Enrol to vote or update your details as a prisoner in Tasmania





Who can use this form?

You can use this form to enrol for federal elections if you are:

- 18 years of age or older, and
- an Australian citizen or a British subject who was on a Commonwealth roll on 25 January 1984, and
- serving a full-time prison sentence.

If you were already enrolled when you started serving your sentence, by completing this form you are advising us that you are absent from your enrolled address and will not be removed from the roll while you are in prison.

Note: You are not eligible to enrol or remain on the roll for Tasmanian state and local government elections if your prison sentence is three years or more.

You can check whether you are currently enrolled on the AEC website at **www.aec.gov.au** or call **13 23 26**.

Is it compulsory to enrol and vote?

Yes, if you are 18 or older it is compulsory to enrol and vote for federal elections and referendums. However you can only vote in federal elections if you are serving a full-time prison sentence of **less** than three years.

It is compulsory to enrol and vote in Tasmanian state elections if you are serving a sentence of less than three years.

In which division can you enrol?

You must enrol for the address where:

- A you were last eligible to be enrolled (this will generally be the place where you last lived for at least one month), or
- **B** one of your next of kin is currently enrolled if you have not previously been eligible to enrol, or
- **c** you were born, if neither of the above apply, or
- **D** you have the closest connection if none of the above apply.

Within three weeks of receiving your enrolment form the AEC will confirm your enrolment. We may seek further information from you and confirm your enrolment using any of the contact details you provide.

What are your voting options?

You can register as a general postal voter to have ballot papers automatically sent to you when a federal or Tasmanian state election or referendum is called. You can register by crossing the 'Yes' box at question 7.

If you do not register as a general postal voter a mobile polling team may visit your prison or you will need to apply for a postal vote for the relevant election.

What happens when you are released?

After your release you must complete a new enrolment form to advise us of your new address so that we can update the electoral roll. You can get an enrolment form at any Australia Post outlet or at www.aec.gov.au

Who has access to your enrolment information?

The Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) is authorised under the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (CEA) to collect and verify the information you have been asked to complete on this form. The information provided will assist the AEC to maintain electoral rolls.

The AEC may disclose electoral information to persons or organisations in accordance with the CEA. This may include:

- access to the publicly available electoral roll (containing names and addresses) which may be inspected at electoral offices
- state and territory electoral authorities
- Members of Parliament, Senators, registered political parties, and candidates for the House of Representatives
- approved medical research and public health screening programs
- any agencies, persons or organisations prescribed in the Electoral and Referendum Regulation 2016.

Roll information may be supplied by the Tasmanian Electoral Commission to Members of Parliament, registered political parties, candidates and organisations approved by the Commission.

The Commission may approve the supply of roll information for ethically approved medical research, to assist in investigation and prevention of breaches of the law or protection of public revenue, and for other purposes considered to be for the benefit of the individual or the community as a whole.

The *Electoral Act 2004* provides penalties for the use of rolls other than for a purpose permitted under the Act or as approved by the Commission.
