"Wherever I've been, on other settlements and missions, I've made a rough survey to see what kind of plays children would like. 95% have favoured the dramatisation of Acoriginal dreamtime legends, and here, to my amazement, almost 100% were in favour of stories concerned with Aboriginals successfully employed in cities, city life and that kind of thing. It was the last thing I expected."

Miss Elliott came to Maningrida with Mr Bob Kingsbury (of Comm. Film Unit) to work on part of a weekly radio programme which will both teach and be entertaining. It will be for 'school leavers' and will aim to revise and help them with their English and to further their social education (the importance of such thinks as 'please' and 'thankyou', 'respect for old people' the 'care of animals' etc.)

The program will include interviews and talks by young people from settlements and missions. There will also be plays, sometimes in serial form, and these will be written in colourful and exciting style to hold the attention of the listeners. The program will incorporate the English grammar to be taught during the week, and in the talks and plays as many examples as possible will be given. Booklets will be available to the post-primary teachers, giving an outline of the material to be presented on the air.

Where young people are at work, tapes will be made available to play as a form of entertainment at such gatherings as pictures etc. The A.D.C. and Welfare Branch have had this project in mind for some time, and now that its off the ground every effort is being made to ensure its chances of success. Hiss Mary Durack the well known Australian writer is very interested in the project and will write some episodes for it. Hiss Elliott herself has written 6 childrens books. She will come back to Maningrida in the near future with types to test the reaction of the young people and find out whether the programs on the right track.
