

Frank Norton Visits

Mr Frank Norton, Director of the W.A. Art Gallery, paid his annual visit to Maningrida this week. Frank has been touring other centres in the Territory as well, Snake Bay, Elcho Island, and Oenpelli. He is looking out for more works to add to his Gallery's collection, and is particularly interested in carvings.

Frank, who was a Haval war artist in the last war, makes beautiful sketches and water colours to record the works he has collected and complement impressions of his visits. At Snake Bay he has collected more of the Lukamani (death ritual) carved poles, one of which is 8' high and portrays a nude male figure.

There are good works available at Eloho Island, where there has been a resurgence of bark painting. Frank is hoping to collect more of the Western Arnhemland paintings at Oenpelli. He spent some time looking through the craft shop at Maningrida where he made a number of selections including paintings by Charlie Gunbina, Robin Guningbal and Curly Bargululu and carvings by Crusoe Guningbal.

Water Supply

The water hole at Gabaljara Creek is pretty low (and pretty murky). ost of the settlement's water must now come from the 2 bores at the airstrip. fou can help by conserving water, turning off taps, teporting leaks and taking care generally.

There are some more bores at the airstrip to be equipped with pumps. Some of the work has already been carried out, e.g. the connecting pipes have been laid and most of the materials to finish the job are at Maningrida. Wolpers and Law have the job so here's hoping we can see the new bores in action in the next couple of months.

Mr. David Hill, grader operator, will leave on Monday's mail plane. Dave plans to go home to South Australia for a spell.



200 lbs. block cake


200 fruit pies (apple, apricot)

No Dress Reheroal For Fire

4.45 a.m. Saturday about mid-August. "Maija, Maija, wake up! The hospital's on fire. I grabbed the closest respectable garment, dragged it over my head and ran to the scene of what was once Umbakumba Welfare Hospital. Irone (one of the sisters) was crying, having failed in her attempt to rescue the medical records. The building was blazing furiously as two brawny men appeared with 4.41b fire extinguishers and began squirting the contents at the base of the fire to the amusement of the whole settlement. By surprise the spectacular site had diminished to a het charred heap, and we sat drinking to and assessing the less: twelve menths supply of baby food and vast quantities of medical supplies and a brand new washing machine which hadn't even been unpacked also a new sewing machine only recently purchased by some Aberiginal women and containing over \$100 of one woman's savings.


After radioing the news to the Director, I was driven to Angunugu and to obtain a few medical supplies to last until the emergency kit arrived from Darwin. A temporary hospital was set up in one of the BRICK houses. When I went home that evening, I looked in the mirror to see I had had my clothes on inside-out all day!!!"

The small grey doves that are common about the houses at the moment are called Peaceful Doves. In appearance they could easily be confused with the Diamond Dove, but the latter is quite rare at Maningrida, and has a red eye. Peaceful Doves are nearly always found in pairs or small groups, and rise with a distinctive whirring noise of the wings, but seldom travel far. They are very social amongst one another, and in the non-breeding season travel around in an indefinite manner in small parties after greener pastures. Unless the bird is brooding the nest is very difficult to see because it is only a small platform of mixed collection of sticks. In our neck of the woods we find most nests after the beginning of the Wet, so that by the time the chicks have hatched, the parents have no difficulty in feeding them on the abundant supply of grass seeds.

East am Dettlement

Your correspondent took the opportunity last week to visit East Arm. Several Maningridians were seen there, Oscar Nalowed, Djulga-djulga, Bob Bunduwarbi. Also seen were Nancy Wanjuk, Barbara Mondalmi and a number of others whose names do not come to mind. East Arm is an attractive area, with green lawns, trees and many buildings. The whole is situated around a hill, with the hospital in a commanding position right on top. The settlement has a hall, where movies are shown three times a week, a swimming pool and a school.


An interesting feature of East Arm is the rehabilitation centre where patients are instructed in various types of craft work. There is quite a variety carried on; one can see all sorts of plastic work, bags, belts, mats. There are also mats made from locally collected hemp fibre and nylon ribbon. There are looms for weaving cloth, a good deal of leather-work and also traditionally oriented items such as didjeridoos and carvings.

The most recent development is the printery. At the time of your correspondent's visit the print-shop had started to produce an order of Christmas cards. There is a book containing examples of orders fulfilled in the past; these cover an enormous range, from political hand-bills to ball tickets and advertising posters. One patient is able to operate the smaller printing machines, but a new, and larger, machine has recently been installed and now someone has to be trained to operate it as well.

It is also hoped to extend developments to the open air with the setting up of a plantation and garden.
