Enrol to vote or update your details as a prisoner in South Australia





Who can use this form?

You can use this form to enrol for federal elections if you are:

- 18 years of age or older, and
- an Australian citizen or a British subject who was on a Commonwealth roll on 25 January 1984*, and
- serving a full-time prison sentence.
- * For South Australian electors only, you are eligible to enrol and vote if you were a British subject enrolled between 26 October 1983 and 25 January 1984 inclusive.

If you were already enrolled when you started serving your sentence, by completing this form you are advising us that you are absent from your enrolled address and will not be removed from the roll while you are in prison.

You can check whether you are currently enrolled on the AEC website at **www.aec.gov.au** or call **13 23 26**.

Is it compulsory to enrol and vote?

Yes, if you are 18 or older it is compulsory to enrol and vote for federal and state elections and referendums. However, you can only vote in federal elections if you are serving a full-time prison sentence of **less** than three years.

You can enrol and vote in South Australian State and local government elections regardless of the length of the term of your imprisonment.

In which division/electorate can you enrol?

You must provide an address for Commonwealth and State enrolment purposes. The address you provide for Commonwealth purposes can be different to the one you provide for State purposes.

For Commonwealth enrolment only you must enrol for the address where:

- **A** you were last eligible to be enrolled (this will generally be the place where you last lived for at least one month), or
- **B** one of your next of kin is currently enrolled if you have not previously been eligible to enrol, or
- c you were born, if neither of the above apply, or
- **D** you have the closest connection if none of the above apply.

For South Australian State enrolment only you must enrol for:

- E the address that was your principal place of residence immediately before the commencement of your imprisonment, or
- **F** the address of a new place of residence acquired during your imprisonment, by you or a parent, spouse, domestic partner or child who you resided with immediately before the commencement of your imprisonment, and at which you intend to reside on release from prison, or
- G if E or F do not apply and you have been imprisoned for two years or more the address at which you are imprisoned.

Within three weeks of receiving your enrolment form the AEC will confirm your enrolment. We may seek further information from you and confirm your enrolment using any of the contact details you provide.

What are your voting options?

You can register as a general postal voter to have ballot papers automatically sent to you when a federal election or referendum is called. You can register by crossing the 'Yes' box at question 6.

If you do not register as a general postal voter a mobile polling team may visit your prison or you will need to apply for a postal vote for the relevant election.

What happens when you are released?

After your release you must complete a new enrolment form to advise us of your new address so that we can update the electoral roll. You can get an enrolment form at any Australia Post outlet or at www.aec.gov.au

Who has access to your enrolment information?

The Commonwealth of Australia

The Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) is authorised under the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (CEA) to collect and verify the information you have been asked to complete on this form. The information provided will assist the AEC to maintain electoral rolls.

The AEC may disclose electoral information to persons or organisations in accordance with the CEA. This may include:

- access to the publicly available electoral roll (containing names and addresses) which may be inspected at electoral offices
- state and territory electoral authorities
- Members of Parliament, Senators, registered political parties, and candidates for the House of Representatives
- approved medical research and public health screening programs
- any agencies, persons or organisations prescribed in the Electoral and Referendum Regulation 2016.
