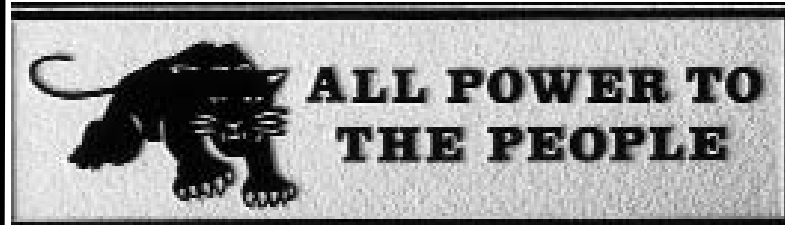

THE LEGACY OF LIL BOBBY HUTTON

Li'l Bobby Hutton was born in April 1950. He joined the BPP in 1966 during the founding days, at the age of 15. He went on to serve as National Treasurer for the Organization. He set the example based on point number 5 of the BPP Ten Point Program teaching himself to read and comprehend BPP goals and principles.

His example of serving the people, along with Huey and Bobby Seale, illustrated the idea of the BPP Survival Program: Police Patrols, and the Free Breakfast Program.

On April 7, 1968 a group of BPP members were ambushed by the Oakland Police Department. While attempting to surrender Li'l Bobby Hutton was gunned down, hit twelve times, he died instantly.

The Li'l Bobby Hutton statue will stand for everything the Panthers achieved, the dangers they faced, and the sacrifices they made in the enduring struggle of Black Americans to rid themselves of neglect, discrimination, and crushing disparity.

We want to remember what Li'l Bobby Hutton stood for. His EXAMPLE in teaching himself to read in learning to recite the Ten Point Program lives on to this day. We support good education, the power of knowledge of self, and growth for the community stemming from examples like Li'l Bobby Hutton's.
