RECENT POSTSEASON GAME RECAPS

TORONTO RAPTORS 116, MIAMI HEAT 89 (5/15/16): The Toronto Raptors moved on to the Eastern Conference Finals after defeating the visiting Miami HEAT in Game Seven of the Semifinals, 116-89. DeMar DeRozan scored 11 points in the first, helping Toronto take a one-point, 25-24, lead after one. The HEAT shot 55.6 percent in the second, but Kyle Lowry dropped in 12 points to push the Raptors lead to six, 53-47, at the half. Toronto held a 17-point, 77-60, advantage midway through the third, but Miami closed the quarter on an 18-9 run to cut the Raptors lead to eight, 86-78, entering the final frame. Toronto quickly pushed their lead to double-figures in the fourth, leading by as many as 28 before closing out with the, 116-89, win. Dwyane Wade and Goran Dragić each scored a team-high 16 points as Lowry (35) and DeRozan (28) combined to score 63 for Toronto.

MIAMI HEAT 103, TORONTO RAPTORS 91 (5/13/16): The Miami HEAT forced a Game Seven after evening the series at three games apiece with a, 103-91, win over the visiting Toronto Raptors. No team held more than a four-point lead in the first as Miami closed the quarter up one, 21-20. Goran Dragić scored 14 points in the second to help lead Miami to a nine-point, 53-44, advantage into the half. Both teams shot over 50 percent in the third as the HEAT held a 13-point lead before closing the quarter up 10, 82-72, heading into the final frame. Toronto cut the Miami lead to six, 88-82, with 8:46 left to play, but would get no closer than that the rest of the way as Miami closed out the, 103-91, win. Dragić finished with a career-high 30 points as Dwyane Wade added 22. Kyle Lowry led Toronto with 36 points.

TORONTO RAPTORS 99, MIAMI HEAT 91 (5/11/16): The Raptors took a 3-2 series lead after defeating the Miami HEAT, 99-91, in Toronto. The Raptors started the game on a 9-0 run and pushed their lead to 16 before closing the first up 10, 28-18. Toronto held a 20-point, 55-35, lead at the 3:39 mark in the second, but Miami closed the half on a 10-0 run, cutting the Raptor lead to 10, 55-45, entering the locker room. Toronto held the HEAT to just 21.1 percent from the field in third as they took a 13-point, 75-62, advantage into the final frame. The Raptors held a 10-point, 84-74, lead with 7:40 left on the clock before a 13-4 Miami run cut it to just one, 88-87, with 1:54 remaining, but a Toronto pair of free throws and a three-point basket quickly pushed their lead back to six as the Raptors closed out the eight-point, 99-91, win. Dwyane Wade scored a team-high 20 points as Josh Richardson dropped in 13 points off the bench. DeMar DeRozan led Toronto with 34 points.

QUICK HITS:

- Entering the 2016 NBA Playoffs, Miami's roster totaled 644 career games of postseason experience, the third-most in the NBA.
- Wade has blocked 166 shots in his playoff career, the most blocks by a guard in NBA postseason history.
- The HEAT grabbed a postseason franchise record 58 rebounds and recorded a playoff team record +22 rebound margin (58-36) vs. CHA on 5/1. They capped the First Round series out-rebounding the Hornets by +72 (330-258).
- Miami has currently won 12-straight playoff games when scoring 100+ points, the longest active playoff streak in the NBA.

ALL-TIME SERIES RECORDS: The Miami HEAT has won 25 playoff series, while losing 16, during their postseason team history. Their .610 series winning percentage (25-16) is the fourth-highest all-time in NBA history. Below are the top playoff series winning percentages.

MOVIN ON UP: Dwyane Wade recorded his 100th postseason win on 5/3 at TOR, becoming just the 22nd player to record at least 100 playoff wins in NBA history. He now has the 20th most in league history with 102. He has also scored 3,781 points in the playoffs, the second-most since he entered the league (only LeBron James has more) and the 11th most in league history. Wade entered the playoffs ranking 18th on the all-time list and has passed Wilt Chamberlain, Elgin Baylor, Scottie Pippen, Dirk Nowitzki, Magic Johnson, Hakeem Olajuwon and John Havlicek this postseason. Below is where Wade ranks among the NBA's all-time postseason leaders in wins and points.

