


### PRESERVATION OF SAND HILLS AND MIDDENS

At Rocky Point (Nakalamandjina) there is a potentially serious problem resulting from sand dune and midden erosion.

The Makara people, to whom this area is of great cultural significance, may then find themselves in a depleted and unusable environment if the practice of driving cars onto the beach continues. Motor car tracks have seriously scarred the huft midden behind the present site and the have seriously scarred the huft midden behind the present site and the adjacent dune system has been broached so that weekend motorists from maningrida can get vehicle access to the beach proper.

Experience elsewhere e.g. Avalon in Sydney, Casuarine in Darwin, has shown that this sort of activity eventually weakens the dune system which in time will structually collapse during a monsoonal storm. The consequences would be disastrous for the coastal environment between consequences would be disastrous for the coastal environment between consequences would be flooded, the dunes broken down and the coastal ecology devastated.

Can we afford to allow this careless use of vehicles to threaten one of the few remaining maratime wilderness areas left on the Australian continent - After all, this is the Nakara's own country.



## TACK SPEAKS OUT ...

### Something more to think about!

I agree with Rosemary Walter's article and her questions in the Mirage of last 1973. It is true that balanda sometimes use bad words for us and have bad opinions about Aborigines (yoll). The reason that is often that Europeans (monanga) have not very much knowledge (kungi) about our way of living. Our way is very much different from the monanga way.

We have moieties (bundurr), skin groups (malg), promised mariages (bamburr), dreamings (milikidji) and so on. White people don't have that and that's why it is sometimes hard to understand what these things mean to us.

Why do you criticize us for not living in the European way? Taps, bathrooms, stoves, toilets, lights, houses laundries, kitchen etc.

When you like us to live in the balanda way we have to get all these things, but we do not have the money to buy that. We need assistance of the Government (bunggawa) because we had to change to a money (rupia) life and that means that we have to get jobs (djama) to get that rupia. We didn't need that in our way.

It is not easy at all to live in two ways, the Aboriginal way and the balanda way. You are telling us to combine the two ways, but that is not easy because on the one hand we depend on money (rupia) and jobs (djama) and on the other hand we cannot live without our moieties, skin groups, dreamings, animals, country, totems, marriages and so may

They say we are "full citizen" but we do not know what this really means, some of us think it means that you can drink as much grog as you like. As citizen we live in the balanda law, but we have our own law too. For dealing with the balanda society we need assistance to learn to read and write and to fight for our own rights and to be able to explain our ways ourselves. We are waiting for younger people, we have had school for long time and know how to read and write. We need our own educated people, to explain our way to the balanda, but also to explain the monanga way to our older people.

Here is only one Yiritja young boy, Jimmy Pascoe (Matjirri), who has been educated in many things, so he can tell balanda people many things about our ways and also to tell Aboriginal ways too. This is my mind and thoughts. Especially I am answering about Rosemary Walter article and her questions in the Maningrida Mirage of last year 1975.

-- more fish ... after the comp, try these with your catch

Keeping fish in mind, here are a couple of recipes for those people who haul 'em in and get a bit tired of the old fish and chip routine....

### NUMMICE or pickled fish

Soak bite sized pieces of filletted mackerel, skinny or trevally in vinegar (white) in the fridge for 48 hours, covered well with gladwrap.

Blend the following ingredients (to suit your taste) and add to fish/ vinegar mixture: Chopped limes or lemons & juice (approx. 1 per 1b. of nummice), chopped white onion, garlic salt, freshly crushed garlic or granulated garlic, finely chopped chilli or a tiny bit of chilli powder, salt and pepper. When all blended, cover and store in fridge for a further 24 hours. Serve as a savoury with cracker biscuits.

### RED COOKED FISH:

l whole fish about 31b, 5 tablespoons soy sauce, 3 tablespoons brandy or dry sherry, 1 desertspoon sugar, 2 teaspoon salt, 6 slices green ginger (or a pinch of ground ginger), 2 shallots (or tablespoon of dried chives), 2 pint water, flour, and cooking oil.

Make slashes crosswise in back of fish, rub over with a little flour. Put into a pan with hot oil, lin. deep, and fry over high heat for 1 minute on each side. Turn head down to medium and fry 3 minutes on each side. Pour off lard until about 1 tablespoon remains. Add soy sauce, brandy or sherry, sugar, salt, very finely chopped ginger, shallots cut into tiny pieces and the water. Put lid on pan and cook over high heat for 10 minutes. Serve sprinkled with chopped green ends of shallots. Fried rice makes a good side dish.

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### PARROT FISH IN PAWPAW LEAVES:

l parrot fish (or similar white fleshed fish), about 3 lb. Three or four pawpaw leaves.

( (Make sure fish for all recipes for whole fish are gutted!)

Wrap fish well with pawpaw leaves. Place in a baking dish and bake fish in a 450° oven for about 20 minutes. Serve with hot veges. or salad.
