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THE CLERK: Calling criminal case 06-0035, United States v. Eric McDavid. On for jury trial, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Good morning. We're outside the presence of the jury at this time.

All right. I've been informed, Mr. Reichel, that you may have done something that --

MR. REICHEL: I apologize, Your Honor. I lifted a box to get into my truck at 8:30 to come over here, and it felt like a pulled muscle that -- I believed it was just a pulled muscle, but since that time I have real trouble getting breath -- it's very painful to take a full breath. And I can't sit down right now. And I have real trouble getting air. So I don't know what could have caused it. I thought it was just a pulled muscle. I believed it was a pulled muscle, but I'm trying to figure a way to deal with this for a little while here.

THE COURT: The reason I obviously have to talk to you about this is that if it's going to affect your ability to represent Mr. McDavid at this time I need to know that.

So I think that's the first question that I have right now is, do you feel that you are physically capable of

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        continuing on with the cross-examination at this point?
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                  MR. REICHEL: Well, what I'm asking for is a 15- to
        30-minute break. I'm not capable of doing it right now. Until

        the jury. Mr. Reichel, you were able to go to the nurse here?
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MR. REICHEL: Yes. I talked to the nurse, Your Honor, and I'm happy that all my vital signs are fine.

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She theorized that I may have a pulled or torn ligament in some of the rib areas, and I kind of concur. The problem I have is that breathing is very, very difficult and as a result, I do avoid it, and it prevents me from talking, as well too much, and so I just got --

THE COURT: Are you going to the --

MR. REICHEL: I'm going to go to the doctor immediately. I can't imagine -- I can't see how by, you know, the noon hour or something I'll be in a different situation. But you never know. Mr. Lapham actually has some experience with this type -- possibly this injury.

But, anyway, there is a possibility I could be ready to go at 1:30. I'm going to go to a doctor right from here.

So I'd ask that we come back at 1:30. If it's something where they are going to give muscle relaxers --

THE COURT: Well, if they give you muscle relaxers, then that's it.

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$ REICHEL: I'm having trouble getting air, and I'm in extreme pain.

And I apologize to the Court and the parties. I have witnesses today that are coming down off of work as well that were going to be here as well, so it's to the defendant's inconvenience as well.

1 THE COURT: Anything at all from the Government? 2 MS. ENDRIZZI: No, Your Honor. We're in a situation 3 where his health takes precedence. I would like to be able to 4 go this afternoon. 5 THE COURT: What I'm trying to think of right now is 6 a way to have you contact the Court sometime before, and if the 7 jurors could call in, and we could have a call-in number, so if it's not going to go, it just won't go, and everyone would 8 9 know. 10 MR. REICHEL: I can call you at 11:30. 11 (Discussion between Court and Deputy.) THE COURT: We're just going to come back at 1:30, 12 13 and if you're not able to be here, let me know. 14 MR. REICHEL: I will. We'll let you know right away. 15 THE COURT: By noon if you can. 16 MR. LAPHAM: Your Honor, maybe we should discuss that before the jury comes out, a contingency plan. Would we 17 18 possibly be in session on Thursday or Friday if we lose a day 19 today? 20 MR. REICHEL: Friday is very difficult for me. Thursday as well. 21 2.2 THE COURT: I'm out of town after criminal calendar 23 on Thursday, and Friday I've got civil calendar. 24 MR. REICHEL: Friday I have a three-strikes 25 preliminary that has been set for months with five

co-defendants. And I'm available Monday.

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THE COURT: My only contingency I can think of is that we go Monday.

MR. REICHEL: I'm available Monday and Tuesday.

THE COURT: Any conflicts?

MR. LAPHAM: None.

MS. ENDRIZZI: No, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. That's all we can do. Thank you.

(Jury in.)

THE COURT: And for the record, the jurors have entered the courtroom.

Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. I apologize for the delay in bringing you out. I'd ask that you not get too comfortable right now. We're going to be taking an unexpected break this morning.

