Los Angeles County provide retroactive CalFresh food assistance benefits to 19,000 people, who were erroneously denied or terminated because the county failed to reprogram computers and implement a law expanding CalFresh.

Protection for Thousands of Low-income Tenants Threatened with Displacement

The State was persuaded to add greater antidisplacement protections in the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program, which uses cap and trade dollars to fund housing, and related infrastructure projects.

technical assistance
matters each year. In
one matter, Western

Center attorney Madeline Howard guided a new attorney through her representation of a single mother with a mental health disability. The mother was facing eviction for keeping a "messy house" and the attorney was considering settlement proposals that would force the family from their home. Madeline spent many hours with the attorney, providing strategic pre-trial assistance and sample briefs and letters. Ultimately, the landlord agreed to allow the family to stay in the unit subject to periodic inspections and due process protections in the event the landlord claimed a breach in the future.

These two cases are making landmark redevelopment law, aimed at securing the funding that will build critically needed affordable housing for low-income Californians.

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PRO BONO PARTNER HIGHLIGHTS

"Our team efforts paid off in March of 2015 when a Northern District Judge permanently enjoined the County of Alameda to comply fully "within a margin of human error" with the legally mandated application processing times. We view this as a victory that will finally bring a close to the massive backlog of CalFresh applications that led to thousands of low-income households facing hunger, homelessness, undernutrition and serious health risks."

Alameda County ranked dead last in the State of California for the processing of CalFresh (also known as food stamps) applications within federal and state mandated timeframes. The County's chronic noncompliance had for years left thousands of families and individuals who were in dire need of food assistance to go hungry. Pillsbury partnered with Western Center and Public Interest Law Project in Lilley v. County of Alameda to successfully require the County to timely process all CalFresh applications.

Favianna Rodriguez is an interdisciplinary artist, cultural strategist, and organizer based in Oakland, California. Her art and collaborative projects address migration, economic inequality, gender justice, and ecology. Favianna lectures globally on the intersection of art, social justice and cultural equity to catalyze social change, and leads art interventions in communities around the country. Rodriguez collaborates deeply with social movement groups to co-create art that's resilient, empowering and transformative. She is the Executive Director of CultureStrike, a national arts organization that engages artists, writers and performers in migrant rights. In 2012, she was featured in a documentary series by Pharrell Williams titled "Migration is Beautiful" which addressed how artists responded to failed immigrant policy in the United States. In 2009, she co-founded Presente.org, a national online organizing network dedicated to the political empowerment of Latino communities.

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
