Sweden is a sparsely populated country overall, but there is still a shortage of housing in many municipalities. The availability of housing is smaller in the urban centres than in rural areas. It is common for people to live in one municipality and work in another. Most municipalities have good public transportation systems that make commuting to work possible.

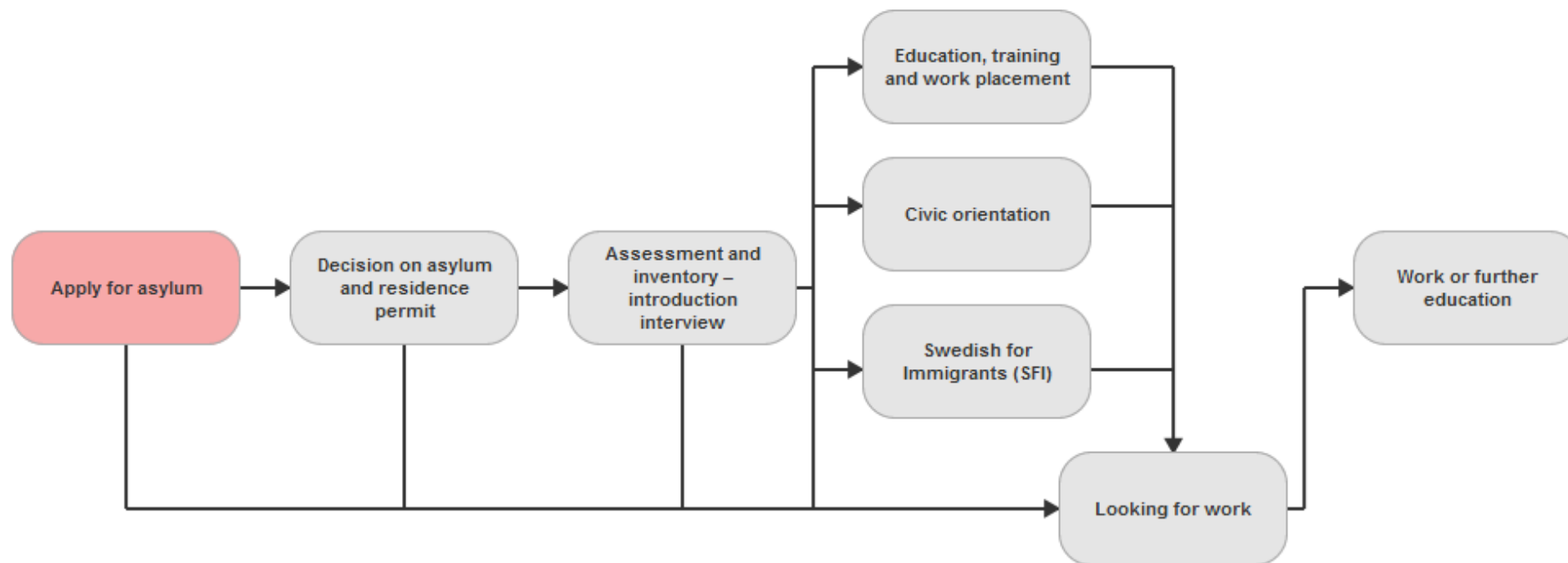
The population of Sweden

About 9.5 million people live in Sweden today. Of these, about two million live in the three biggest cities: Stockholm, Gothenburg and Malmö. Almost a fifth of the population were born in another country or have parents who are both from another country. Swedish is the main official language; Sami, Finnish, Meänkieli, Romani and Yiddish are official minority languages.

From asylum to work

Here you can see how the process runs from when you apply for asylum in Sweden until you have found work. Obviously you can look for work right away and do not need to wait to come to an introduction interview. In all parts of the process you have a responsibility for things turning out as well as you want and as well as possible.

