We spent the night near old Yorky Bill's camp. Probably everybody knows old Yorky Bill: he's well known in the N.T. and also in history - an old buffalo shooter, ! Tommy Dongborr used to work for him so he gave us tea, sugar 4 lbs and also 2 water melons. Shortly after we heard a truck coming our way. It was melons. an International and also a Toyota. They were from a mining company near Oenpelli. They asked us where we were heading. We said "Maningrida". He said "I am going to the Border Store. Old Terry Robinson's store." We went with them. On the way we passed Mudginberry Station - that's where Peter and Johnny Mayera had a swollen foot - and we stopped at Jim Jim at 12 o'clock. We got there Friday and stayed 2 days.

Jacky Nagajira and I walked to Oenpelli and it was lucky that we ran into old Crowfoot's missus. She is married to my step-uncle Joseph now. We stayed at his place and he wanted us to stay for a couple of days. "We can't stay too long" we said. We left at 6 o'clock next morning while everyone was asleep, without breakfast. We walked from Oenpelli towards Nimbuwa hill before we had lunch on wild white apples and some palms. There we ran into a bad storm. It was cold. We had shirts but no blankets! Easter camp was quite quieter with Randy, Eddy & Bruce in Darwin. They claim it was a wet weekend in town.

Fire Deard is almost here; a lot of work goes into a forest, a lot nore goes into keeping a fire out, — so if you're camping out, nake sure you put that camp fire out before coning home. More trees, nore timber, make more houses.

some of them are not unlike those of the N.T. I go through Daru fairly often, where there is a fairly good barramundi fishery, at one stage they had a local fishing company set up with a Development Bank loan; they went broke through mechanical failures and general lack of management, their remaining gear has recently been sold up to pay debts. In the meantime a private (European) company has leased the freezer and buys the fish from individual fishermen at 17 cents for barramundi and \$1 per 1b. for cray fish tails. This is working very well and everyone seems happy. The fish is processed at the freezer and sent out as frozen fillets in 20 lb. packs. The freezer is one room, smaller than either of the rooms at Maningrida, and this year has put through about 100,000 lbs. barramundi and 60,000 lbs. cray tails.

The visits to Daru are en route to Lake Murray or the Bensbach River, we now have over 700 crocodiles at the Lake Murray Crocodile Farm. We had hoped for 1,000 by this time but high water levels and supply problems have held us up. The high water keeps the crocs back in the high reeds and they are hard to find, we catch the small ones at night time from a beat with a spotlight.

Our Bensbach River Station (Balunuk) is about 8 miles from the West Iriam border in beautiful open plain country; it is a deer research station and there are about 6,000 deer within reach of the station. It may be of interest to you to know that the labourers on the stations are on the full award rate of 311.10 per fortnight. People working on a road for the Local Government Council when I was last down were being paid 30 cents per day, so you can see why the people rely so much on their gardens to survive and also why the training wage scheme of the N.T. looks a pretty good deal when viewed from here. To live in the Australian style here is about the same or a little more expensive than Darwin.

Since I last wrote to you I have been to the Sepik to look for a site for another erocodile farm and the hardest job was to find a bit of high ground above flood level. I used a camee with an outbeard moter and a float plane to look at the area and will be back in April with a helicopter. The people up there are keen on crocodiles and have then in most of their carvings and as figureheads on their canoes. (From a letter by Dennis Puffet)

In the Dreamtime when my mother's her told me the story of Karr the spider, , it had appeared to him it sounded like

nis:-Long, long ago, in the dreamtime, the human spirit of the spider (Karr), who was like a god, came and said to my father: "I am Karr, and I will tell you all the rules and

customs for the aboriginal people"

Karr told my grandpa where the Yirritja people(my grandfather's people) come from. The yellow rock was created and then divided into the other four clays and ochres - red, white, brown and black - which were the different tribal skin groups of the Yirritja

people: Bangadi, Marritj, Kodjuk, and Bulany.

Karr had come after the Djankawar sisters (the mud crabs) and had caught up with them, stolen their sacred dilly bags and had taught the Djankawar sisters all about their sacred ceremonies (that is for Dua ceremonies). He told the Djankawar sisters, and the Wawilak sisters (the blanket lizards, from whom he had stolen some sacred boomerangs and fire sticks) that he was their leader, and everybody else (the Aboriginal people) must follow his rules from generation to generation by living and dying.

He said that he was n't either Dua or Yirritja, but he could make rules for everyoue. This is why we draw Karr like this. He is the Bunggawa (Boss) Spirit. He is the world, and everybody is a part of him - the yellow clay people, the white clay people, the people who live on the land, the people who live in the caves, the animals, the pla nts, the water, the clouds, the wind and everything else. We show this in our drawing. His arms and legs are spread around the Aboriginal world - his left arm is in the south, the white clay country; his right arm is in the North, the yellow ochre country, and so on. J. M.


