To: School Principals, Teachers, and Youth Program Leaders,

The Inter-Tribal Youth Climate Leadership Congress is a week-long student climate change conference for approximately 100 Native American, Alaskan Native, and Pacific Islander high school students interested in environmental issues, natural resource conservation, community leadership and public service. We aim to achieve a broad representation of Native communities across the country, so student enrollment from each community is competitive and may be limited. This event is sponsored by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Geological Survey, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Students competitively selected via the attached application will be admitted as a school or community group of 3-5 current junior students (becoming seniors Fall 2016) with 1 adult mentor per group, who will serve as their event travel supervisor and team leader during the entire event. Travel to and from the event, conference lodging/meals for both students and adult mentors will be paid for by the federal agency partners.

Please distribute the attached application materials to your most engaged and mature junior students, especially those demonstrating aptitudes in Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Environmental Studies, Traditional Ecological Knowledge, Community Health, and Community Leadership, with the ultimate goal being groups of 3-5 student leaders to represent their school or community accompanied by an adult mentor.

Goal of the ITYCLC

The goal is to foster an inclusive, meaningful educational event for aspiring Native youth leaders interested in addressing climate change issues facing Native American, Alaskan Native, and Pacific Islander communities. The Congress will include a diverse mix of Native communities from various geographic locations, including both urban and rural students. The Congress teaches about climate change and environmental conservation to help develop leadership skills for addressing conservation issues in Native communities.

Benefits of Attending

- Opportunity for students to actively participate with a larger group of like-minded youth on issues related to climate change and natural resource conservation in their home communities.
- A chance to identify key climate-related issues facing tribal youth and their communities—involvement inspires change!
- Opportunity to learn and demonstrate leadership and communications skills to engage with peers and home communities about climate change.
- Grant funding available after the Congress for climate-related student projects in their communities.
- The Congress will conclude with a guided, educational overnight trip to Washington, DC, which includes a visit to the National Museum of the American Indian among other national attractions.
