HOW 'REBEL' CARR DEALS WITH REBELS

IN 1974, 888 Mattresses in Clayton had a problem. Their workers refused to be kicked around any longer. For 83 years there had been only one strike at 888 -now in twelve months there were ten!

888 decided that the new shop-steward, Gary White, was the cause of the prob-lem. And who got rid of their "problem? Who sacked Eary White as shop-steward, stood idly by as the police dragged him out of 888, and threatened his fellow-workers with dismissal if they struck to support him:

Who? None other than Ken Carr, of the 26 rebel unions fame! Ken Carr — dynamic militant state secretary of the Furnishing Trades Society. Ken Carr — who is so certain of his members! confidence in him that he even refuses to hold the Branch meetings specified in his union's rules.

Gary White takes up the story

"When I became shop steward I pointed out to the workers how they weren't getting any over-award payments at

"Thuy'd fallen way behind and they were mercly catching up now to get a fair deal... as a result of their strike we had equal pay for females a long time before it came in through the awards. We got agreements like overalls, 210 over-award payments, milk on dusty jobs, shoes where the carrying of internils around re-

"His argument was that the company does have to have a level of profit and if we go taking everything there is in the place, the place would finish up closing down and we'd finish up destroying our own cause.

Carr's effort to protect BBB's pro-fits succeeded in quieting things down for a while. But the company decided to get rid of Gary White through

"They changed me from a good job to some of the had jobs in the place, jobs where the fingers were getting. Inflamed from the burning of glue on the makin. Eventually I refused to Work on one of the jobs and they macked me on the apot."

Strangely enough, other employees who had objected to these jobs had been transferred. It seems obvious that this was a deliberate attempt to victimise White.

Gary White refused to accept the suck - he refused to leave the factory.

"A saleman chap from 200 came to the factory and see me straight away, and of course, he bold his bost that he'd seen me. Bis bost rang up the union and a couple of hours later you've got too Kyriacou, the union organism, on the premises.

Racism: A weapon for bosses the world over

German-born workers had to be given first preference for jobs. Employers were encouraged to make immigrants redundant — and the authorities would them withdraw work and residence permits to expel them from the country. Immigrants were offered the miserable bribe of between 5360 and 5460 to get out for good.

Areas were designated where no more immigrants would be allowed. And now the government is seeking to limit the immigrant population in the cities to 12 per cent of the population.

The more toreign workers acc, jour, the louder three complaints that they are "living off the social services". A public opinion poll recently claimed that more than half of all Germans believed unemployment was so high because there were too many foreign workers in the country.

The picture is the same in every capitalist country.

'Illegal'

The police spent much time and trouble finding and arresting 800,000 of them last year. A bill was put to Comgress to fine employers of "illegal workers, but the American farmers blocked it, arguing that without workers on their scandalous pay rates, food prices would soar.

A recent report to the government argues that, with threatening unemp-loyment, immigration should be tightly limited.

It is a very odd argument. There are about 700,000 immigrants each year, but Alberta farmers say they need 100,000 new workers; the construction industry employers say they need smother 100,000 and the mime owners the same.



KODAK EXPOSED

Bosses Provoke

POUR SACKED SHEET-METAL NORKERS have been reinstated at Kodak in Coburg after a strike lasting ten days. The four nen had been sacked for refusing to scale on the plumbers who've been on strike since November 11 -- four months -- over a log of claims. The workers at Kodak have not had a pay rise for over two years and the plumbers were leading the struggle for a long overdue wage

On Monday February 16, the four sheet-metal workers were ordered to complete work on a nitrate retort -- a job left unfinished by the striking plumbers and declared black by the other unions. The men all refused and Kodak sacked them on the spot; their pay had already been made up. It was a set-up, Kodak was forcing the metal

The four sheeties included a shop steward and a worker who had won the Kodak apprentice of the year award. The section the out in sympathy and a strike meeting of all AMNU members was held the next morning at the metal workers, however if there was an immediate resumption of work then a time would be alla discussion of the men's posi tion". The meeting voted overwholmingly to go on strike, re alising this was what Kodak wanted but seeing no alternat ive. A suggestion to occupy the plant until the four were reinstated was not taken up by the AMMU organiser Norm Clapton

On the Monday -- the day of the sackings -- Kodak had put out a broadsheet "to the people imminent lay-offs. A leaflet Workers showed the profit drop cial Review. It appeared to the

metalworkers that Kodak wanted to stop production for a period in order to get rid of mounting stocks -- by doing it the striking metalworkers rather than themselves or the Liberal government.

