- Cities develop and implement key activities furthering the integration of asylum seekers.
- Cities have an interest to play a coordinating role in cooperation with other responsible actors.

The Role of Cities: EUROCITIES Statement on Asylum




- In their 2015 statement, EUROCITIES members stress the key role cities have in managing the integration of refugees and asylum seekers and call for, among others:
 - a comprehensive EU migration policy that recognises the challenges faced by cities and local level solutions,
 - measures to improve the integration of asylum seekers and refugees at local level,
 - a better sharing of responsibility and solidarity across Europe,
 - adequate European and national funding for cities to support services provided to asylum seekers and refugees at local level, e.g. for language training,
 - involvement of city authorities by the EU and national governments in the implementation of the Common European Asylum System.

Local Authority Plays Key Role



- communicates with citizens
- provides services to refugees (housing, welfare assistance)
- defines own integration standards
- cooperates with other authorities and private partners
- supports civil society enables engagement
- fights racism and solves conflicts



Principles to Promote Refugee Inclusion



- Be inclusive!
 - Special services for refugees might be helpful at the start but are not a long-term solution.
 - Existing services should be open and accessible to all.
- Provide help for people to help themselves!
 - Strengthen personal responsibility and self-reliance of refugees.
- React immediately to conflicts with a clear position!





- Show a positive attitude
- Engage in active communication
 - as early as possible
 - take questions seriously
 - involve supporters
 - various target groups:
 - public
 - stakeholders
 - neighbours of houses for refugees

- Support civil engagement
 - example: mentoring programme for refugees
- Involve the whole community
 - example: cultural initiatives or sports clubs

 - include the goal of integrating refugees and migrants in local planning strategies
 - train your staff in intercultural competences
 - employ people with migrant background
 - open institutions, such as libraries, to new users
