Under the theme of Church Planting the N.S.W. Annual Meetings of the Aborigines Inland Mission, were held in the Stanmore Baptist Church, on Friday, August 5.

CHURCH PLANTING

The three sessions which were held at 4 p.m., 6.30 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. were well attended. Just on 300 people sat down for the two-course meal which was prepared by the ladies of the Sydney Central Auxiliary.

Featured in the meetings were Aboriginal Christians, some from the newly re-organized A.I.M. Community Church at Dubbo, N.S.W., and students from the Bible Training Institute. Singleton.

Those from the Dubbo Church included Mr. W. H. Naden, who is in charge of the work, and his wife, Mr. W. Nolan, secretary of the Church, and his wife, and Mr. V. Shaw, deacon, and graduate of the Singleton Training Institute. These folk provided items and told of the Lord's work in the central west of N.S.W.

"We have over 1,200 of our people living within a 45 mile radius of our Church," stated Mr. Naden. "These people are our responsibility. Pray with us for this work — and for the need of a pastor."

Mr. E. A. Collins, General Secretary of the Mission, gave praise to God for another year of service. "Thou crownest the year with thy goodness" (Ps. 65.10) was the thought of his opening remarks.

Mr. Collins went on to tell of the changes across the Field today. "Changes have come in our local (continued page 12)

THE CALL

Moses had been brought up in the land of Egypt by the daughter of a cruel powerful King named Pharoah. Moses was much learned in the ways and habits of the people of Egypt.

Being a member of the household of Royalty he had many more advantages over most things than did others of his age. But one day Moses saw a great wrong being done, and in defence of the just one, he fought and killed the man, and because he feared that what he had done would finally get to the Kings' ears he ran away to another country. Here he met a young lady and married her (Chapter 2 16.21.)

In Chapter 3 we learn that Moses was earning his living as a sheep Shepherd for his father-in-law. One day as he was tending the sheep at the back edge of the desert, he saw a bush catch fire, and as he watched he wondered why the bush did not burn away.

God then spoke to him and called "Moses, Moses!" God said to Moses "I want you to go back to the place where you ran away from — that is Egypt!" God's reason for this was that all His people were in bondage and suffering very much because of the hard tasks that this cruel King was putting upon them, and God wanted Moses back to Egypt to lead these people away. He knew nobody was more suitable for this job than Moses. Why . . .

Firstly - because God called him. ĬS Secondly - because Moses was reared and educated in all the wisdom that belonged to the Egyptian people.

Now Moses was very afraid and began to make many excuses to God (Chapter 4.10.) Moses had said that the people would not believe him and again, that the people would not listen to what he would say. Also he said, 'I am a very poor talker." But God overcame all these problems for him. In Chapter 4.2 God said "What have you got in your hand" and Moses said

A ROD

God told Moses to throw it upon the ground, and i became a serpent. And Moses was afraid of it. Then God said to Moses "Catch it by the tail". As he did so it became a rod in his hand. Then again God asked Moses to put his hand into his bosom. His hand became leprous - God then told him to put it back in his bosom and his hand became clean and pure again. In this story God is revealing to us a true picture of ourselves by type and

We will now look and see the meaning of these types and symbols in our life such as "Where do we live" and "How do we live?"

EGYPT

The first type is Moses living as an Egyptian. We always think of Egypt as a city of sin. It was controlled by a cruel King named Phahoah. He is the type, or symbol of the Devil. Those who comes under his power are held captive, and are in bondage of sin. by

The Bible says, "The way of the transgressor, or the sinner is a hard road, a hard Way." And the wages from such a way of life is death. In F. Ingham

this story the children of God were being held captive by this sinful King who caused them much pain, sorrow and suffering. They thought they could get along quiet well without God. The Bible says that there is a way that looks all right to man, but it is the way of death. Jesus is the only Way. There are many today down in "Egypt" serving Satan.

"Is this the place you are living?" If it is, I know you are not satisfied, you are not happy, you are not content.

And do you know something! God is not happy about you either, because He really loves you and longs for you to leave this sinful state of life and follow Him!

THE SERVANT

So God sent Moses down to Egypt to lead from this land of suffering and sin, all that would listen to the voice of His servant. God has also done this for us. He sent Jesus, His only Son to lead us out of our sinful condition — but we must listen to His voice and follow Him.

