








CEO'S MESSAGE





There has never been a more exciting time to be a member of the Tourism & Transport Forum Australia (TTF). The Australian economy is continuing its transition from the mining boom to a more diversified service-based economy. In this context, Government is looking to industry organisations such as TTF for leadership and support on the policy reform agenda Australia needs to pursue to meet our potential.

Australia's visitor economy has a great economic, social and environmental story to tell. While other industry sectors are struggling in the economic transition, our sector is thriving. Last year, more than 6.9 million overseas visitors travelled to Australia (up 8 per cent), stayed for a collective 248 million nights (up 11 per cent) and spent \$36.6 billion (up 18 per cent).

The Chinese love affair with our beautiful island nation has been spearheading the surge. More than one million Chinese visitors now travel to Australia each year and they are spending \$8.3 billion in our shops and restaurants, on our hotels and accommodation and our vibrant tourist attractions.

But it's not just international visitors who are exploring all that Australia has to offer. More Australians than ever are travelling in their own backyard and contributing to a robust domestic visitor economy – 87.1 million overnight trips (up 7 per cent), 322 million visitor nights (up 4 per cent) and \$57.9 billion in expenditure (up 6 per cent) was contributed to the Australian economy by domestic travellers.

These strong results could not be achieved without the commitment and investment of our members in Australia's visitor economy. Without our planes, cruise ships, airports and seaports, without the train, bus, light rail, ferry and carhiring providers, developers, investors and freight logistics, and without the choice of accommodation and hospitality offerings, tourist attractions – both natural and man-made –

cultural institutions and array of major and business events that compel people to travel, none of this would be possible.

The tourism sector has the potential to do even better if we put the visitor economy at the heart of economic decision-making in Australia. We cannot stand still. This is one of the most competitive sectors in the world.

Government cannot assume that the industry's current success provides a blank cheque for fee and tax hikes. TTF has been a vocal opponent of the backpacker tax, rising visa fees and the holiday tax levied on every visitor through the Passenger Movement Charge. These are the types of challenges which TTF confronts on behalf of our membership. With determination and methodical advocacy supported by thoughtful research pieces, we can influence the Government to rethink its position and take positive action to support Australia's visitor economy.

Advocacy at Work highlights what we have achieved together, the policy development, public advocacy, events and communication activities that have again demonstrated the power and influence of our collective union through the Tourism & Transport Forum Australia.

I thank you for your continuing support and look forward to another year together building a stronger industry that will be recognised in its rightful place as a key economic pillar that will support the success of our nation and our people for decades to come.

FEDERAL LEADERSHIP SUMMIT

The TTF Leadership Summit is held annually in Parliament House, Canberra, and facilitates dialogue between political leaders, policy-makers and TTF's members from the tourism, aviation and transport industries.



AUSTRALIAN TRANSPORT SUMMIT

The annual Australian Transport Summit brings together transport operators, government agencies, academics and key decision makers to consider the major policy challenges and opportunities in the public transport sector. The Summit is held in partnership with the International Association for Public Transport Australia New Zealand (UITPANZ).



OUTLOOK TOURISM INDUSTRY & POLICY CONFERENCE

The Outlook Tourism Industry & Policy Conference brings together approximately 150 CEOs and senior executives from Australia's leading companies in the hotel, aviation and tourism sectors to consider trends and opportunities in the visitor economy.

PREMIUM EVENT SERIES

FRIENDS OF TOURISM

The Friends of Tourism groups bring together Members of Parliament from Government and Opposition at the Federal and State levels to support and recognise the importance of the visitor economy.

INDUSTRY COCKTAILS

TTF hosts a number of industry cocktail receptions throughout the year. Each event features a political or business leader keynote speaker, including Prime Ministers, Federal and State Ministers, State Premiers and senior leaders within our sector.

TTF WOMEN'S BUSINESS CIRCLE

The TTF Women's Business Circle series, now in its second year, has the primary objective to provide the opportunity for women in the sector to come together and engage in discussion on issues relevant to the national agenda in an exclusive forum. Each event features prominent business and political leaders.

