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Introduction

Welcome to the seventh edition of the New Orleans Parents' Guide to Public Schools.

You probably know by now that public schools in New Orleans are different from those in most U.S. communities. One big difference is that students are not assigned to a school based on their home address and most public schools in New Orleans are charter schools operated independently by private not-for-profit organizations. Parents have some choice about what school you want your child to attend and need to apply to schools in order to exercise that choice.

This system can be confusing. We created this guide to help you understand our system of public schools and find the best possible school for your child.

The *Parents' Guide* was originally conceived with input from several community groups working with parents and public school leaders and published by the New Orleans Parent Organizing Network (NOLA PON), a city-wide organization of parents, grandparents and guardians of public school students organizing for excellent public schools. In 2012, NOLA PON evolved our mission to focus specifically on creating and publishing the *Parents' Guide* and changed our name to New Orleans Parents Guide. We continue to produce the *Guide* to provide basic information about each open public school in New Orleans as well as helpful tools that parents can use to evaluate schools and make decisions. The *Parents' Guide* is also available as an app for smart phones and tablets for all mobile phone platforms.

We worked hard to make sure that the information included in the *Guide* is correct but our public schools frequently change. You should always supplement information in this guide by calling or visiting schools for the most current information. In this guide, you will find some questions to ask and things to look for when you visit a school (see "Finding a School Fit" on page 10).

What's New in the 7th Edition?

For the 7th edition we pleased to work with the local school districts and the Louisiana Department of Education to add more information about each open school including details about classes sizes, student performance on standardized tests, suspension and expulsion rates, student attendance and how many students stay at each school for multiple years.

In order to help you understand what this information means, you will find an explanation on pages 16 and 17 as well as brief explanations on each school information page.

We are very excited to introduce the *Parents' Guide* app for smart phones and tablets. With support from the Wireless Foundation, we worked with Boopsie to turn the printed guide into an app with all the same information that appears in the printed guide. The NOPG app is free and available for all smart phone platforms (i.e. iPhone, Android, Blackberry, etc.).

Who's running the schools?

Most public schools in New Orleans are part of one of two school systems:

- Orleans Parish School Board school district
- Recovery School District

Each of these school systems includes some charter schools and some schools operated directly by the school system.

Orleans Parish School Board

The Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) school district is the local public school system that now runs six (6) public schools and oversees some charter schools (14 charter schools were part of the OPSB district as of the printing of this guide). The OPSB school district is governed by a 7-member elected board.

Recovery School District

The Recovery School District (RSD) was created in 2003 by the state to take over schools that were considered failing. After Hurricane Katrina, in November 2005, a law was passed for the RSD to take over schools that were below average in New Orleans. In 2013-2014 the RSD will directly run about 3 schools and oversee about 57 charter schools. The RSD is run by a superintendent who is appointed by the state. The State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) oversees the RSD.

Charter Schools

Charter schools are public schools that belong to the public school system, but are managed by someone else. Some charter schools belong to the OPSB system and some belong to the RSD. Like other public schools charter schools must be free and may not turn away students solely because of a special learning need. Many charter school are open to any student no matter their past grades or behavior and some use tests or other criteria to decide which students can attend. In this guide, on each school's page, we have included a section called "Requirements" to try to explain each school's student acceptance and enrollment process.

Charter schools must use the same tests – such as the LEAP and *i*LEAP – as other public schools and must show regular improvement in student test scores. These schools are reviewed periodically and can be forced to close if they do not improve scores or have financial problems. A non-profit board of directors makes the decisions at charter schools and must have regular public meetings to make decisions about the school.

APPLICATION 2013 TIMELINES

ost public schools in New Orleans follow one of two timelines for application and enrollment. ALL schools in the Recovery School District (including charter schools) and ALL schools directly-managed by the Orleans Parish School Board follow the OneApp timeline and process (see page 12 for more information about OneApp).

Several OPSB and Type 2 charter schools follow a shared timeline and use the same application form as part of the Eastbank Collaborative of Charter Schools. A few charter schools do not follow any of these timelines so be sure to check applications dates and processes outlined on each school page.

Every public school asks for some basic documents to complete enrollment and fully register a child in public school. Records like past grades or test results can help the school understand your child's needs. However you should be aware that a school cannot turn your child away if you do not have these documents.