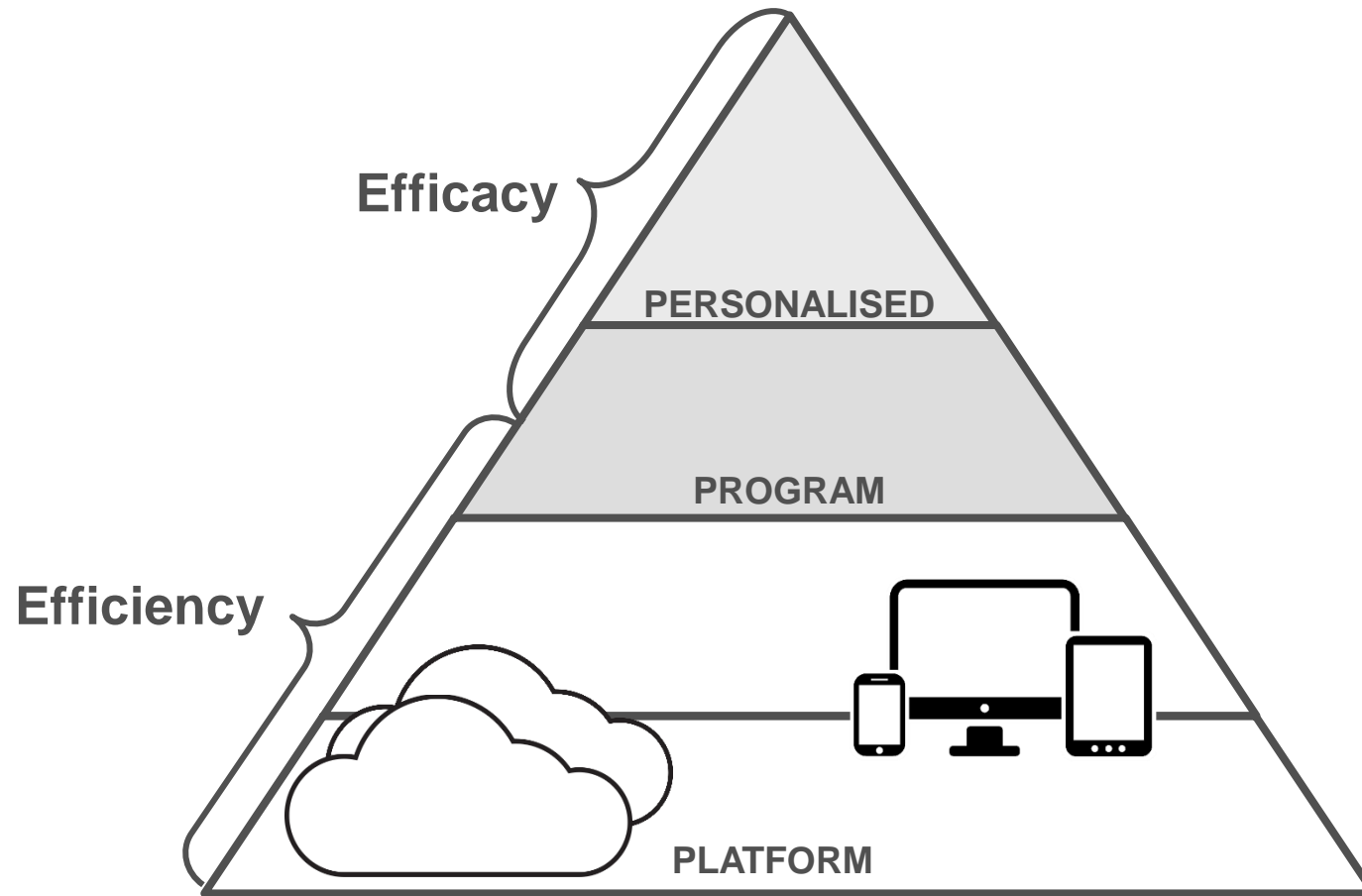

Apply for asylum

When you come to Sweden as a refugee, you have to apply for asylum. You apply for asylum to [Migrationsverket](#) (the Swedish Migration Board). While you are waiting for a decision, you can live with relatives or friends you have in Sweden. If you cannot arrange somewhere to live by yourself, you will get help from Migrationsverket.