AMONG THE BEST: HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra has recorded a 70-43 (.619) postseason record, the third-highest winning percentage in NBA history (min. 100 games). He has earned postseason berths in seven of his eight seasons and has recorded the most playoff wins and the most postseason series wins in the NBA since taking over the reigns as Miami's head coach in 2008-09. Below are the highest postseason winning percentages in NBA history (min. 100 games) as well as the most playoff wins and the most postseason series wins in the NBA since Spoelstra became head coach.

ELIMINATION GAME: The HEAT has posted an 8-2 record in their last 10 elimination games, the best record by any team's last 10 games when facing elimination. Only one other team in the league even has a winning record over their last 10 (Houston at 6-4) when facing elimination. Additionally, Spoelstra has posted a 10-5 record when facing elimination since he became head coach, the best such record in the NBA over that span. FROM DOWNTOWN: The HEAT shot 72.7 percent (8-of-11) from three-point range in Game One of the East Semifinals at TOR on 5/3, marking the highest percentage from downtown in team postseason history with at least 10 attempts. The last team to shoot that high with at least 10 attempts in the playoffs was San Antonio on 4/18/09 after shooting 78.6 percent (11-of-14) vs. DAL. Additionally, Luol Deng shot 42.1 percent (24-of-57) from three-point range, marking the fourth-highest postseason shooting percentage in HEAT playoff history (min. 50 attempts). According to Elias, below are the highest single-game (min. 10 attempts) and individual three-point shooting percentages (min. 50 attempts) in HEAT franchise history.

BEYOND THE ARC: Dwyane Wade shot a team-high 52.2 percent (12-of-23) from three-point range this postseason. His 12 made trey's this postseason surpassed his entire total from this regular season (7), and according to Elias, he became the first player to make at least five playoff three-point field goals while exceeding his total from the regular season (min. 50 games) since Wade did it himself in 2005-06 when he hit 13 total threes in the regular season and then 14 in the 2006 postseason. Wade also connected on seven-straight trey's this postseason from 4/29 – 5/7, marking the most consecutive made three's in his career.

FRANCHISE LEADER: Dwyane Wade ranks among the HEAT postseason franchise leaders in many categories, including points, total rebounds, assists, steals, field goals made, free throws made, minutes played, games played, games started, defensive rebounds, double-figure scoring games, 20-point games, 30-point games, 40-point games and dunks. He enters this postseason close to taking over a couple more categories in team history. Below is where he currently stands among categories he is close to becoming Miami's all-time postseason leader in.

INSIDE THE AAA: The HEAT has posted a 73-23 (.760) record at the AmericanAirlines Arena during postseason play. Their .760 winning percentage inside the AAA is the best among Eastern Conference teams and second-best in the entire NBA for teams at their current home venue during the playoffs. SELLING OUT: Miami sold out every home game this regular season, including 238 consecutive regular season games, and now 294-straight including the playoffs. The 238-game regular season sellout streak is the longest in franchise history and the 294-straight overall sellout streak is also the longest in team history. Miami's sellout streaks are the second-longest currently in the entire NBA, only Dallas' is longer. Additionally, 223 of those 294 overall sellouts have been at over capacity, where fans have purchased Standing Room Only tickets in the Upper 400 Level, including 61 times over the last two seasons. SPO AT HOME: HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra has compiled a 46-13 (.780) career home record during postseason play. His .780 winning percentage at home is the best among active head coaches and ranks fourth all-time among NBA head coaches (with a minimum of 40 games). ON THE ROAD AGAIN: Dwyane Wade has recorded 33 postseason road victories in his career, the most by a HEAT player in playoff history, and according to Elias, it marks more road wins than 11 NBA franchise's entire total, including Washington (32), Utah (29), Portland (28), Denver (24), Orlando (20), L.A. Clippers (13), Memphis (10), Charlotte (9), Toronto (6), Minnesota (5) and New Orleans (3). Additionally, the HEAT has totaled 23 playoff road wins since the 2011 postseason, the most in the NBA. Also, their .511 road winning percentage is the third-highest mark over that span. Below are the most road playoff wins and best winning percentages since the 2011 playoffs.

GAME SEVEN: The HEAT recorded four-straight Game Seven wins from 6/9/12 – 5/1/16, tied for the fourth-longest streak in NBA postseason history. Additionally, Miami has recorded a 6-4 overall Game Seven record in franchise history. According to Elias, below are the longest Game Seven winning streaks in NBA postseason history.

