OSMRE Director Joe Pizarchik To Present Longtime Environmental Advocate With OSMRE's Fourth ECHO Award

Washington, DC — <u>Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement (OSMRE)</u>, <u>Director Joe Pizarchik</u> will honor longtime environmental advocate Louise Dunlap today with a 2016 Environment, Community, Humanity, Ownership (ECHO) Award for her long career of protecting communities affected by surface coal mining.

Ms. Dunlap, a co-founder of two environmental lobbying organizations, helped create and lead the seven-year campaign to pass and enact the <u>Surface Mining Control and</u> <u>Reclamation Act of 1977</u> (SMCRA), which created <u>OSMRE</u>.

"Louise Dunlap personifies all the qualities OSMRE is looking for in a recipient when it awards the ECHO," said Director Pizarchik. "Most people would be satisfied getting SMCRA written into law but Louise is still working hard to make sure the law works as it's intended. Presenting her with the ECHO is a great pleasure."

Dunlap's tenacity and commitment to direct input from citizens helped pass SMCRA. In addition, she worked closely with Republicans and Democrats to secure billions of dollars during the 2006 reauthorization effort for the <u>Abandoned Mine Land</u> fund.

Dunlap helped found the Environmental Policy Center (EPC) in 1972. She continues to work on behalf of citizens and communities seeking implementation of SMCRA's standards. She is also actively involved in advancing the RECLAIM Act and another effort to reauthorize the AML fee.

OSMRE chooses ECHO honorees based on the individual's demonstration of one or more of the following attributes:

- Public Service: has shown a dedication to public service
- Sustained Engagement: has accepted difficult challenges requiring strategic, long-term efforts
- Non-partisan: has worked in a non-partisan manner
- Major Contribution: has made a significant and/or unique contribution to carry out SMCRA

- Advocate of the Law: dedication to improved implementation of SMCRA
- Protection of Society: dedication to improving protection of society
- Innovative Solutions: has a record of seeking and achieving positive solutions
