

MANINGRIDA AT THE SHOW

At the Winnellie Showground there is a large pavilion measuring about 60' x 20' - really a SidneyWilliams Hut - in which the Welfare Branch stages an exhibition each year.

Earlier on, the Director asked if Maningrida would accept the responsibility for this year's display. The Progress Association considered the request and agreed to do so. Preparations are now

under way.

People coming into an exhibition of this kind are always attracted by large clear photos, and so it is proposed to photograph aspects of the life of the Settlement and display these along the walls - along with a large sketch of the Maningrida beach scene. A Government photographer and an art adviser are expected to arrive shortly.

Mr. Peter Williams has undertaken the overall responsibility for organising the main display at Winnellie and will be assisted by Councillor Tommy Ibaral in uniform, Sea Scouts Jim Walbara and Assistant Cub Master Charlie Godjuwa. Mr. Mick Magani is eagerly gathering bark to demonstrate the ancient art of bark painting and Sister Sandra Stacey has offered to supervise the sales of craft work.

In the Annexe adjoining the pavilion there will be a live display. Mr Willy Djakarla will be making a traditional dugout cance at one end, then Mr Dave Fryer with a group of boys will be working on a partially completed "Heron" sailing boat in the centre, and a completed "Heron" will stand at the end of the line. The wall of the annexe will display pictures of men in canoes and boats sailing and fishing, etc.

The overall theme will be "Youth and New Development".

DOLLARS AND CENTS.

The question has frequently been heard " what does the Co-op. do with its profits ".

It has built a \$20,000 store (freehold) without the encumberance of a bank overdraft, has increased by \$5,000 its stock holdings, and spent \$900 on capital equipment (cash registers) during the past 18 months.

The Co-op. is currently involved in building a residence, bearing in mind that as a private enterprise it does not qualify for a government dwelling, has in fact spent \$5,000 on same and has an approx. \$10,000 further committeent.

We are building 50 Aboriginal home units, and although rentals will return us our capital outlay, this will be long term, and our outlay will be significant.

Orders have been placed for building supplies for our bakery which will involve us

is an expenditure approximating \$12,000 during the next 7 months.

The Co-op. employs the builders Mr. Cross and Mr. Pickersgill and the wage pay out incurred is of a direct responsibility of and debit against the Co-op.

We are supporting the current prospecting survey, to the extent of financing the prospecting licence in partnership with Goulburn Island.

If we are to continue the support necessary to our fishing, gardening and mining enterprises it is certain the Co-op. will need to purchase a vehicle, we cannot reasonably expect settlement vehicles to carry our burden.

PROM THE NEWSPAPERS.

HERE IS THE NEWS FROM THE A.B.C.

The Postmaster General, Mr. Hulme, admitted yesterday that he wanted a cut of \$60,000 in the A.B.C.'s budget allocation for next year. He confirmed that he had "suggested" that half the reduction should come from current affairs programmes such as "Four Corners" and "This Day Tonight", but he had changed his mind after talks with the A.B.C. Commissioners in Camberra.

The Darwin News in an editorial said that this was "a blatant attempt to make the A.B.C. an instrument of the State instead of the free reporting organ of the people who pay for it. Cabinet's about face under mounting protest and pressure doesn't conceal for a second the intention of Mr. Hulme's direction - a direction he would never have been game to make without the green light from his partners in suppression of the truth ".

PICK A BOX.

Young men called up for National Service now have a choice - the Army, jail or two and a half years as a government employed labourers. Under the civilian alternative to military service approved by Cabinet on Wednesday draftees will be required to work away from home, perhaps in remote areas, on national projects. They will serve 6 months longer than 20 year olds who choise to join the Army. The Government hopes that through the plan they can avoid the embarrassment of jailing youths who defy the National Service Act. Government backbenchers and others have pressured; the Government to provide a civilian alternative - particularly as National Service is likely to remain even after Australian troops are withdrawn from Vietnam.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL INQUIRY.

The Federal Government has decided that there is no need for a formal inquiry into the Administrative and political situation of the N.T. as was requested by the elected members of the Legislative Council. Elected members said the reply was "arrogent, specious and dishonest," and the Darwin News called it "an incredible piece of bureaucratic gobbledigook". In retaliation the Elected Members took control of the Councils business committee on Wednesday stacking it with seven elected M.L.C.s and at the same time sacking the leader of Government members, Mr. Martin Finger, from the committee.

THE GOVE WARS.

The Yirrkala Aboriginals bid to stop that Nabalco's mining activities on the Gove Peninsula, was re-opened in the N.T. Supreme Court this week. The Aboriginals claim that Nabalco has wrongfully entered and destroyed the land which they own by right of occupancy from " time immemorial ". This week evidence from Prof. of Anthropology, William Stammer, was heard together with evidence from local people. The hearing is unfinished.

Fourteen hundred miners at Gove have gone on strike in support of grievances about dismissals, food, permits and liquor before Mabalco officials. It is expected that they will remain on strike until an inquiry into their complaints is started on Tuesday afternoon.

An application for an hotel licence at Gove has been refused.