KEY DOCUMENTS: Proof of address (rental lease, utility bill, etc.), proof of identity (birth certificate or ID card), immunization (shot) records

HELPFUL DOCUMENTS: Recent report cards, recent standardized test scores, IEP (Individualized Education Plan)



Do You Have a Young Child?

uality early education is a great way to help your child get off to a strong start and be ready for school. Some schools offer prekindergarten classes (PreK) for children who are four years old and a few offer classes for children as young as three years old. However, unlike grades K-12, prekindergarten is not guaranteed for all students and there are usually not enough PreK seats available in public schools for all applying students. Often these programs are limited to children whose families meet certain income limits or who are identified as gifted or as having another special learning need that may mean they will struggle to keep up with peers in school.

To identify schools that offer PreK, look for schools that list "PK" as a grade served on pages 1-173 of this guide. Contact schools to confirm that PreK is available and to get more information about application and enrollment.

In most cases, children must be 4 years old (or 3 for PK3) by September 30th in order to be eligible for prekindergarten.

Schools that participate in the central enrollment sytem, OneApp, will use a separate application form and process for PreK enrollment (see pages 12-13 for more information about OneApp). Schools that are opperated directly by the Orleans Parish School Board follow a different process for PreK enrollment. Contact those schools directly or call the OPSB Central Office for more information (see page 2 for school district contact information).

In addition to public school PreK programs, New Orleans has a number of Head Start programs that provide early education to children in families that meet certain income requirements. On the next page is a list of Head Start Centers in New Orleans that you can contact for more information. Total Community Action is a local agency that works with many Head Start Centers. You can contact them at (504) 872-0334 or at www.tca-nola.org.

There are also many privately-operated preschools and child care centers that may be able to meet your family's needs. Agenda for Children is a local agency with information about childcare options. You can contact them at (504) 586-8509 or www.agendaforchildren.org.

Finding a School Fit A Step-by-Step Guide

Step 1: Think about what your family needs

Think about what is most important to your family:

- How important is it that all your children attend the same school?
- What sports, art or music programs would benefit your child?
- Do you think your child has a special learning need? (see information about students with special needs page 14)

Step 2: Find schools that fit

Decide what factors are most important and look at the school pages (*page E1-H173*) to see which schools meet your needs. See "How to Read A School Page" on *page 16*, for help using this guide.

If the school year has already started, you should call the school you want your child to attend to find out if there is space available in your child's grade or contact the school districts to get help enrolling in school. There are four Family Resource Centers available to help families find and enroll in a public school.

Step 3: Visit the schools

Call schools to schedule visits or find out when schools are holding open houses or a parents nights for new students.

Ask for a tour of the school and see if you can watch some of the classes. You can also ask for a phone appointment if you cannot visit the school in person.

Observe

Look for these things while you walk around the school:

- 1. Is the school neat, clean and cheerful?
- 2. Do students seem to be doing educational things?
- 3. Do students seem to be interested? Are they discussing, asking questions, focused on school work?
- 4. Are students engaged even at the end of class?
- 5. Are the school bathrooms and cafeteria working and clean?
- 6. Is there a computer lab or computers in the classrooms?
- 7. Do the adults seem to like and respect the children?
- 8. Is the office calm and friendly?

Interview

Ask these questions of the school staff:

- 1. Please tell me what tests you use and what are the most recent results? How are you working to make sure every child is learning and making progress?
- 2. How are students doing in reading and math? How does this compare to last year?
- 3. How do you help students who do not read or do math at their grade level?
- 4. Please tell me about other school activities such as art and music.
- 5. Please tell me about the qualifications of your teachers. What percent of the teachers are fully certified? What percent are certified in the subjects that they teach?
- 6. How experienced are your teachers? How often do teachers get training?
- 7. How are parents involved in making decisions at the school?
- 8. Is there a handbook for parents and students? (Ask for a copy to take home)
- 9. Will my child have textbooks to take home?
- 10. Will my child be able to take other books or reading materials home?
- 11. What are the school's discipline policies? (see information about each school's approach on school profile pages E1-H172)
- 12. How do you encourage and reward good behavior?
- 13. Does the school use in-school suspension for students who misbehave?
- 14. How many students were suspended or expelled last year? How does the school working to help students who misbehave? (see information about each school's rates of suspension and expulsion on the school profile pages *E1-H172*)

For High Schools only:

- 15. What percentage of seniors graduated last year?
- 16. How many students dropped out last year?
- 17. Is there a school-to-career program?
- 18. Are there college options or courses?
- 19. How does your counselor help students choose classes and make decisions about college and life after high school?

Step 4: Apply to the Schools

Check the "Requirements" section on each school page to see if the schools you are applying to require students to take tests or have certain grades in order to attend the school.

