


IBD/TIPP Poll: Obama Up 11, Clinton 5 Over McCain, But 'Dream Team' Adds Little


Barack Obama, who was tied with John McCain in last month's IBD/TIPP Poll, has shot to an 11-point lead in our May survey. And Hillary Clinton, who had trailed McCain by 7, is now ahead by 5. The biggest swings for Obama came among 18-to-24-year-olds, who now favor the Democratic front-runner 64%-33% vs. 46%-44% a month ago; \$50,000-\$75,000 income earners, who back him 61%-25% after favoring McCain 45%-43% in April, and Independents who have gone from 42%-37% McCain to 44%-33% Obama. Obama's lead didn't expand when he was paired with Clinton as his vice president against three GOP possibilities. Only a McCain-Condoleezza Rice ticket was able to make inroads, however.


If the 2008 election for U.S. president were held today, for whom would you vote?
