WHAT THE

THE new law, the Commonwealth Employees (Employment Provisions) Act, virtually deprives all public servants of the right to take any action to defend what's left of their conditions of employment. These are the new powers it contains:

from duty for taking part in industrial action of

The Act defines industrial action as "the performance of work in a manner different from that in which it is customarily performed." Under such a sweeping definition, even doing more work than

usual could be construed as industrial action.

The definition also includes a refusal to perform "any work at all." This could apply to work that is not part of an employee's regular duties. In other words, we can be suspended for refusing to scab. Any employee, once suspended, may be summarily

dismissed. The concept of permanency is gone. Any employee whose work is affected by industrial action being taken by other unionists, including those employed in the private sector, can be stood down without pay.

These powers may be used at the sole discretion of a Minister, or delegated to the employing authority. They can apply for any length of time and need not be referred to Arbitration. Decision are final; there is no right of appeal. Departments must obey a Ministerial direction - you wouldn't want to be a British union activist in Sinclair's Department.

They were so overwhelmed by the response there that they telegrammed back pleading that no decision should be taken which would compromise their work since they were getting so much

THE LATROBE VALLEY strike has been beaten, He added that the trade union movement would desert them and the financial support from other workers would dry The strike lost, not because of lack of support, not because of lack of determination. It lost because the union officials of the ALP and the Communist Party - most notably Bob Hawke and John Halfpenny - were unwilling to carry the struggle through

It lost because, rather than take on the Liberals with the might of the trade union movement, they deliberately set about demoralising the shop steward leaders to get them back to work.

It lost because Bob Hawke is more interested in "cooling it" for the election in a repeat of his 1975 effort. It lost because John Halfpenny and the Communist Party are more interested in loving up to ALP heavies than trying to organise the rank and file

A few workers in the strike - workers with militant, socialist politics - saw the dangers. The dangers of isolation, of refusal to fight the struggle politically. The danger that the union officials would lead the struggle back into Arbitration.

They went out and tried to organise support. They went to other workers and countered the lies the political lies - that the government and the Press were spreading.

In the end there were not enough of them. But the need for revolutionary politics and revolutionary organisation by rank and file unionists remains. To fight the struggles of today effectively - and to build the strength of the working class so that we can sweep away this system once and for all