Check the "Applications Due" date "Registration Process" on the school page to find out when you should apply for each school. Many schools are using the OneApp centralized for student enrollment and applications are due on March 15, 2013.

See the graphic "Application Timelines" on page 3 for some key dates and basic overview of application processes and timelines for RSD and OPSB schools.

If the application deadline for a school has already passed, do not give up. You may still be able to enroll your child in a particular school if there are still spaces available at that school. Although your child is not guaranteed a seat in any specific public school, your child has the right to attend a public school in the parish where you live. There are Family Resource Centers equipped to assist parents in finding and enrolling in schools (see page 10 for list of resource centers).



The OneApp is a citywide enrollment system for all RSD directrun and charter schools and OPSB direct-run schools.

The OneApp is also used to apply for state-funded scholarships to participating nonpublic schools.

Through the new system parents/students will have the opportunity to **rank schools** they most prefer for their students and will

provided with **one school** that is available and best matches their preferences. Applications are available beginning in **January 2013** and are due by **March 15, 2013**.

One Application – Use the OneApp application form to keep your child enrolled in their current public school or apply for a seat in a different school. Use the OneApp application to enroll a child who is not already enrolled in school.

Rank Schools - Use the OneApp application to rank up to 8 schools in order of which you prefer most.

One Timeline – The process is not "first-come, first-served" and all applications submitted by March 15 will be considered at the same time using the same criteria

One Offer – Students who are applying to different schools will be matched to the school that is their highest choice and has an available seat. If there are no seats available in any of the schools preferred, the process will still match each K-12 student to an available seat in a school.

The OneApp public school enrollment process will match each student with ONE school, using the process described below:

The process will honor family choice first and foremost...

- Families should rank the schools they want their child to attend
- OneApp will try to match students with their top choice, or one of their top choices

...But some schools will have more applicants than seats

- When that happens, OneApp will use a single set of priorities to help decide which students get those seats first:
- A Siblings of students who are currently enrolled in the school
- Students currently enrolled in schools that are closing
- Students who live in the school's Geographic Area (for PK-8 only)

Frequently Asked Questions



If you have more than one child that you want to attend the same school...

You should apply for "Sibling Priority" if:

 You would like one or more children to attend a school that another of your children already attends.

You should apply for "Family Link" if:

- You would like one or more children to attend a different school together.
- Please note that to apply for family link, you must rank your school choices in the same order on all your students' applications.

Siblings are defined as sharing a common parent /guardian OR living at the same address.

If your child has to repeat a grade...

- Students in 4th and 8th grade will still have to pass the LEAP or receive a waiver in order to advance to the next grade level.
- Students who have to repeat 4th or 8th grade may return to their current school, if that is what parents choose.
- If a family finds out that their child has to repeat a grade after they have already received an offer to change schools:
- The student can change schools if there are available seats in the correct grade level.
- If there are not available seats in the correct grade level, RSD/OPSB staff will work with families to find the best school for the child.

If you are applying to Pre-K programs...

There are separate forms for Pre-K 4 and K-12. Families applying to Pre-K 4 programs must use the Pre-K 4 form.

You can pick up a Pre-K 4 application packet at any participating school, on-line, or at a Family Resource Center.

You cannot apply for a Pre-K 3 seat using the OneApp:

If you are also applying to Orleans Parish schools that aren't participating...

Look for the OneApp symbol on school profiles pages (E2-H174) to identify participating schools. Each OneApp application packet also includes a complete list of participating schools.

If you want to apply to non-participating schools:

- Complete the OneApp for any participating schools.
- Contact non-participating schools to apply for enrollment.

If you receive a placement offer at a nonparticipating school and would like to decline the offer you receive through OneApp, contact a Family Resource Center.

What If My Child Has Special Needs?

If your child has a physical or learning disability (also called an "exceptionality"), you and your child have specific rights and protections under federal and state law. Many of these rights are spelled out in three federal laws, the Individuals with Disabilities Educational Act (IDEA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Public schools cannot turn away your child because of a learning, behavior or physical disability. Further, schools must provide the necessary accommodations or adjustments to educate your child.

Some Key Rights To Know:

Children with special needs have:

- The right to a free and appropriate education
- The right to be professionally evaluated for disabilities (or "exceptionalities")
- The right to an individualized education plan (or IEP)
- The right to the services necessary to provide an equal education

Parents/guardians of a child with special needs have:

- The right to participate in meetings about their child's education
- The right to inspect and review all their child's educational records
- The right to be notified of changes to their child's educational plans and be asked for consent

These are just some of the rights of children with special needs. You can find out more by reading the Louisiana Educational Rights of Children with Exceptionalities in Public Schools (available from the Louisiana Department of Education) or by visiting www.wrightslaw.com.