Now comes another type of God's presence to His servant. Moses was a Shepherd, and in his hand he held the symbol of his trade — a rod, or shepherd's crook. With this he was able to guide the sheep from danger. It was also a good weapon against any enemy. It was also for support. It was a Shepherd's comforter. David in Psalm 23 said "Thy Rod and Staff comfort me". Now while Moses held the rod in his hand it was the emblem of God's presence.

THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT! When Moses threw the Rod away or let it go, it became an evil thing, a serpent. This means that if God has called us to do a service for Him and we have neglected to do it, or have become backsliders only evil will result! The Devil spoils our testimony, and the Devil makes us unhappy, and we loose confidence in God.

That is why in the book of Hebrews the writer keeps on saying, Hold fast what God has given you. And Jesus said "Hold fast that Till I come".

For what He gives you is to help you to serve Him. If you have thrown away your confidence in Jesus (and so many have in these days), here is good news for you! God said to Moses take it up again — although Moses was much afraid of this evil thing, he believed God. He trusted God, and caught it by the tail and it became a Rod again in his hand.

God will restore to you that which you cast away if you will trust Him. David learned this, for he wrote "He restoreth my Soul", gives me back my spiritual life, and love.

Isaiah tells us about King Sennacherib. History tells about his "will" — "I, King of multitudes, King of Assyria, have given gold, ivory, crowns, crystals, a precious stone... unto Essar Haddon, my son, according to my wish."

We Visit the Far North!

"Hang on", I yelled, as suddenly once again the nose of the car dipped out of sight into one of the hundreds of gullies in the road to Cooktown. As we sorted ourselves out from gear that had tumbled all around us, we marvelled that anyone except missionaries or business people would ever use this road!

We had a definite purpose to use the road — we were seeking for needy souls.

Cooktown -- once prosperous, now almost a ghost town, is the home of just a few Aboriginal people. We visited the Government settlement after receiving permission, and found half a dozen homes, mainly housing old people. I managed to engage one man in conversation and after a little while a few others materialised out of various places. I was showing the LETTERSTICK and they all wanted to see, so I obligingly handed one to each person. After turning away for a moment, I looked up and found my "congregation" had suddenly dwindled down to one old deaf man, and the pet pig!

In visiting other folk around town we were very pleased to find that there was a consistent Christian witness here among the coloured folk, and also regular meetings.

ON TO LAURA.

What's that materialising through the haze? It's Laura. One store and one hotel!!

Camped just out of town under the trees, we found maybe a score of people. I approached the men and

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my wife approached a group of women — half of which suddenly remembered something they had to do elsewhere, and slowly filtered through the scrub!

These, as the others we had contacted, were highly suspicious of us and treated us with coolness.

Down by the river we found the pensioners' cottages and one old man squatting down making a spear. While talking by much gesculating, we noticed that these, as most of the older people, say "yes" to everything one says. I then asked "you believe in God?" — and was disturbed by the emphatic "no" of both these men! These readily received LETTER-STICK and gazed inquiringly at the pictures — one pointing to a cross in a magazine, then pointing to me and then up to the sky.

Our hearts are really burdened for such as these who don't seem to have the capacity to understand.

As we negotiated another split log bridge over yet another dry creek the dryness and barreness seemed to speak to us. This country is similar to so many hearts — dry and barren!!

How we long for the spiritual drought to break. Will YOU pray?

Decisions are made every day—hundreds and thousands of people—somewhere, some place, stand every moment at the cross roads, trying so hard to know what to do, where to go! "If I do this, how will it effect that one, this one, or my own life?"

Sometimes we see the way quite clearly — we know what we must do — we know the only possible way out and yet we stand there trying to make up our minds what to do.

The truth is that we love ourselves — we love our sins — it's my will be done! Our own wills only confuse us the more.

As I was reading Romans, Chapters 1-3, I see that sin in the heart produces these sins in the life. Maybe you are weighing the same such mat-

ters — it rests on your decision of what you will do with the death, resurrection and coming again of Jesus Christ.

As I read these chapters in Romans, some people had made very serious decisions.

- They held down the truth in unrighteousness (1 v.18). They knew what the truth was but they choked it this is sin!
- They did not glorify God, neither did they give thanks to God (v.21).
 Ingratitude is sin — it twists your mind — hardens the heart!
- They serve the creature more than the Creator (v.25). Wherever God is not first in a life there is idolatry!
- They refuse to have God in their knowledge (v.28). Refusing to make God the study of their lives — that is sin also.
- 5. Misuse if special privileges (Romans 2:17-20). They know God but do not use their knowledge for others. That is why the people are perishing because the vision has been blurred with "self". Where there is no vision the people perish.
- Inconsistency of life Rom. 2:21-24. "The Name of God was blashphemed" — inconsistency in our lives always misrepresents God to others. Your wil depends on your decision for or against God.

