

While in Sydney last week for the monthly meeting of the old people's homes committee, Silas heard that he had been chosen to see the Prime Minister in Canberra. He almost fell backwards when he heard the news. Soon, however, he was on the way to Canberra with Charlie Perkins where he joined the rest of the delegation. Mr. Wentworth, Pastor Doug Nicholls and Miss Moy.

They spent an hour with the Prime Minister at Parliament House. Charlie read a statement and then each of them made comments. Silas was very impressed with Mr. Gorton. He listened patiently and with interest.

Some of the points made to the Prime Minister:

Mining "We feel that there should be a nation wide embargo (do not allow) on prospecting by non-Aboriginal companies on Aboriginal reserves for at least 20 years so that Aboriginal groups themselves could be organised for active prospecting; and they could hire the services of professional consultants.

Housing

"We commend the Commonwealth for its increasing grants for housing adequate housing helps to solve some of the health and education problems of Aborigines.

We ask for a larger allocation for housing each year to take account not only of the backlog but also the increasing need caused by the Aboriginal population increase."

Land Rights.

"We wish to draw to the attention of the Prime Minister the great need for tribal Aborigines to have the security of a home base. To the tribal Aboriginal land is the backbone.

We feel that, regardless of the outcome of the Gove case, there should be developed a concerted policy of securing sufficient land for the use of all tribal Aborigines.

It is not enough simply to reserve ... land for Aborigines. The land must be developed. We deplore the ... crowding of Aborigines into missions and settlements ... in north and central Australia ... leaving the reserves themselves largely undeveloped."

Legislation
"We commend the Prime Minister for his stand on insisting that all discriminatory legislation against Aborigines will be repealed within the life of the present Parliament."

Attitudes to Aborigines

"We consider the recent statement of His Holiness, Pope Paul VI to be an outstanding statement of ethics: 'We know that you have a life style proper to your ethnic genius or culture... The church proclaims that you, like all other ethnic minorities, have all human and civic rights... The common good never can be used legitimately as a pretext to harm the positive values of your particular way of life. You and the values which you represent are precious."