OVERTIME: Three out of the first four games of the 2016 East Semifinals series vs. TOR went into overtime, marking the most overtime games in a series in HEAT history, and according to ESPN, it marks just the third time in NBA postseason history a series went into OT in three of the first four games joining OKC-MEM and POR-HOU in 2014. Additionally, the HEAT has recorded a 10-2 (.833) postseason overtime record. Their .833 postseason winning percentage is the best among teams with at least 10 overtime games played. Below are the best winning percentages by teams with at least 10 overtime games played in NBA history.

30-PLUS: Dwyane Wade posted back-to-back 30-point games after scoring a game-high 38 points on 5/7 and then a game-high 30 points on 5/9. According to Elias, it was the first time in over 15 years that a player at least 34 years of age posted back-to-back 30-point games in the playoffs. The last player to achieve that feat was Reggie Miller when he posted three-straight 30-point games from 4/24/01 – 5/2/01.

GAME THREE: Both the HEAT and Raptors each made 33 field goals and 21 free throws while each attempting 18 three-pointers in Game Three of the East Semifinals on 5/7. According to Elias, that marked just the second time in NBA postseason history in which both teams made the same number of field goals, free throws and attempted the same number of three-point shots. The first came between BOS at NY on 5/1/13.

BLOCK PARTY: Hassan Whiteside blocked 24 shots in the First Round series against Charlotte, marking the most blocks during a seven-game series in HEAT postseason history, surpassing the previous high which was held by Alonzo Mourning when he recorded 21 rejections during the seven-game 2005 Eastern Conference Finals series against Detroit. Additionally, the HEAT capped the seven-game series blocking 50 shots, also the most for a seven-game series in team history, eclipsing the previous record of 48 set during the same series against Detroit.

MARGIN OF VICTORY: The HEAT recorded a, 106-73, win in Game Seven of the First Round series against Charlotte. The +33 point victory marked as the fifth-highest margin of victory in a Game Seven in NBA history and tied Miami's third-largest overall victory in team postseason history. Additionally, the HEAT's 32-point victory against the Hornets earlier in the series on 4/17 tied for their fourth-highest margin of victory in the playoffs. According to Elias, below are the highest margins of victory in a Game Seven in NBA history and the largest wins in HEAT playoff history.

1-2-6-7: Miami captured a 4-3 series win over the Charlotte Hornets in the First Round of the 2016 NBA Playoffs. The HEAT won Game One and Game Two before Charlotte won three-straight to take a 3-2 series lead. Miami responded by winning Game Six and closed out the series with a Game Seven victory. According to Elias, that marked just the second time in NBA postseason history a team won a First Round series after winning the first two games, losing three consecutive, then winning the last two. The only other time it occurred was during the 2010 First Round series between Atlanta and Milwaukee after the Hawks followed the same pattern to defeat the Bucks.

DOUBLING UP: Hassan Whiteside posted three-straight double-doubles to open the first round series against Charlotte, becoming the first HEAT player in team postseason history to record three consecutive double-doubles in their first three playoff games as a member of the HEAT. He posted a 21-point, 11-rebound double-double in Game One, a 17-point, 13-rebound double-double in Game Two and then a 13-point, 18-rebound double-double in Game Three.

PERFECTION: Hassan Whiteside shot a perfect 8-of-8 from the field in Game Two on 4/20 vs. CHA, marking the most made field goals without a miss in HEAT postseason history. The previous best was held by Chris Andersen after he connected on 7-of-7 from the field during Game One of the 2013 Eastern Conference Finals on 5/22 vs. IND. Additionally, according to Basketball Reference, Whiteside's 17-point, 13-rebound double-double in 30:07 minutes of action, marked as the second-fastest player in HEAT postseason history to post at least 17 points and grab 13 rebounds, only Shaquille O'Neal was faster after posting 17 points and 13 boards in 29:59 minutes during Game Four of the 2006 NBA Finals on 6/15 vs. DAL.

FIVE WITH 15+: Miami had five players score at least 15 points in Game Two vs. CHA on 4/20 after Dwyane Wade (28), Goran Dragić (18), Hassan Whiteside (17), Luol Deng (16) and Josh Richardson (15) all posted 15+ point games as they became just the second set of teammates to accomplish the feat after it was originally done during Game Three of the 1992 First Round matchup vs. CHI on 4/29 by Glen Rice (25), Rony Seikaly (22), Brian Shaw (19), Steve Smith (18) and Grant Long (17).