This morning, on the way to court, Mr. Reichel apparently did something I think we all may have done at some point in time, tried to pick up a box or did something, and may have possibly torn ligaments in the rib cage area, which affects his ability to breathe at this point in time.

And our nurse here at the building has strongly advised that he go to a physician immediately to see what the situation is.

I think, obviously, if you've ever been in any situation like this, it makes it very difficult to concentrate

and do anything. So what I've done is I'm going to order a recess this morning, and we'll come back at 1:30. And, hopefully, we will know that Mr. Reichel can continue, or if there's been some other developments, we'll advise you at that time. I apologize for what is an unexpected delay, but sometimes things happen this way.

I've talked to counsel about what would happen as far as the timing. I don't know how it's going to affect future evidence at this point in time. There may be things that we can do. But right now it does not appear -- in fact, I know it's not going to happen -- that we're going to be able to go, if we needed to, any part of Thursday or Friday, so that won't affect the scheduling this week.

There may, however, be a necessity of going maybe on Monday of next week. I'm not sure. We just won't know until we find out this afternoon. So I'll let you know as soon as I can and keep you apprised and updated, so that you can adjust accordingly.

And, again, I apologize for this unexpected turn of events, but it's just simply unavoidable at this point in time.

Any questions at all? Yes.

JUROR 1. As far as deliberation, Your Honor, that would be after Monday then?

THE COURT: If we go Monday. It could be -- in theory, what we were planning on trying to do is to have the

evidence presented by tomorrow, even hopefully get the instructions to you, and so that you could have started deliberating. It would have been pushing it very hard to do that, but that was the intent. I don't know how that's going to affect it today.

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But if it -- remember, like I said, we're in the evidence portion of the trial Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday. But once you begin deliberations, it's every day or -- yes, it goes Monday through Friday then, if you need to do so. That's something I can't tell you.

And the reason we can't go Thursday, I have a criminal calendar on Thursday morning that deals with another aspect of the court, and plus I have to go out of town that morning. And on Friday I've got another civil calendar that's going on. The attorneys are also in other court appearances on that date. We've all scheduled around it. That's the reason why.

Any other questions at this time? You're free to go. You don't have to stay here in the jury deliberation room or downstairs. Just as long as you return here by 1:30 p.m. today.

Remember your admonitions regarding discussing the case, forming opinions. And, also, let me remind you, too, please, don't read any newspaper reports or television or radio broadcasts regarding this trial. Thank you. We'll see you

back here at 1:30 p.m.

2 (Jury out.)

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THE COURT: All right. If nothing else, see you at 1:30 p.m.

Mr. Reichel, please call as soon as you find any information out. And let's have a fail safe of by noon.

MR. REICHEL: Okay.

THE COURT: Thank you.

(9:42 a.m.)

(Break in proceedings.)

(Jury in. 1:35 p.m.)

THE COURT: All right. Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. As you can see, Mr. Reichel is not present at this time. We have spoken with his investigator, and apparently he is being — there is some concern that there may even be a fractured rib of some type, and he is being x-rayed at this point in time, so he will not be able to return this afternoon.

So at this point in time, I'm going to assume that we will be commencing tomorrow morning at our normal time. If something happens in the interim period of time, either the Deputy or the Jury Administrator will contact you all at the numbers that we have. And I don't know if they are all cell phone numbers or home numbers, but I would ask that you please check any messages that you may have on whatever number you gave us, your home or cell, so that we can give you the latest

information. We will be in touch with him as much as possible during the afternoon. And as soon as we have any additional information, we will let you know. I'm sorry. I don't have any more information other than you are going to be excused now with remembering, please, to not listen to any radio, TV reports, read the newspaper or discuss the case or form any opinions. Thank you. If nothing else, thank you. We'll see you tomorrow morning at 9:00. (Jury out.) THE COURT: All right. Mr. Lapham, Ms. Endrizzi, obviously there's nothing we can do at this point in time since we don't have Mr. Reichel present, so we'll see you tomorrow morning at 9:00. Court's adjourned. (Court adjourned. 1:40 p.m.)
