The Jerusalem Bible is obviously based on the Bible de Jerusalem; and the thought may occur that this is a strange procedure, to translate a translation. But, of course, this is not so. The introductions and notes are translated from the French (though even here occasionally brought up to date); but the text itself is translated from the original languages, either directly or through the careful revisionary work of the general editor. The French translation was used as a basis in the sense that, on doubtful

points of textual reading or interpretation, the option of the French translators was normally followed. It would take too long to assess the quality of the translation in detail, but one may sum it up generally by saying that it is straightforward: it is a serious attempt to render the words, sense and spirit of the original into the equivalent English of today; there is no attempt to give a factitious and uniform dignity by adopting the cadences of Elizabethan prose; the second person is "You" rather than "Thou".

100 years ago

THE TABLET • 21 OCTOBER 1916

Dom Gaston Godu OSB, a monk of Farnborough Abbey, who has been in the trenches in France almost from the beginning of the war, has been mentioned three times in despatches. He is praised for having "unhesitatingly devoted himself with remarkable conscientiousness and conspicuous bravery to the safe transmittal of orders, even under the hottest fire". . . . Don Godu has written as follows in a letter to Farnborough: "When we had received orders to attack, at three o'clock, the

trench opposite us which we knew was still protected by its machine-guns in spite of the efforts of our artillery - we all of us felt sure our last moment had come and that none of us would survive this 'race for death'. During the hour before the time given for going over the parapet, lots of my fellow-soldiers came to ask me for a last absolution. I have never yet had so strong and so clear an impression that my time on earth was at an end and that I was going to appear before God."


