A toal of 46 people resident. .. not a great deal of discussion at our meeting, the people were happy...had been well served by the M.P.A. in the Wet but were eagerly awaiting the time when they could return to Momega (the MannRiver Crossing) Discussed the purchase of a tractor using the groups bank account and \$2000 Section 12 loan....tractor is now available, Hopefully they can remain next sesson in the much more suitable Momega surrounds and commute to Manbulogadi for shopping.

MARKGULIDE We arrived at Midjuwi (the landing) at 10.30 am on 26/5/74. One cangonly so

WULAGI AND MARING. GROUPS 23/5/74... net with these groups

at Maningrida....three groups have companied for the purposesof noving back to Ganedi.

Kemalguwira and Gunumungulngoira.... they agree that they should make their nove before asking for assistance.... the immediate need is to clear a track from the Blyth River Crossing to these three localities I undertook to explore possibility of obtaining plant for this purpose....the groups nominated a joint road party...there is no reason why they shouldn't be under way in early August.

28 people present all members of Mandarrg's family, or their wives and children MINGGOLOD ...several attractive traditional low platform dwellings...the old man looks very fit and well and was very happy to see us... the people intended to remain at Manggolod thie year because of a death at Ngarraitj last year...they are interested in buying a vehicle to increase their Dry season nobility....they wanted to buy a high powered woapon to call buffalb for subsistence purposes.... observed the operation of the fish trap...flesh cate for the day..kangaroo 301bs, fish(trap and lines) 30 lbs.

Outstations Stop Pressi

The movement still continues. This week people have settled themselves in three localities.

Charlie Wokala Fryis setting up camp on the upper part of Gudjerans.

Anumber (14) of ladies are resettling Gadji—the very important Wulagi place this week end they will be joined by the men including that old doctor man Ray Baba.

Paddy Croker, Rosie Anajilwa and Solomon Yalbar have made a station across the river at Ngularumba... the closest station to Maningrida so far. Most of the people are "full Gunbalung tribe", The people want to keep catching fish for sale yes they have a licence also crabs. They have also started a small garden.

The Conpelli were muisances. They were always pushing us to take then on our truck up and down between Conpelli and the Border Store. At last I got wild and I said "I can't take anymore people...this isn't a taxi...you make us like a taxi but you don't pay noney. To core rides."

That made then really angry. Some of them went to the Border Store and bought two makets of sugar...they put one in our petrol and one in our oil.

I said"Don't start this car now or that engine will blow up".

We couldn't get any help at the Mission so all the Maningrida men started the walk hone. First came Johnny Maiyara, Jimny Mordok, Stanley Naikala and Dick Snith. Next day behind then came myself, Don Gundinga, Jimny Djamunba and Michael Mundin. Four nore men were leaving the day after that.

It took our nob 5 days to walk to Madagalidban and then the Gunwinggu people gave us a ride to Maningrida in their boat Wilir.