MEDIA AND COMMUNICATIONS

A strong presence across Australia's broadcast, print, and online media speaks to TTF's credibility as a sought-after commentator on tourism, transport and aviation issues. Our media activity helps promote the value of these sectors and this profile is critical to our ability to influence debate in the public sphere.

TTF advocates on behalf of members through the annual budget submission process of Australia's Federal, State and Territory Governments. Our detailed submissions argue the case for greater Government investment in Australia's tourism, aviation and transport sectors to build a stronger visitor economy.

TTF continues to be a strong voice for the role of better transport networks in the productivity and liveability of our cities. Transport and tourism walk hand in hand, improving connectivity, accessibility and regional dispersal.

TTF'S POLICY GOALS FOR TRANSPORT ARE TO:

- Ensure strong investment by State and Federal Governments in public transport and road infrastructure
- Increase private sector involvement in the delivery of public transport
- Promote best practice and innovation in customer service for public transport passengers, particularly through the adoption of new technology
- Support the dynamic and growing cruise ship sector
- Improve the regulatory environment for rental vehicles and point-to-point transport providers, including the taxi and ride-sharing industries

 Government to develop a combined tourism and
 transport strategy which was first proposed by TTF in our
 transport agenda for Sydney
- Advised the Queensland Government on a dedicated Tourism and Transport Strategy
- Campaigned for Federal funding for Gold Coast Light Rail Stage 2
- Advocated for the Victorian Government to commit to providing 20 new E-class trams each year to rejuvenate their fleet
- Campaigned for and secured the location of an underground metro station at Barangaroo as part of the new Sydney Metro rail line
- Advocated for game changing projects that will help transform our cities including: the Brisbane Cross River Rail, Sydney Metro and Melbourne Metro; light rail routes for the Sydney CBD and Eastern Suburbs, Parramatta and Western Sydney, the Gold Coast, Perth and Adelaide; and a multi-modal transport system for Newcastle
- Championed Federal Government support for a fast rail link between Sydney CBD, Parramatta and the Western Sydney Airport at Badgerys Creek

- Submission to the Productivity Commission's inquiry into Barriers to Service Exports with TTF's recommendations being referenced throughout the Commission's final report
- Submitted a response to the Federal Government's draft International Education Strategy, outlining the economic value and broader visitor economy implications of international education
- Hosted a Tourism Accommodation Workshop in 2016 to discuss the industry's proposed regulatory framework of short-term holiday letting

 Hosted a Nature-based Tourism Panel in 2016 to discuss TTF's policy framework and advocacy agenda for naturebased infrastructure and marketing

Advocacy

- Encouraged the appointment of a dedicated Federal Minister for Tourism in the Turnbull Coalition Government
- Advocated for and achieved a hold on any increases in visa fees and the Passenger Movement Charge in the Federal Budget 2016
- Secured additional occupations to be included in the Seasonal Worker Programme Tourism Pilot and implementation of other initiatives as part of the Northern Australia White Paper
- Secured additional tourism and events funding from the New South Wales Government to a record total of \$176 million
- Protected Sydney's iconic Bridge Street sandstone buildings for use as world-class luxury visitor accommodation by international hoteliers Pontiac Land Group
- Achieved a funding commitment from the Victorian Government for the expansion of the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre, to ensure it remains competitive domestically and internationally
- Advocated for the reinstatement of tourism marketing funding and a commitment over the forward estimates in Queensland. Tourism and Events Queensland secured \$400 million over four years in the 2015-16 Budget.
- Promoted Tasmania's EOI process for nature-based tourism investment as an example of best practice sustainable tourism development in Australia
- Campaigning for reform of the Tourism Refund Scheme to increase its attractiveness to international visitors and boost retail sector spending
- Spearheaded joint tourism and agriculture sector representations to the Federal Government on the treatment of working holiday makers for taxation purposes.