Some Questions To Ask:

In addition to the questions listed on pages 10 and 11 here are some additional questions to ask:

- 1. How will my child be evaluated?
- 2. How will the school address my child's special needs?
- 3. Please explain the services provided by the school to help my child with his/her special needs.
- 4. Is the school handicap accessible? Does the school have a ramp and/or elevator? (look for the wheelchair symbol on each school profile pages *E2-H173* that indicates if a school is in a fully accessible building)
- 5. Is there a special education coordinator or other staff member specifically assigned to oversee special education?
- 6. Please explain the school's discipline policies.

Non-Traditional School Programs

In addition to the schools included on pages *E2-H173*, there are several non-traditional school programs offered in Orleans Parish. These schools are designed for students who have unique needs or who have not been well-served in a traditional school environment. Although the term "alternative school" is often used to refer to schools for students who have been expelled from other schools, alternative schools may also be created to serve students who need a non-traditional school environment for a number of reasons. Often these programs feature smaller class sizes and career-focused curriculum. These programs often do not have features of a traditional high school like a variety of team sports and student clubs.






School Enrollment

Each year schools report how many students they have enrolled by Oct. 1 and how many of those students have special learning needs including those who have been identified as exceptionally gifted in a particular area or having a special talent. They also report the ethnicity or race of students and how many students are eligible to receive free or reduced-price lunch because of family income.

These numbers can change during the school year as students join or leave a school. During the school year many additional students are often discovered to have special education needs so that number can change.

Public schools are expected to serve all types of students and work to meet their educational needs. This information may help you know a little about what students the school is serving.



Understanding the Graphs

Metrics of Performance

Where is the information from?

Information included on the right side of each school profile page was gathered from the Louisiana Department of Education, the Orleans Parish School Board and the Recovery School District and is presented to give you a broad picture of each school. This information was gathered and calculated by a team of data analysts at the RSD, OPSB and LDOE and submitted to schools for their review and feedback.

Whenever possible, data about multiple school years is presented so that you can see general trends over time. Because of the constant change among our schools, we caution you to always consider the data presented along with the information presented on the left side of each school profile page about school programming and education approach to gain a deeper understanding of the schools.

What can this data tell you?

Class Size and Student-Teacher Ratio

Information about the size of classes at each school was gathered from the Louisiana Department of Education and shows the percent of students who learned core subjects in a class size within each range.

Schools have varied class sizes for many reasons and students may experience learning in both large and small class settings within a day. Some schools, especially elementary schools, have more than one teacher in each classroom.

Student-teacher ratio is calculated by dividing the total number of students by the total number of full-time and part-time teachers at the school. This number is an average and does not mean that there are no classes larger or smaller than the ratio.

Standardized Test Results - LEAP & ACT

Every year, public school students take standardized tests that are intended to measure how much they have learned and how ready they are to progress to the next grade level. These tests are also used to measure the progress of each overall school.

We included student acheivement on these tests to help you get a sense of how students at each school are performing on these tests and how well schools are preparing their students for the next grade level or for college.

The Louisiana Assessment of Educational Progress (LEAP) test is given to students in 4th and 8th grade who must pass the test to move on to the next grade. Students earn a score of unsatisfactory, approaching basic, basic, mastery or advanced in math, English, science and social studies. They must reach basic in math or English and at least approaching basic in the other subject to progress to the next grade.

We have included the percent of students who earned scores at each possible performance level when they took they took the test each Spring. Students who do not pass the test on their first try are able to retake the LEAP over the summer.

The ACT is a national college readiness test in the areas of English, math, reading and science. Many colleges use ACT results to determine if students are ready for college.

We have included the average score of students who took the ACT at each school along with the percent of all students at the school who took the ACT.

In the past, high school students could decide whether to take the ACT and often only students who planned to go on to college took the test. Beginning in the 2012-2013 school year, all students will have to take the ACT to graduate from high school. Although students will not have to earn a specific score to graduate, their results will be a part of each high school's School Performance Score (SPS).

Student Stability

Because families have choices about where to enroll their students, one indicator of overall satisfaction is how many students choose to remain at a school from year to year. Student stability shows the percent of students eligible to re-enroll who chose to return to the school for another year. This figure was calculated from each school's official annual October 1 student count.