Before mail-day arrives again I must begin another letter to you all. Today (Monday) is our "day off". This does not mean we have a holiday! It is usually just a change of occupation from the usual programme of preparation, study and meetings. It might consist of gathering wood in the bush. or weeding our small area of garden! but it does refresh us for the tasks of the week ahead.

A different kind of break in the usual routine comes when we visit some of the families who are not living on the settlement. As this usually involves a journey of at least 50 miles each way we don't see these folk as often as we desire.

On our last trip we took one of the families from Woorabinda. The children were impatiently waiting as we arrived for them. They had eaten their dinner at 10.00 a.m. to make sure they would be ready in time!

We stopped briefly at Duaringa to pick up another Christian mother and a few more eager children squeezed in too. Then we continued on the main road to Rockhampton for about six miles before turning off. After another eight miles we came to Edungalba — one of the stopping places on the railway line to Rockhampton. About four houses are round about, surrounded by open paddocks and the bush.

As we clambered out of the van some of the folk hurried out to greet us. Finally after much excited chatter we settled down to a meeting on the high verandah. These folk are always pleased to see us, and are eager to read the magazines we leave them. Reluctantly we had to leave them again and return to Duaringa.

There we had tea and a short meeting in another home. By the time we got back to Woorabinda several of our small passengers were sound asleep so they had to be carried into their house. We were weary too but very grateful for another opportunity to share God's Good News with others. We hope to visit some folk who live in the opposite direction, toward Emerald, very soon.

We like to take one or two Christians from Woorabinda on our visits if possible. We feel it is an encouragement to them and a help to the folk we meet as well.

churches and in the Aboriginal communities," he continued. "Full award wages for Aborigines in the Northern Territory has brought tremendous changes in our Newcastle Waters work. Government legislation in Queensland will certainly bring vast changes to our methods of working in the near future."

"However," he concluded, "there is no change in the need of more workers, of faithful prayer-partners and general interest in this work."

The afternoon session, which was chaired by the Rev. C. Gray, of the Campsie Baptist, also included brief addresses by Miss J. Fergusson, of the Retta Dixon Homes, Darwin, and Mr. W. Nolan of Dubbo.

Mr. D. J. Kirk, a lecturer at the Bible Institute and chairman of the Churches Guidance Committee, told of some of the activities of this Committee and of the plans for the future.

"This Committee, which was chosen by our coloured people and comprises mostly members of A.I.M. Churches across the Field, has taken over the responsibilities of the young Churches"

Mr. Kirk went on to tell of how this Committee has planned a extensive Evangelistic campaign for 1967 and will also conduct the Annual Bible School to be held at the Institute in January of next year." An auto-visual on the work of Mr. and Mrs. M. Schenk of Bagot, N.T., was featured during the Interval meeting.

During the evening meeting Mr. V. Shaw, gave a brief testimony and sang two items, which were self accompanied on his guitar

"Pray for us in the Central-west of N.S.W.," pleaded Mrs. Naden, as she told of the need of her people. Mrs. Naden, the mother of two missionary daughters (both in the A.I.M.) gave further insight into the Dubbo and district work.

Other speakers in the evening session were Mr. H. R. Miles, manager of the Mission Publications of Australia, who told of the work and outreach of this literature work.

"When M.P.A.. came into being six years ago, it was never even dreamt that addresses in 16 different countries around the world would be in our files," said Mr. Miles. "Some of our material is translated into other languages to meet the needs of local nationals."

"A new magazine for the more advanced Aborigine people is the next forward move we plan. This should be a reality in the very near future."

Under the heading of Church Planting, Mr. W. R. Caddy, Eastern Area Superintendent, spoke of the problems, progress and plans regarding the growing young Churches across the Field.

"Why are we preaching the Gospel? This is a question we need to ask ourselves repeatedly. Is it not that is Church should be planted wherever our people live." Mr. Caddy concluded by asking prayer for more pastors.

The Director of the Mission, the Rev. E. C. Long, who chaired the final meeting concluded by challenging each one to a deeper consecration to the Lord. He went on to say how the Aborigine people are now so active in many places across the Field and that under the leadership of the Churches Guidance Committee, the planting and care of young churches will be their responsibility.
