

The N.T. Board of Inquiry into Health Services, comprising Mr. Edmonds and Drs. Vanderfield and Dearlove, will be visiting Maningrida on Sunday, May 7th,

The Health Committee has written, requesting the Board of Inquiry to examine aspects of the following, whilst it is at Maningrida:-

- The need to increase the frequency and range of surveys and services to the community, with particular reference to the Chest X-Ray unit, the Mobile Dental Unit and the Schools Medical Service.
- 2. The need for residential accommodation, in Darwin, so that mothers may accompany their ill children to Darwin.
- The need to improve the hospital facilities at Maningrida and the general range of supplies and equipment available to the medical staff.
- The need to improve the general environment and standard of facilities in the community as a pre-requisite of improving the general health standard.
- 5. The need to mount continuing public health education programmes in association with (4).
- The need to examine the function and adequacy of the existing medical services' staff establishment at Maningrida in relation
 - a. the needs of the community
 - b. the capacity to maintain staff against established positions.
- The adequacy of wages and employment conditions for Hospital staff, aboriginal and non-aboriginal.

The itinerary of the Board of Inquiry is not known, but persons wishing to make points on relevant subjects should address a letter to the Chairman, Maningrida Health Committee, or if they so wish, request to approach the Board of Inquiry directly. It is hoped that the Board of Inquiry can meet, and talk with, as many persons as possible

For those who may be in doubt, there are no water restrictions currently in force. If we are lucky, and the new bores work okay, there might not be any heavy restrictions this year.

All persons are asked, though, not to waste: water as it costs a lot of money and effort to get it to your tap.

Sheet X-Ray Unit is visiting Maningrida from 8-12th May. It is compulsory for everyone 14 years of age and over to have an X-ray.

It is very important to have your X-ray because there are a lot of people at Maningrida who have had T.B. and other chest sicknesses. The X-ray will show whether or not you have T.B. If you have, something can be done about it straight away. If T.B. is not found out and treated straight away you can become very ill indeed and feel weak for the rest of your life.

It destroys parts of your lungs so that T.B. is Tuberculosis. you cannot breathe properly. * * * * * *

We are also grateful to have Merv Mason doing the drawings while Alan Grieve is in Darwin with his plastered leg.


FROM THE NEWSMAPERS

Back from the Moon.

After a lot of trouble, the three American men who went to the moon have landed back on earth. They brought with them rocks which they picked up on the moon. Men all over the world will look at these rocks to try to know more about the moon and what it is made of.

No Work at V.R.D.:

Aboriginal stockmen at V.R.D. Station have walked off their jobs. They say they are unhappy because their noney is paid into the store there and they buy things from the store. This way, they say, they don't know if they are getting the right noney from their boss. The stockmen have gone to join with the Gurindji people at Wave Hill Station who have been off work for a long time because they want their tribal land given back to them. Other men from cattle stations are talking about these troubles and some men are talking about coming together to help Aboriginal people on cattle stations get good treatment from their bosses.



At Roper River Aboriginal people have a very big piece of country to use for a cattle station. It is a lease, like the land for the Cadell Gardens. The Roper people will try to get the station going and the government will find a white man who can help them to get started.

Prompted by a paragraph from last week:

LIKE GARDEN POINT EMINE SOMERODY ELSES OR COOKING YOUR OWN!

Sone people would say that they were lucky because someone else cooked all their neals and did their washing up of dirty plates. But this one part of life is a very important part of "family life". The people of Garden Point have no community kitchen, the family carner goes with his wife and they buy at the shop what they want for their family. They all cook their own neals, whether they live in the new houses, in the village huts, or in the wurlies, and they are happy to do this; dad earns, nun cooks and the children help with the washing up.

In most of the southern states there are "Migrant Hostels", where most people who first come from everseas usually stay for periods of up to 2 years. These places are something like settlements; some still have Nissan huts to be lived in and community kitchens. The "huts" are gradually being pulled down and small brick houses built which include a kitchen and stove, so that families can buy, cook and eat what they want to. When all the huts are gone, the community kitchens will close, because people are happier this way.


One day, perhaps all the settlements will be like this and like Garden Point, - self-supporting and independent. N.F.