PAIRING UP: Luol Deng shot 84.6 percent (11-of-13) from the field as Hassan Whiteside shot 81.8 percent (9-of-11) from the field in Game One of the First Round vs. CHA on 4/17. According to Elias, they have become just the second pair of teammates to each shoot better than 80 percent from the field during the same game (min 10 attempts each) during the postseason since the shot clock era (1954-55). The only other pair to do so was also from Miami when Shaquille O'Neal shot 85.7 percent (12-of-14) and Jason Williams shot 83.3 percent (10-of-12) in the 2006 Eastern Conference Finals on 5/2/06 vs. DET.

DENG GOOD: Luol Deng scored 31 points in Game One on 4/17 vs. CHA, the most by a player in his postseason debut with the HEAT, surpassing the previous record of 30 points held by both Tim Hardaway on 4/26/96 at CHI and Damon Jones on 4/24/05 vs. NY. Deng connected on 11-of-13 (.846) from the field, including four-of-six from three-point range. According to Elias, that ties for the third-highest field goal percentage in NBA postseason history with at least 12 field goal attempts that include at least five attempts from three-point range. The only players to shoot better are Chris Paul (.857) on 5/5/14 at OKC and Terry Porter (.857) on 5/19/92 vs. UTA. Deng's 84.6 percent from the field was also the second-highest shooting percentage in HEAT postseason history (min 10 attempts), only Shaquille O'Neal shot better with 85.7 percent on 5/2/06 vs. DET. Additionally, Deng's 31 points was the second-highest scoring total of his postseason career (had 33 on 4/21/07 vs. MIA).

FRANCHISE FIRST: The HEAT scored 115 points in Game Two vs. CHA on 4/20 after scoring a franchise postseason record 123 in Game One on 4/17, marking the first time in playoff team history Miami has scored at least 115 points in consecutive games. During Game Two, the HEAT scored 43 points in the second quarter while connecting on 16 made field goals and shooting 84.2 percent in the quarter, all setting franchise records for a single quarter in postseason history. They finished the first half with 72 points while connecting on 29 field goals and shooting 74.7 percent, all also setting team playoff records for any half in team history. Miami capped the game shooting 57.9 percent (44-of-76) from the field and 56.3 percent (9-of-16) from three-point range, marking the first time they have connected on at least 55+ percent from the field and 55+ percent from three-point range during a single postseason game since Game One of the 2013 Eastern Conference Finals vs. IND after shooting 61.4 percent (43-of-70) from the field and 56.3 percent (9-of-16) from downtown.

PLAYOFFS: Miami clinched a postseason berth on 4/2, marking the franchise's 19th playoff appearance. It also marks Erik Spoelstra's seventh over the last eight seasons since he became head coach, tying as the third-most in the NBA over that span. Additionally, since Pat Riley joined the HEAT in 1995, Miami's 17 playoff appearances tie for the second-most over that span. Below are the most postseason appearances over the last eight seasons since Spoelstra became head coach and 21 seasons since Riley joined the HEAT (includes this season).

- Miami's roster recorded 38 total All-Star selections (Wade-12, Bosh-11, Johnson-7, Stoudemire-6 & Deng-2), the most in the NBA.
- Whiteside's 11.84 rebound average was the highest for a single-season in team history, surpassing Rony Seikaly's 11.82 rpg in 1991-92.

WINNING WAYS: Miami posted a 48-34 record this season, resulting in an 11-win turnaround from last season (37-45). That marks the 10th time in team history Miami has improved by at least 10 wins from the previous season and the fourth time under Head Coach Erik Spoelstra. Additionally, the HEAT averaged 96.0 points before the All-Star break compared to 107.4 points after, increasing their scoring by +11.4 points. GETTING DEFENSIVE: The HEAT gave up just 98.4 points per game to opponents this season, ranking as the third-least amount of points in the Eastern Conference, and the fifth-least amount in the entire NBA. They finished in the top six for points allowed for the seventh consecutive season, tying for the fifth-longest such streak in almost 40 years, dating back to the 1976-77 season. Miami previously had an eight-season streak from 1995-96 thru 2002-03. Additionally, Miami averaged 6.48 blocks per game, the highest average in team history. According to STATS, below are the longest defensive streaks of ranking in the top six for points allowed since 1976-77 and the HEAT's highest blocks average.

1,000: The HEAT finished this season with four players hitting the 1,000-point plateau this season, including Dwyane Wade (1,409), Hassan Whiteside (1,040), Goran Dragic (1,018) and Chris Bosh (1,010). That marked as only the second time in franchise history that at least four players have reached 1,000 points in the same season. ERIK SPOELSTRA (Portland), Head Coach

Regular Season Coaching Record: 399-241, finished 8th Regular Season

Postseason Coaching Record: 70-43, completed 7th Postseason Appearance

Erik Spoelstra, completed his eighth season as head coach of the HEAT and his 22nd as a member of the organization. He was elevated to his current position on April 28, 2008. Spoelstra has rewarded the faith that HEAT President Pat Riley showed in him by garnering six postseason appearances, four division titles, four conference championships and guiding the franchise to back-to-back NBA titles in 2012 and 2013.