That same week Kodak laid off 300 members of the Miscell aneous Workers Union. Kodak's job was made easier by the fact that there's no combined shop committee to unite the unions and no other actions such as pickets or an occupa-

On Friday 27, the metalworkers met again. Heated disputes broke out at this meeting between some workers who wanted to go back, fearing that they would lose their jobs, and the other workers who were determined to win the struggle through. Clapton urged staying out. The meeting passed a motion that they'd go back if the men were reinstated but would still refuse to do the plumbers' work. After negotiations the company agreed to reinstate the men if the the meeting agreed to this and



In 1973-74, three countries destroyed a long-standing dictatorship: Nortugal, Ethiopia and Thailand. In two of the countries, Ethiopia and Thailand, a new working class played a vital role in the overthrow of the old order and emerged for the first time an an important force. Nigel Marris reports from Sangkok, capital of Thailand.

Between October 7 and 14, 1973, Rajdamoen Square in the centre of this city was the scene of supercedented demon-strations. On the 14th, nearly half a million people demanded a new constitution and the release of 13 prisoners seized by the military dictatorship.

Sydney refuelers have a State Award while the strike was over a Federal claim. Planes got no fuel in Melbourne but they could fly up the east coast and to Adelaide because they could get fuel in Sydney. If Sydney had struck the airlines would have have been grounded immediately.

Guerilla

After a week the companies offered to negotiate. The air-port workers went back and are running a guerilla camp-aign for a week while negotiations take place. By workingto-rule they are slowing things down enormously -- for example luggage is placed rather than slid or thrown, causing long delays.

On April 6 there are more un April o there are more mass meetings to hear the result of negotiations. The feeling amongst the TMU members is that they're in for a long campaign.

WHAT WE THINK

THE UNION HANDLING of the airline workers' campaign reads like a saga of lost opportunities.

First, the Sydney refuellers were allowed to have a separat award and allowed to work through the dispute.

Second, the clerks, maintenance workers and engineers at the airlines have similar claims served on the airlines. There was no attempt by officials to organise a common front to the bosses

When one of the clerks' shop stewards at Tullamarine tried to arrange a strike meeting while the transport workers were out the Federated Clerks Union vetoed it. In fact, they would not allow any strike meeting till the TWU members were back at wol

And when TAA workers wanted action, the TWU organiser close one meeting without allowing a vote, and then told them it was "unauthorised" to walk off in protest.

A SHOP COMMITTEE at each airport could have co-ordinated the campaigns of all the airline workers fighting for their claims

They could have combined the muscle of the engineers, the clerks and the loaders and refuellers at EVERY AIRPORT who could make sure the planes were empty ... of cargo, passengers and fuel ... during any dispute.

A RANK AND FILE GROUP of airline workers could have done the job the officials didn't. It could have fought for joint action by clerks and transport workers in Melbourne.

It could have intervened to talk to the Sydney refuellers .explaining why they had to go out in support -- and for their own claims. It could have brought the maintenance workers and the engineers in with their claims, even if the officials tried to Split the claim. to split the claims up.

If the rank and file at the airlines do not move to take control of their unions, and their claims, they will be sold short away from

You'd think trade unions were cricket clubs or public service instituions the way they're being approached. Well, they're not. They're the front line of our defence against Fraser and the system

Fraser is too crafty to take on the whole union movement with his legislation Instead, he's doing a deal with the worst scum in the unions - rightwing grouper bureaucrats like Short of the FIA and Maynes of the Federated Clerks. In return them keep the outrageous "collegiate" system of elections that the Labor Govern ment moved to get rid of.

In collegiate elections, the rank and file do not decide who will be the officials. We only get to vote for faceless men who supposedly make the decision on our behalf. It's a system that gives some branches much less say than others - and it's a godsend for numbers men and wheeler-dealers.

So, not only do we have to beat Fraser and the might of the Liberal government but we also have to take on the collaborators in our own ranks.

It's going to be one hell of a fight!

The only reason Fraser will win any support amongst the rank and file is because many union members feel they have no say in the running of their union and no control over

That means that not only must we smash Fraser's Court Ballot scheme, but bring the unions under rank and file control as well. Then ruling class witch-hunts won't get any support inside our organ-

We need regular rank and file election of all officials with the elections held meetings. We need the right to recall and sack officials who sell-out or misrepresent the members.

And for members worried about manip-ulation of ballots, we need ACTU controlled ballots and rank and file supervising committees rather than Fraser's electoral police.

At the moment, the people fighting Fraser's ballots the hardest are the officials themselves. It's a pity these same officials haven't fought as hard over wage indexation and unemployment. A lot of rank and file unionists feel that the only time the officials fight is when they are threatened themselves.

And they're right. But we still have to defend the officials from Fraser. Then we can take care of union democracy ourselves, in our own way and in our own