Discipline Outcomes

Student behavior and how schools respond to behavior issues has big impact on the overall climate of the school. Suspension and expulsion rates combined with information about how the school handles problem behavior can help you get some sense of the overall discipline climate. In general, high schools tend to have more suspensions and expulsions than elementary schools.

School Performance Scores (SPS)

On each school profile page, you will find information about the performance of students on standardized tests and a graphic that shows the School Performance Scores (SPS) the school was given by the Louisiana Department of Education.

Where is this information from?

Each year, students in grades 3-12 take standardized tests designed to measure their learning. State officials use two years of these results and combine them with other information such as student attendance rates and high school graduation and drop out rates to calculate each school's School Performance Score.

Whenever possible we have included multiple years of SPS results so that you can see how the school has performed over time. In many cases, schools have changed operators during the years reported. When that happens, we still include the past performance scores for the school but indicate on the school profile page when the operator changed.

The way SPS is calculated for high schools has changed a few times over the last few years. Until the 2009-2010 school year, high school students took the Graduate Exit Exam and each school's SPS was based mostly on these results. Then during the 2010-2011 school year, high school students began taking End of Course exams (EOC) that were designed to replace the GEE. Because of this change, schools were given both an SPS based on GEE results as well as a Transition SPS which included EOC results. When these two scores were different, we have noted their Transition SPS.


What Do These Scores Mean?

The School Performance Score is used to determine how well a school is preparing its students in the areas of math, English, social studies and science.

State officials use this score to give each school a performance label and tell the school administration what it must do to improve. A school that has a low score and does not improve after several years can be forced to close.

Initially, schools were given a number of stars for their academic performance or labeled "Academically Unacceptable." Beginning in the 2010-2011 school year, the state began issuing letter grades to each school based on school scores and "+" or "-" to indicate whether a school achieved its state-set goal for growth.

For the 2011-2012 school year, the state changed the grading scale slightly and



eliminated the "+" and "-" indicators. Additionally, schools that went through a significant change - such as moving from one charter operator to another - were given a letter grade of "T" to indicate this transition.

Considering a School's Growth

Remember, the best way to consider school performance is over multiple years so that you can see if a school is improving. School performance can be affected by a number of factors and we strongly encourage you to talk to the principals and teachers at your child's school if you have questions or concerns about school performance.









Glossary of Terms

academic admission requirements — process used by some schools to determine which students will be admitted. Several schools base admission on a scoring system based on students' grades, test scores and other factors.

alternative school/program — school or program designed to provide students with behavior problems with an opportunity to continue their education and rehabilitate behavior or designed to provide education for students who have not been successful in a traditional school program (i.e. students who have been retained multible times and are much older than their classmates). According the Louisiana Department of Education, "The purpose of Alternative Education Schools/Program is to afford students the opportunity to rehabilitate behavior and/or reinforce academic achievement in an environment that meets their individual needs."

before + **aftercare** — services provided by some schools to accommodate parents who need their children cared for beyond normal school hours. The time is generally used to provide students with extra study time, arts enrichment or physical education.

Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) — nine-member state board that sets policy for all Louisiana public schools. Seven members are elected from districts around the state and two members are appointed by the governor.

charter school — a public school that is run independently of the traditional public school system that receives public funding, is tuition free and is held accountable by an agreement with either the state or a local school district.

evaluation — a process of determining if a child has special learning needs.

charter organization — a non-profit board that is responsible for making overall decisions about how a charter school is operated. These boards must hold regular open meetings and provide appropriate notice of meetings.

inclusion/inclusive education practices — policy of providing services to students with special learning needs, including speakers of languages other than English, in a general classroom setting. The students are included in the regular education program rather than being separated into special education classes.

Individual Education Plan (IEP) — a plan that is developed by the parents and teachers of a student with special learning needs that outlines the student's program of study and particular education services needed. Federal special education law (IDEA) requires that all children with disabilities or exceptional talents have an IEP.

lottery — a process of randomly selecting students from a pool of applicants. Some charter schools use lotteries if they receive more applications for admission than they have available spaces.

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) — federal law that mandates that all youth between the ages of 3 and 21 with disabilities have access to a free, appropriate public education.

open enrollment — school that is open to any student in New Orleans regardless of where they live.

Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) — seven-member board elected every four years to set policy and oversee schools within the Orleans Parish School Board district.

Recovery School District (RSD) — a state-wide, intermediate school district created by the state Board of Elementary and Secondary Education to take over and operate failed schools. In New Orleans, the RSD operates schools directly and oversees charter schools.