In his previous seven seasons at the helm, Spoelstra already made his mark on the HEAT record book. He currently holds the postseason franchise records in victories (63), winning percentage (.636), series won (14) and postseason games coached (99) on Miami's all-time list. In regular season play, he finished this past season ranked first in winning percentage (.627) on Miami's all-time list and second in victories (351) and games coached (558).

Since replacing Riley on the HEAT bench, Spoelstra has seen the expectations for the HEAT change dramatically from the time he was appointed head coach in 2008 until now. Throughout his tenure he has remained a steadying influence for his team and its paid huge dividends in return.

When he first took over the head coaching reins in 2008 he was given the task of improving a young team that had been ravaged by injuries the previous season and had won just 15 games. Two years later, after the summer of 2010 in which Miami re-signed Dwyane Wade and acquired All-Stars LeBron James and Chris Bosh, he found himself coaching a highly-talented, veteran group that was the most scrutinized team in the NBA. Spoelstra and his team have proven they are up for the challenge as he guided them to consecutive NBA Championships, four-straight Conference Championships and four consecutive NBA Finals appearances, becoming just the third franchise in NBA history to make four consecutive NBA Finals appearances, joining the Celtics and Lakers. It also made them just one of 10 franchises in the four major North American sports leagues to make four consecutive trips to the league championship. Individually, Spoelstra became just the fourth head coach in NBA history to lead his team to four-straight Finals appearances joining Red Auerbach, K.C. Jones and Pat Riley.

Spoelstra, who was tied for second place on the NBA's all-time postseason winning percentage list last season, joined a very elite fraternity when he led the HEAT to a seven-game series win over the San Antonio Spurs in the 2013 NBA Finals. Upon capturing the 2013 NBA Championship he became one of just 13 head coaches in NBA history to have won multiple championships and only the eighth to win a championship in consecutive seasons.

The 2012 championship culminated a compressed 2011-12 season in which Miami went 46-20 and captured its second consecutive Southeast Division title. The regular season was highlighted by a nine-game win streak (Feb. 10-Mar. 1) with each victory a double-digit win. During that streak the HEAT became the first team to win road games on three consecutive nights (Feb. 12-14) since December of 1979 and the first to win each of those contests by double-digits since the 1970-71 season. That streak keyed an 11-2 record in February for Miami which saw Spoelstra earn Coach of the Month honors for the third time in his career.

Before taking over the reigns as the sixth head coach in HEAT history, Spoelstra had served Miami in a number of roles in his first 13 years. He was originally hired as video coordinator and over the years was promoted to assistant coach/video coordinator, assistant coach/advance scout and assistant coach/director of scouting before ascending to head coach. He made a name for himself around the league with his game preparation and superb attention to detail. In his seven seasons as the HEAT's assistant coach/director of scouting, he had the primary role of developing game plans for upcoming opponents. To that end, he coordinated the video staff and advance scouts while overseeing the development of scouting reports and videos.

In 1992, he graduated from the University of Portland with a degree in communications. While attending Portland, Spoelstra was the starting point guard for four years and was named the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year in 1989. Upon graduating he spent two years as a player/coach for Tus Herten, a team in the professional sports league of Germany.

He has returned to his native Philippines in four of the last five offseasons to host clinics and promote education, health and wellness to thousands of at-risk youth through grassroots programs and events. The 9-day program in Manila in the summer of 2011 was the largest NBA FIT event ever hosted in Southeast Asia under the NBA Cares umbrella. In the summer of 2012, Coach Spoelstra expanded his reach into other Southeast Asia nations by conducting coaches clinics and other FIT activities in Singapore.

Raised in Portland, OR, Spoelstra, who was inducted into the Jesuit High School Athletic Hall of Fame in September 2009, is the first Asian/Filipino-American head coach in any of the major North American sports leagues.

Spoelstra is the son of Jon Spoelstra, a long-time NBA executive who has guided the Portland Trail Blazers, Denver Nuggets, Buffalo Braves and New Jersey Nets. His grandfather, Watson, was a Detroit Tigers beat writer for many years.
