President asked Councillors to make better contact with They were responsible men and had a their own people. He knew that Nakara and Gunavidji counduty to perform. cillors talked to their people and felt that Burera councillors did not do enough.

Councillor Baleiya said that he was always talking, not only in his own area, but anywhere.

Councillor Munyal said that it was very important for children to attend school regularly. He made sure that Jinang and Wulagi children did, and they co-operated with him very well.

Councillor Baleiya talked at length on the matter of the Council and Club moneys. He was not sure that they were being looked after properly. He wanted to know why the Club couldn't supply an extra can of beer each day.

President said he was listening to that story any more.

Councillor Baleiya walked out.

Councillor Riala wanted to know about Mr. Wilders. had heard that he was going away. Mr. Wilders had done a lot of good work at Maningrida and no-one wanted him to Superintendent said that Government people had to go where they were told to. They couldn't expect to stay anywhere for a long time.

## COUNCIL MINUTES CONT'D

There were requests for toilets and fly-wiring. Also a request to move all the toilets around. Superintendent said he would see what he could dorange.

Councillor Jack John said that Councillors needed the Police to help them when they got too much trouble. Councillor Munyal suggested that it cost too much money to pay for the Police's plane fare to Maningrida. Mr. Giese had enough money to pay but if he wouldn't pay, then the people should pay themselves.

The President said that he was afraid that there was going to be trouble one day over guns. Several instances were outlined where one person had threatened another with a gun. There had been two deaths in the past couple of weeks, one at Milingimbi and one at Maningrida. Councillor Yirinyin said that everyone should be made to keep their guns at the office and to come and collect them when they wanted to go hunting. It was decided to think the matter over for a week and talk about it again at the next meeting.

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The Policeman made his visit to Maningrida this week to conduct a number of investigations and equiries. He paid particular attention to instances where people have thrown spears around in the village and all the persons spoken to in this regard can expect that proceedings will be commenced against them. He also spoke to one young man who had produced a gun to "frighten" people during a fight on Saturday night. This is an offence and is forbidden by the law. The Social Welfare Regulations state quite clearly that such behaviour is forbidden on a reserve, and any person who offends can expect trouble.

The Police also interviewed another young man who attempted to hinder Councillors who were doing their job. Councillors who are trying to protect people and to keep the peace must not be prevented from doing their work.

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# SPEARING:

In an incident on Sunday morning last, George Smith was speared in the foot with a fish-wire. The injury was not serious and he was permitted to go home after receiving treatment at the Hospital.
