Then came the second World For, and the European sexoplanes were killing up in the sky - the Japanese against the deglishman and the Australian whitemen. The Ausrtalians took many of the Aboriginal people into the Arrup to help them win the war fer Australia.

After all the killing and destroying was finished, the black; men came back to their tribes with their wounded. They came in a boat captained by Dr. Thompson and landed on the Coburg Perinsular.

Some of the wounded men got well after a while, but many others never got well, and some always welked with a limp. So,

after the war, their some, brothers and tribal relatives had to do their hunting for them.

Dr. Thompson lived at Galji Creek for some time, and he convinced our parents that we should go to school at the missions. But many of us didn't want to go away from the tribal country and our people, and I was one of these.

Rowdays most of the people who worked with Dr. Thompson have

died, or else they are very old, but many more white men (balands) have come, to make more reserves, and missions, and settlements, and stations where before there were only the animals and the
