REFUGE OF OPPRESSION.

From the Camden (S. C.) Journal. A special meeting of the Camden Baptist Church, on Saturday evening, the 3d inst., the following Resolutions and Resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we view with contempt the address, petitions, declarations and menaces of Elon Galusha and his coadjutors, contained in their address to the Southern Baptists.

Resolved, That we feel great interest in the cause of Mission, but can never consent to have an officer bear, who so far forgets his duty as a Christian as to meddle with what does not concern him.

Resolved, That those who are not for us are against us, and that any refusal or neglect on the part of the convention to express an opinion on the subject, will be regarded by us as taking sides with abolitionists.

Resolved, That Southern Baptists should speak out their sentiments, and let Elon Galusha and his philanthropic friends know, that we are not dependent upon them for their 'labors of love,' and that we disregard their menaces.

Resolved, That we will continue to Northern Baptists, opposed to the abolitionists, our warmest affection and fraternal regard. They will ever have an interest in our prayers.

Resolved, That the highly approved of the course of the Rev. Mr. W. H. Burdett, of the Recorder and Watchman, and that his views and commendations on this subject should receive the serious consideration of Southern Churches.

Resolved, That the 'Address' be returned to the sender, with the request that he will never again insult us with an 'address' of any kind.

Resolved, That these proceedings be published in the Christian, Daily, Recorder, Religious Herald, N. Y. Baptist Advocate, and Camden Journal.

Resolved, That brethren Hughson, Robinson, and Pezues be appointed a committee to carry the above resolutions into effect.

In North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama, Conventions, Associations, and Churches, have been called to order, and have proclaimed their determination to pursue the even tenor of their way, unswayed and undeterred by the remonstrances or threats of their anti-slavery advisers.

No action has been taken in our state in reference to this address. Not because we were unwilling to do so, but because we were unwilling to be drawn into the unauthorised intrusion of these abolitionists into our domestic concerns.
